


And whereas, the said action of the said State Administrative Board is contrary to the provisions of Act Number 177, Public Acts of 1925 as amended providing state aid for indigent patients in the said institutions,

And whereas, the tuberculosis sanatorium of Marquette County and the sanatoria of other counties of the state are greatly in need of the state aid provided for by said act:

Now, therefore, it is hereby resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County that the said board protest against the action of the State Administrative Board as being not only illegal but inimical to the best interests of the tuberculosis sanatoria of the State of Michigan, and the said Board of Supervisors does hereby request that the State Administrative Board immediately rescind its action and that the said State Administrative Board promptly take the necessary steps to make the payments to which the various county sanatoria of the state are entitled under the provisions of said act, and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Governor of this State and one to the State Administrative Board by the Clerk.

Dear Dr. Lojacono--At the National meeting at Memphis a meeting was held of the Michigan sanatorium superintendents to make some definite plans towards handling the matter of State Aid.

It was agreed that a representative from each sanatorium district be sent as a member of a sanatorium committee to appear before the Administrative Board. Mr. Werle will make an appointment for this hearing which will be some time after May 25th. Mr. Werle will wire each sanatorium superintendent when definite arrangements for this hearing have been made. I would urge you strongly to have your sanatorium represented on that committee. The consensus of opinion among the men was that it was urgent to take early action rather than to let this thing drift along with the chances of coming into the next legislature.

Whereas, the State neglects and refuses to pay the said sum of money as required by the provisions of Act No. 177, of the P. A. of 1925.

Now therefore, it is hereby resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County that the said amount now due the County of Marquette be withheld from any moneys owing the State by the County of Marquette which is now due or may become due hereafter and,

It is further resolved that the County Clerk set up in the books of record of the County each month a charge to the State for the number of free patients treated each month and for which the County is entitled to payment from the State, and render a statement of said account to the State monthly.

It is further resolved that the County Treasurer be and he is hereby ordered to withhold the said amounts due the County of Marquette from any money or moneys due the State until such time as the State shall make payment to the County of all sums due the County as aforesaid.

Honorable Board of Supervisors, Marquette County, Michigan.

Gentlemen: In the matter of a petition heretofore referred to your Committee on Roads & Bridges and the Board of County Road Commissioners met in the office of the Commissioners on Tuesday, May 27, 1930, and on Tuesday, July 15, the joint body again met and went over the ground of the highway running southerly from M-28 to an intersection with the Gwinn-Little Lake road.

We met with and heard from Supervisor Anderson of West Branch Township, Healy of Chocoley Township, and Jory of Forsyth Township.

It appears that West Branch Township has provided for the transportation of children to Marquette for schooling. It appears that a large portion of the road prayed for cannot be plowed in its present shape as to width and grades.

It also appears upon consideration of the matter before the Road Commission that immediate adoption of this road is not practicable.

Therefore after careful consideration of the Committee and Board we recommend that the Board of County Road Commissioners be authorized to plow from Skandia westerly to the West Branch TownHall and thence northerly to the Peterson Farm.

And we further recommend that the sum of \$2,000 be appropriated from moneys not otherwise appropriated by this Board and paid to the Board of County Road

July 23, 1930

Commissioners to defray the cost of this snow plowing and to provide snow fence for the winter season of 1930-31.

This recommendation is made upon the understanding had with the Township of West Branch that they will do the necessary work to place the road between Skandia and the Town Hall in safe condition for snow plowing.

Gentlemen: At a meeting of the Board of County Road Commissioners and Committee on Roads and Bridges held in Ishpeming, December 30th, 1930, the matter of snow plow work in Humboldt Township which has been several times before your Board was brought up for discussion.

It was ascertained that the balance of money for work in the plowing of the Black River Road now in the hands of the Commission as of December 1st had been reduced to \$50.14, the appropriation heretofore made for the winter of 1928-1929 had been sufficient to do the plowing for that winter and the succeeding winter and the above balance was still in the hands of the Commission.

It also developed that in the fall of 1929 the Board of Supervisors had instructed the Board of County Road Commissioners to plow the old County Road sometimes called the Koski Road, being that road over which the school bus was operated which carries the children to the Champion School and that when the Board of Supervisors had directed the County Road Commission to keep the road plowed for wheel traffic no provision was made for funds for paying for this work and that in the performance of this duty the County Road Commission has expended to December 1st, 1930, \$79.17.

In order to reimburse the County Road Commission for work heretofore done by the direction of the Board of Supervisors and to provide for these two roads during the current season we recommend that the sum of \$300 be appropriated and paid to the Board of County Road Commissioners.



Gentlemen:

I believe that you are aware that through the united assistance of the Boards of Supervisors of the various counties of Michigan, bovine tuberculosis has been brought under control throughout the entire state. To accomplish this, it required a total expenditure from State, Federal Government and Counties of \$4,563,020.00. Of this amount the counties appropriated approximately \$750,000.00.

In order to maintain control of this disease and to make the work more permanent at the minimum of expense, Representative Espie has introduced a bill in the Legislature, known as House Bill No. 56, a copy of which you will please find inclosed.

You will please note that the provisions of this bill are to relieve the County of further appropriations and place the burden upon the State. Therefore, it will require an immediate and active approval upon the part of your Board to

accomplish the passing of this Bill.

I can see no possible reason why your Board will not be in full sympathy with this movement, consequently, I am suggesting that at the earliest possible date a resolution favorable to the passing of House Bill No. 56 be presented to your Board, and if favorable action is taken, that a copy of your resolution be sent to each of your Legislators and also one addressed to the Governor.





Gentlemen: Due to the very favorable conditions under which we were working during the past season, both as to weather and labor, the cost of the work in Ely Township has been considerable less than was anticipated.

Also a change in the plans for the work which is to be done in Tilden Township between the Ishpeming City limits and the Powder Mill will leave an additional surplus in this Special Fund.

As you are aware the County is now constructing Bridges No. 1 and 6 over the Peshekee River on the Huron Bay Grade and they have heretofore constructed Bridges No. 4 and 5. This leaves Bridges No. 2 and 3 on this grade which are very hazardous and leaves this road of little value until some arrangements are made with regard to these Bridges No. 2 and 3.

Upon investigation it has been ascertained that it is possible to build a road which will go around both Bridges No. 2 and 3 and do away with the necessity of constructing either of them and that this road can be built for a little over \$9,000 whereas it would cost upwards of \$30,000 to build the bridges and we feel in order to get the use of the money already expended on this road it is advisable to proceed with the construction of this road around Bridges No. 2 and 3 so the entire road may come into use.

The County is constructing Road 426 which is the road in Wells Township parallel with the E. & L. S. railroad. This road contains a large amount of swamp and the extreme dryness of the season together with the large amount of labor available is very favorable for this type of work.

Provisions have been made for the construction of Section B of this job but we feel the clearing, grubbing, ditching and concrete culvert work should be done in the swamp portions on the balance of this road so far as practical this season.

To the end that the Peshekee grading may go forward and the work on Road 426 be increased as suggested we recommend that the Board of County Road Commissioners be authorized to transfer from the Special Fund \$16,000 to be used in the construction of Road No. 426 and that the sum of \$9,500 be transferred from the Special Fund to be used for building a road around Bridges No. 2 and 3 on the Huron Bay Grade.





Sirs: Your Committee on County Roads and Bridges and the Board of County Road Commissioners to whom was referred the request of the Community Club of Witch Lake relative to cleaning up the roadsides of M-45 and for certain work at a spring in the neighborhood of Witch Lake met on Tuesday, May 12th and considered these matters.

In the matter of cleaning up roadsides on these State Trunk Highways a small percentage of the maintenance budget is set aside for this purpose each year and a portion of the County cleaned up. All dead material on M-45 between Republic and US-41 was taken care of during the winter. There still remains funds for work of picking up litter along most of the Trunk Line Highways and this will be attended to on all Trunk Line Highways by the forces of the Commission as rapidly as they can assign equipment to the work when not used on work essential to the maintenance of travel.

In the matter of improvements at the spring on M-45 South of the Witch Lake crossing with the C.M. & St.P. railroad. This spring has never been tested as to safety from a health standpoint. The Road Commission will forthwith have such tests made. If the use of the water from this spring is permissible for drinking it is the opinion of your committee that the prayer of the petitioners should be granted.

Therefore we recommend that the Board of County Road Commissioners be empowered to improve the site of the spring on M-45 South of Witch Lake and to charge the cost thereof to the County Park Fund which is under the jurisdiction of the Road Commission.

Sirs: Your Committee on County Roads and Bridges and the Board of County Road Commissioners to whom was referred the petition of residents of Republic Township and others with reference to the location of M-45 when the same shall be rebuilt met on May 12th and considered this matter.

Your committee and the Board of County Road Commissioners feel that the petitioners are correct in advancing the interest of their territory at this time and feel that your Board should have a sympathetic interest in all of the representations made and the welfare of this territory.

It is the present condition, however, and this is attested by the letter of Honorable G. C. Dillman, State Highway Commissioner, attached to the petitions that at the present time there is no definite plan or plans for the reconstruction of M-45 in Marquette County under consideration by the authorities having this road under jurisdiction.

We further understand that the relocation of this road as now being done in Dickinson County will not require any change from the present general routing in Marquette County unless the same shall be desirable for some other reason.

These premises are apparent in the matter.

1st--That the representations of the petitioners are of much weight and make a good showing for the reconstruction of this road via Republic Village.

2nd--That the merits of any alternate route cannot be considered until such projected route is specific and its merits and demerits known.

3rd--That the solution of location of this road must contemplate both the major and other purposes of the road and that the data on which such analysis must be made is not now assembled.

4th--That in the present premises a weighing of merits of routes is not possible as you have no definite matter to consider on either side of the question except the public interest of the Village of Republic.

Therefore we recommend that the petition be received and filed until such time as some definite move is made by the State for the reconstruction of M-45.

Dear Sirs:

The signers of this communication are the members of a Committee appointed by the Marquette County Bankers Federation to study the subject of the bank account of the Marquette County Treasurer and this communication has been passed upon and approved at a regular meeting of the Federation.

The First National Bank of Negaunee has for many years been the sole designated Depository of the County of Marquette. The funds so deposited with it have been re-deposited with the other banks of the County upon an agreed basis. This arrangement has been entirely satisfactory to all of the banks and the Negaunee Bank has handles the matter in a fair and equitable manner.

The First National Bank of Negaunee has furnished the required surety company depository bonds and the cost of the same has been pro-rated among the other banks. This arrangement assured the county of the protection required by statute. The Negaunee Bank, however, was the only one bound under this depository bond and the obligation of the other banks sharing the deposit was only a moral obligation and not a legal one. It has been decided that this is not a fair arrangement as to any of the banks and for this reason, we hereby request that proper action be taken by you to name all of the banks of the County as official depositories, with the suggestion that the balances maintained by the County Treasurer be carried according to the following schedule:

In the event any of the above mentioned banks prefer to take advantage of the provisions of the Turner Bill recently enacted by the Michigan State Legislature, that due permission be so accorded.

Ever since the law was enacted requiring that Boards of Supervisors designate depositories, interest has been paid to the County of Marquette at the rate of 2 percent per annum on daily balances. This rate for years was fair both as to the banks and the county. For more than a year, however, it has not been fair, so far as the banks are concerned. This is due to the fact that the price of money has decreased in common with other commodities and the banks are unable to now obtain adequate returns on their bond investments, their commercial paper, their money loaned on call or on balances maintained with their correspondent banks. Heretofore the banks in New York, Chicago and Detroit were allowing interest at the rate of 2 per cent per annum, but that has now been reduced to $\frac{1}{2}$ of 1 percent, and it is within the range of probabilities that it will be still further reduced. It is also proper to call your attention to the fact that during all of the period banks which were members of the Federal Reserve system have received no interest at all on the balances required by law to be maintained with the Federal Reserve Bank. We, therefore, request that contemporaneously with the enactment of the resolution above requested to be adopted, you also reduce the rate of interest to be paid to the county to 1 per cent per annum on daily balances.

All of the foregoing is respectfully commended to your favorable consideration.

✓ The following code adopted by the Board of County Road Commissioners was read and upon motion duly seconded, unanimously approved by this Board:

Honorable Board of Supervisors, Marquette, County, Michigan

Sirs: You are aware that the recent Legislature passed an act known as the Holbeck-McNitt Act which will require the County to adopt as County Roads 20 per cent of the mileage of Township Roads in each Township each year until all Township Roads become County Roads and that this act sets up certain procedure and is expected to provide certain revenues.

This will entail a considerable alteration in the procedure of the Commission and much negotiation with the various Township Boards, and to the end that uniformity may exist and all possible unnecessary misunderstanding be eliminated, your Board of County Road Commissioners have compiled certain principles of procedure to be followed into a code. We are attaching a copy thereof and request the approval of your Board of the principles therein set forth.

CODE .

On account of the changes in the statutes governing the adoption of roads into the County Road Systems and the additional and changed methods of financing the same, the following policies to govern procedure with reference to such roads are adopted:

1. All roads adopted into the County Road System shall be classified as Primary County Roads or as Secondary County Roads.
2. Primary County Roads shall be the County Roads which are in the County Road System on July 1, 1931, plus such additional highways as the Board of County Road Commissioners shall determine from time to time as part of the Primary County Road System.
3. Primary County Roads shall be designated by numbers assigned to them by the Board of County Road Commissioners in accordance with the uniform system of marking heretofore adopted.
4. All work on Primary Roads shall be financed in the same manner and from the same sources of revenue as work on County Roads has heretofore been financed.
5. All Township Roads adopted into the County Road System under the terms of the Holbeck-McNitt Act of 1931 and which are not at that or some later time determined as Primary County Roads by the Board of County Road Commissioners shall be known as Secondary County Roads.
6. All Secondary County Roads shall be designated by not less than two letters the first letter indicating the Township in which the road is situated and the second letter the road within the Township.

7. Maintenance work on Secondary Highways shall be financed from funds paid to the County under the terms of the Holbeck-McNitt Bill hereofor mentioned. If these funds are insufficient in any Township the Board of County Road Commissioners shall make recommendations accordingly to the Board of Supervisors.

8. Funds paid to the County under terms of the Holbeck-McNitt Act before mentioned and credited to a Township as is therein provided and which are not required for maintenance shall be used for improvement of roads adopted after January 1, 1931, in the Township to which such funds are credited.

9. If improvements are desired on any Secondary Highway more than can be paid for as specified in paragraph 8, the cost of such improvement shall be borne jointly by the Township in which the improvement lies and the County, arrangements therefor to be made in accordance with the Holbeck-McNitt Act. In every instance of such improvement the Township shall pay such percentage of the cost thereof as shall be determined by the Board of County Road Commissioners provided that the Township shall not be required to pay less than 10 percent nor more than 50 percent of the cost of such improvement.

10. All Township Roads are presumed under the statute to have not less than a 66 foot width of right of way. Whenever any Township Road Adopted into the County Road System shall have a right of way of less than 66 feet between fences by reason of fences, buildings or other encroachments on the statutory width of 66 feet, the Board of County Road Commissioners may deny the making of any improvement or the furnishing of snow plowing on such highway until the owners of property along such road shall have removed all fences or other encroachments off such 66 foot right of way or have given to said Board of County Road Commissioners such deeds and other papers as will empower them to the use of said 66 foot right of way.

11. The Board of County Road Commissioners shall determine which the Primary County Roads shall be provided with snow plowing to be done at County expense.

12. The Board of County Road Commissioners may determine that snow plowing will be done at County expense on certain of the Secondary County Roads which carry either R. F. D. mail or School Bus travel.

13. Snow plowing on any Secondary Highway except as provided in paragraph 12 shall only be done under arrangement between the County Road Commissioners and the Township in which plowing is desired and the Township shall pay the County \$50 per mile for every mile of Secondary Road which it is agreed upon to plow.

14. Snow plowing contemplated for any winter must be arranged for on or before the annual meeting of the County Road Commissioners held in September preceding the season plowing is desired and the \$50 per mile must be paid to the County or so secured as to satisfy the Board of County Road Commissioners on or before November 1st preceding the winter in which such plowing is to done.

15. Snow plowing shall be denied on any Secondary Highway which has not got a proper right of way and on which the width and character of the road grade is such that there is probability that plowing machinery will be damaged in doing the work or where the cost of snow removal appears to be more than is warranted by the expected benefits.

16. All improvements and snow plowing shall be denied for Secondary Roads in any Township which is in arrears in payments of money owed to the County.

The following communication from the Board of County Road Commissioners was read and suggested actions were unanimously approved by this Board:

Honorable Board of Supervisors, Marquette, County, Michigan

Sirs: The State Highway Commissioner of Michigan, Honorable G. C. Dillman, has offered to Marquette County the opportunity to reshape the grade and gravel the highway known as US 41 between Carlshend and the Marquette-Alger County line.

This work is to proceed in the same manner as maintenance or other cost account work done for the State with the exception that we are advised by Mr. Dillman that the State will not make any payments thereon until April, 1932. This would require the County to carry all costs thereon until the State makes payments.

These features appear in the matter: .

This road between Carlshend and the County line is a natural earth grade. The earth is of such character that the road is always slippery in wet weather and becomes impassable in the Spring and Fall. The improvement of this road which is a link in U.S. 41 is needed.

By doing this work it will enable the County to produce gravel locally at cost which is warranted and this gravel may also be used on County Road 456 which is to be graveled this season.

Doing of this work and preparation of this gravel locally will provide consider-

able additional employment and assist in relieving the Poor Department Fund from some of the calls upon the same.

The Township of Tilden was indicated that they would not join the County in the cooperative work in that Township this year. Certain of the funds from this work have already been assigned but some additional money still remains in the Special Fund which with funds held in the General Account for the purpose of financing State maintenance, etc., will give sufficient money to pay for all work which has to be done prior to October 1st. Any additional arrangements necessary can therefor be made in the budget for the next ensuing year.

Your Road Commissioners feel that this offer from the State Highway Commissioner should be accepted and the work put on and request the approval of your board in that decision.

LEASE FOR PUBLIC PARK

THIS AGREEMENT, made this 1st day of June, A. D. 1931, by and between The Champion Iron Company, a Michigan corporation, hereinafter called the Lessor, party of the first part, and the County of Marquette in the State of Michigan, hereinafter called the Lessee, party of the second party, WITNESSETH:

That the Lessor, for and in consideration of the rents, conditions, covenants and obligations hereinafter contained to be kept and performed by the Lessee, does hereby let, lease and demise unto the Lessee the surface only of the Southeast quarter of the Southwest quarter (SE $\frac{1}{4}$ of SW $\frac{1}{4}$) of Section Thirty (30) and the north three hundred and thirty (330) feet of the North half of the Northwest quarter (N $\frac{1}{2}$ of NW $\frac{1}{4}$) of Section Thirty-one (31) in Township Forty-eight (48) North of Range Twenty-nine (29) West in Marquette County, Michigan, and hereinafter referred to as said premises, subject to all highways, railroad rights of way and other public or private easements over and across said premises.

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD said premises unto the Lessee for and during the term of five

(5) years from the date hereof or until this lease is sooner terminated as hereinafter provided for the following uses and purposes, viz: to improve, maintain and use said premises as part of a county public park, and for such use and purpose only, for a rental of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) per year payable in advance on the first day of June in each year during the continuance of this lease, and upon and subject to all and singular the following terms, conditions, exceptions, reservations and obligations, to each of which the Lessee, in consideration of the foregoing demise, hereby agrees, to-wit:

The Lessor hereby reserves all iron ores and other ores and minerals in or under said premises, together with the right at any time to explore for, mine and remove the same as though this demise had not been made and the Lessee agrees not to make any claim against the Lessor, or any person or corporation operating by agreement with or consent of the Lessor, for damages on account of any exploring, mining or other operations or business upon, under or adjacent to said premises, whether such damages shall occur by reason of the subsidence, caving or removal of the surface of said premises or from any other cause or causes.

The Lessor hereby reserves the right at any time to terminate this lease by giving to the Lessee six (6) months written notice to that effect, which may be served by delivering a copy thereof to the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors of the said County of Marquette or by mailing the same by registered mail addressed to such Chairman at Marquette, Michigan; and this lease and all rights and privileges hereby demised shall absolutely terminate six (6) months after the service of any such notice, without any further act or proceeding, judicial or otherwise.

The Lessee shall pay promptly and before delinquency all taxes and assessments, general or special, that may be levied or assessed upon said premises, and upon any building, structure or other property at any time placed or permitted thereon by the Lessee, for the year 1931 and all subsequent years during the continuance of this lease, including the year in which this lease may expire or be terminated and to furnish the Lessor duplicate tax receipts for all such taxes when paid; and shall protect said premises and all buildings, structures and other property thereon from all mechanics', laborers' or other liens and keep the title thereto free and clear from all clouds or encumbrances in any way arising from such liens or from its use or occupancy thereof.

It is covenanted and agreed by the Lessee that it shall keep said premises and all improvements thereon or appurtenant thereto in good repair and in a safe, clean and respectable condition; that it shall not use said premises, or any part thereof, nor permit the same to be used, for any purpose other than that hereinabove stated; that it shall not grant any concessions for the erection of buildings or other structures thereon, nor grant concessions or licenses of any character, that shall not be limited in term to one season and also be terminable upon short notice, not exceeding thirty (30) days; the Lessee may clear away the underbrush on said premises, but it shall not cut or damage, nor permit any person or persons to cut or damage, any green or growing timber thereon; and that any and all buildings or other structures that may be erected thereon by the Lessee shall be such as may be readily removed on or before the termination of this Lease, as hereinafter provided.

The Lessee covenants and agrees during the continuance of this lease to promptly remove all garbage, refuse and debris that may accumulate upon said premises and to keep the same at all times in a neat, clean and respectable condition, to keep the walks, roads and passageways upon, contiguous or appurtenant to said premises in good repair and, generally, in the use and care of said premises, to comply in every respect with all laws, ordinances and requirements of any officer or other authority having control or jurisdiction over said premises, so as to relieve the Lessor during the continuance of this lease from all obligations in any way arising from the ownership of said premises.

The Lessee covenants and agrees to indemnify and save the Lessor harmless from any and every claim, demand and cause of action made or brought by reason of any real or alleged default or imperfection in any sidewalk, road or passageway upon, contiguous or appurtenant to said premises or any building, structure or improvement at any time thereon or by reason of any failure to repair any such walks, buildings, structures or improvements or by reason of any actual or alleged act or omission of the Lessee, or any of its officers, agents, servants or contractors, in the use of said premises or in doing anything hereby permitted or required to be done, or on account of any loss of life or health or other injury, whether avoidable or not, that may in any way be due or be alleged to be due, to the use of occupancy of said premises under this lease or to any act or omission of the Lessee whatsoever; it being understood that the Lessor assumes no risk and shall be under no additional obligation or liability whatsoever by reason of having made this lease.

If and whenever the Lessee shall cease to use said premises for the purpose aforesaid, or shall use the same, or any part thereof, for any other purpose, or shall fail to keep and perform any of the covenants or conditions herein contained, then and in every such event the Lessor may at its option forthwith declare this lease terminated by giving to said Lessee thirty (30) days notice in writing of its intention so to do, which may be served by mailing the same by registered mail addressed to the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County at Marquette, Michigan; and this lease and all rights and privileges hereby demised shall absolutely terminate thirty (30) days after the service of any such notice, without any further act or proceeding, judicial or otherwise.

The Lessee may at any time terminate and surrender this lease by executing a written instrument of surrender in proper form for record and by removing the buildings, structures and other property from said premises and surrendering possession thereof as hereinafter provided.

On or before the termination of this lease in any manner the Lessee shall, at its own cost and expense, remove from said premises any and all buildings, structures and other property thereon, and quietly and peaceably restore and surrender possession of said premises to the Lessor in a neat and orderly condition, in default whereof the Lessor may forthwith re-enter said premises, with or without process of law, expel any and all persons occupying the same, using such force as may be necessary so to do, appropriate to its own use, or at its option remove, any and all buildings, structures and other property remaining thereon and dispose thereof as it may desire, restore said premises to a neat and orderly condition and repossess and enjoy the same as before this demise without prejudice to any remedy that might otherwise be used for breach of any of the agreements herein contained; and the Lessee shall pay promptly all costs and expenses of any such re-entry, removal or restoration.

It is expressly agreed that this instrument contains the whole of the agreement made between the parties hereto with respect to said premises and that no employee, agent, superintendent or officer of the Lessor, except its President or Vice President, has any authority to waive or modify any of the terms of this agreement and that no modification hereof shall be binding upon the Lessor unless it be made by an agreement in writing signed by its President or Vice President.

This agreement and all the terms, conditions and obligations hereof shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the respective successors and assigns of the parties hereto; but the Lessee shall not assign this lease, nor sublet said premises, or any part thereof, without the written consent of the Lessor.

✓ RESOLUTIONS ACCEPTING LEASE OF THE CHAMPION IRON COMPANY

WHEREAS, The Champion Iron Company offers to lease to the County the surface only of the Southeast quarter of the Southwest quarter (SE $\frac{1}{4}$ of SW $\frac{1}{4}$) of Section Thirty (30) and the north three hundred and thirty (330) feet of the North half of the Northwest quarter (N $\frac{1}{2}$ of NW $\frac{1}{4}$ of Section Thirty-one (31) in Township Forty-eight (48) North of Range Twenty-nine (29) West in Marquette County, Michigan, and a draft of lease proposed to be entered into by and between said company and the County has been presented and read in full at this meeting; and

WHEREAS, said land is suitable for said purpose; the terms, conditions, reservations and obligations contained in said draft of lease are satisfactory and it is considered advisable that said lease be accepted and that said land be used in a manner consistent with all the provisions of said lease;

THEREFORE, RESOLVED, by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Marquette that the County acquire the right to use said land for public park purposes by lease from the Champion Iron Company in the form and subject to all the terms, conditions, exceptions, reservations and obligations aforesaid, to each and all of which the County agrees; and

It has since been learned and we now have copy of this act as finally passed by the Legislature, that it does not in all particulars correspond with the code which we had heretofore submitted. In order to make our code stay in line with the act as passed, a revised code has been passed by the Board of County Road Commissioners and a copy submitted herewith.

We recommend the approval of your Board of Supervisors of the revised code as herein attached.
