"RESOLUTION providing for the submission to the electors of Marquette County at the election to be held September 13, 1932, the question of issuing bonds in the amount of \$400,000 for the purpose of making permanent improvements in, to and about roads and bridges of said County.

"WHEREAS, this Board of Supervisors did on the 27th day of July, 1932, at a legally convened meeting adopt a resolution authorizing the borrowing of money and issuing of bonds in the amount of four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000) for the purpose of making permanent improvements in, to and about roads and bridges of said County; and

"WHEREAS, before said resolution can become effective, the question of issuing said bonds must be submitted to the electors of the County at an election,

"NOW THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County, Michigan, as follows:

"Section 1--That the question of approving said resolution and issuing bonds of the County of Marquette in the amount of four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000) for the purpose of making permanent improvements in, to and about roads and bridges of said County, shall be submitted to the qualified electors of said County voting at the regular primary election to be held throughout said County on the 13th day of September, 1932.

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"Section 2--That at least thirty (30) days prior to the date of such election certified copies of this resolution and the resolution described in the preamble hereto shall be by the County Clerk served upon the Sheriff of Marquette County and said Sheriff shall, at least twenty-(20) days be posted in two (2) of the most public and conspicuous places in each election precinct or district in the County a notice of said election containing the full text of said resolution described in the preamble hereto.

"Section 3--That the County Clerk shall also cause to be published in at least one newspaper, published and having a general circulation in the County, notice of such election for at least three (3) successive weeks immediately prior to the date set for such election, the first of said publications to be made at least twenty-one (21) days prior to the date of such election.

"Section 4--That the County Clerk shall also cause to be served on the Clerk of each City, village and Township in said County certified copies of said resolutions at least thirty (30) days prior to the date fixed for holding said election and notice of the submission of said proposition at said election shall be published in the form prescribed by Section 3020, Michigan Compiled Laws, 1929, at least twice in some newspaper or newspapers published or of general circulation in each such City, Village and Township not less than ten (10) days prior to the date set for such election.

"Section 5--That notice of such election shall be in substantially the following form:

"RESOLUTION authorizing the borrowing of money and issuing of bonds in the amount of \$400,000 by the County of Marquette, Michigan, for the purpose of making permanent improvements in, to and about roads and bridges of said County and determining the period of usefulness of such improvements.

"WHEREAS, it is deemed necessary and expedient by this Board of Supervisors of the County of Marquette, Michigan, that permanent improvements be made in, to and about certain roads and bridges in said County, and

"WHEREAS, estimates of cost of the improvements of such roads and bridges have heretofore been made by this Board, which estimates of cost are now on file for public inspection with the Clerk of this Board, and this Board has heretofore and does hereby determine that the estimated cost of making such permanent improvements to such roads and bridges will be not less than four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000); and

"WHEREAS, there are no funds available for the purpose of making such permanent improvements and it will be necessary that money be borrowed and bonds be issued in evidence thereof;

"NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County, Michigan, as follows:

SECTION 1--That this Board of Supervisors deems it expedient for the County of Marquette to make or cause to be made permanent improvements in, to and about certain roads and bridges of said County.





Resolution authorizing the borrowing of money and issuing of bonds in the amount of \$400,000 by the County of Marquette, Michigan, for the purpose of making permanent improvements in, to and about roads and bridges of said County.

WHEREAS, at an election duly called and held in the County of Marquette, State of Michigan, on the 13th day of September, A. D. 1932, after notice thereof duly given for the time and in the manner required by law, more than a majority of the qualified electors voting at such election approved the resolution of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Marquette heretofore adopted by said Board of Supervisors on the 27th day of July, A. D. 1932, authorizing the borrowing of money and the issuance of bonds of the County of Marquette in the amount of Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$400,000) for the purpose of making permanent improvements in, to and about roads and bridges of said County; and

WHEREAS, the canvass of the returns of the said special election made by the Board of Canvassers of Marquette County on September 16, 1932, as shown by the statement of said Board of Canvassers duly certified and filed in the office of the Clerk of said County, and as shown by Certificate of Results filed by the Clerk of said Board of Supervisors of said County pursuant to law, shows that a majority of the electors voting thereon have approved said resolution, the number of votes cast in favor of said resolution being 13,998 and the number of votes cast against said resolution being 1,472, the Board of Supervisors now finds and determines that said resolution so approved by a majority of said electors is now effective and binding upon the said County of Marquette:

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County, Michigan, as follows:

The said bonds when executed as herein required, shall be delivered to the County Treasurer of said County and sold by and under the direction of the Finance and Taxation Committee of said Board of Supervisors, which Committee shall have authority to fix definitely the rate of interest which said bonds shall bear at the time of the sale of said bonds, said rate not to exceed the maximum rate of six per cent per annum and said Committee shall have the authority to sell all of said bonds or any part of said bonds in its discretion, and to direct the sale of all of said bonds or any part of said bonds, at such time or times and in such manner as it shall deem best, after causing notice to be published in the manner required by law, and said Committee shall have the authority to approve any sale of said bonds for and on behalf of the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County; and said bonds shall be delivered to the purchaser thereof by the Treasurer of said County upon receipt of the purchase price therefor after the said sale has been approved by the said Finance and Taxation Committee for and on behalf of said Board of Supervisors of Marquette County; and if no satisfactory bids are received the bonds may be sold at private sale by said Finance and Taxation Committee for and on behalf of said Board of Supervisors, at a price not less than the highest bid, if any, received at such public sale, and if not so sold at private sale within thirty days after said public sale, said bonds shall be again offered at public sale and re-advertised in the manner hereinbefore provided and after similar notice as hereinbefore provided; and the proceeds of all of said bonds shall be used for the purpose of making permanent improvements in, to and about the roads and bridges of said County, and for no other purpose whatsoever, and the proceeds shall not be disbursed except upon the orders of the Board of County Road Commissioners of said County.

We propose to continue to maintain our standards of care and comfort given patients. This is brought about by placing a greater burden of service on all employees.

This year the saving of \$29,000.00 in net expenditures is based on the assumption that the State of Michigan will meet its legal obligation and pay the dollar per day for our needy patients; if our assumption were to prove wrong, we would be \$20,000.00 or more short of our requirements for the year.

My Dear Mr. Stakel- I submit herewith an estimate of costs for the ensuing year for the office of the County Welfare Agent. These estimates have been arrived at by checking expenditures for the past year and by making every possible effort to reduce the expenses.

Last year we were granted \$40,000 for Dependent Children's Aid. We shall not expend that budget this year due to some of the reductions which have been made, and my present estimate is that the Dependent Children's Aid for this past year will amount to about \$38,000.00. I am requesting that \$40,000 be placed in the budget for next year due to the fact that there is a constant gradual increase in the number of petitions for Dependent Children's Aid, and since it is possible that some of the Barnes-Hecker cases will come to our attention this next year.

In checking over the taxes to be raised by taxation for last year I find that \$17,500 was included in the budget for public charges. This includes all public charges such as insane, epileptic, feeble-minded, and adult afflicted. I estimate that the adult afflicted costs for next year will be approximately the same, with the possibility of a slight increase due to the present economic situation. I therefore request that \$12,000 be included in the budget for Adult Afflicted for the ensuing year.

The expense of some of the items for the county Welfare Agent will appear in the costs of the Judge of Probate Office, such as stationery and special printing.

✓ BUDGET COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS.

The Budget Committee respectfully recommends that the following report be adopted at the annual meeting of the Board of Supervisors. On July 27th of this year a preliminary report was presented and the following is an addition to that report.

The entire program as presented is the result of painstaking labor and effort on the part of your Budget Committee. Parts of the program already have the approval of this Board and the balance should be adopted by the Board as a whole for the following reasons.

1- The whole set up is an economy measure and is contemplated to give relief to all the taxpayers in this County. We aimed to keep tax delinquency down and keep this County from joining the rapidly growing number of those already bankrupt. Tax delinquency for our County as a whole was only 4.08 percent in 1928. Although one township was 50 per cent delinquent and one city ran as high as 5.52 per cent, the average for the three cities and nineteen townships was 4.08 per cent. This increased to 5.40 per cent in 1930 and in 1931 actually dropped to 5.00 per cent. In 1929 the average was 4.66 per cent. We believe that when the taxpayers in this county show a desire to pay their taxes as they have, they should be encouraged by reducing their burden to the lowest possible figure.

Earnings at present are not high enough to support the old levels of taxes that were imposed. Neither the individual or corporation can support an unbearable load. Incomes have fallen and in some cases entirely disappeared. Industry in our own county is unable to furnish employment to workmen. Industry, stores, banks, farmers and individuals have faced hardships and been forced to economize. The more reason to expect economy on the part of the county government which is supported by those who have been forced through decreased earnings to practice varied economies. If you do not approve of reducing budgets in every possible manner, the ownership of property in this county will become a "liability" not an "asset!"

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2. The budget for 1933 contemplates that this Board will reaffirm its action of the July 27th meeting and definitely adopt the resolution recommending the payment to county officers of salaries in lieu of fees, as provided for in the Compiled Laws of 1929 of Michigan.

3. The third important factor in the general picture is the Bond issue. We contemplate that the issue can and will be sold to take up the unemployment slack.

✓ Fees.

I now wish to present the resolution relative to substituting definite salaries in lieu of fees. Gogebic County and Houghton County have already committed themselves to a definite salary schedule for all county officers except where statute specifically states otherwise.

✓ Adult Afflicted.

In the previous report submitted by the Budget Committee mention was made of the fact that the patients sent to the University Hospital cost Marquette County an average of approximately \$300.00 apiece. Cooperation by the Judge of Probate, County Welfare Agent, Poor Commission and the Marquette-Alger County Medical Society was asked to reduce these expenditures. This cooperation has been given. This cooperation has been given and at the present time no cases are sent to Ann Arbor except those that cannot be treated in the local hospitals. Patients formerly going to the University Hospital are now being treated in Ishpeming, Negaunee and Marquette at a greatly reduced cost to the taxpayer. A new schedule of rates has been submitted by the Medical Society, showing a reduction of 20 per cent over the old rates.

✓ Aid for Dependent Children

Pursuant to the suggestion made by the Budget Committee, which suggestion was concurred in and approved of by the Board of Supervisors at their July meeting an investigation of those receiving aid under the provisions of this act has been under way by the County Welfare Agent and representatives of the Poor Commission and at least 21 of the 115 cases should be transferred because of various reasons.

✓ Insurance.

Your committee also recommends that an appraisal be made of all the county buildings in order to ascertain whether or not we are paying excess fire insurance premiums. An appraisal will determine the insurable value of the county's property, will give the right proportion to coverage between building and contents and will make it possible to take advantage of the reductions in premiums made possible by co-insurance. We are of the opinion that the cost of the appraisal can be met by the reduction in insurance premiums in a year or two.

✓ Morgan Heights Sanatorium.

We understand that there is a definite proposal before the State Administrative Board relative to the recommendation of a State Sanatorium for Tubercular Patients in the northern part of southern Michigan. We do not know that any thought has ever been given towards the establishment of such an institution in northern Michigan. There have been suggestions a number of times from certain members of our own Board of Supervisors that the Morgan Heights Sanatorium be turned over to the State. The Budget Committee is of the opinion that whenever an opportunity may present itself whereby the Morgan Heights Sanatorium may be transferred to the State that every effort be made by our Sanatorium Committee to consummate such a deal.

It is further the opinion of the Budget Committee that a special committee be appointed by the Chairman of this Board to investigate and promote such a plan.

In the Morgan Heights budget as presented for consideration at the annual meeting there is an item of \$20,000, covering payments expected from the State during 1933. In the Morgan Heights budget this item is credited to the estimated revenues for 1933, making a reduction in the amount to be spread on the tax roll of \$20,000. The Budget Committee, recommends, however, that the \$20,000 of State Aid be earmarked for interest and retirement of bonds.

✓ County Automobiles.

It is also the recommendation of your Budget Committee that the County purchase no passenger automobile at a cost to exceed \$800.00, factory price, except where the earnings of a passenger car will actually justify the purchase of a higher priced car. If the earnings of any passenger car purchased can be proven to justify a larger capital investment, we believe that the judgment of the commission in charge of that particular department should be concurred in.

We also recommend that where the operating and maintenance costs of any county

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owned car is excessive that the same shall be disposed of. It is further recommended that suitable lettering at least three inches in height be stenciled on these cars designating the department to which it belongs.

It is further recommended that all county owned cars should be used to the fullest extent for the activities of the respective departments controlling such cars and that they should not in any event be considered as a personal car.

✓ Purchase of Supplies.

The committee in this report provides for a Purchasing Agent for county supplies and materials used in the County Court House. The committee feels that it is very much to the County's interest if the other departments and commissions when making purchases of any kind, use every effort to save in such purchases by the encouragement of competitive bidding. It is further suggested that in such bidding Marquette County firms and individuals be given every possible consideration.

Honorable Board of Supervisors, Marquette County, Michigan.

Gentlemen: Because of the action of the McNitt law the number of accounts which the Board of County Road Commissioners have on their books has multiplied to such a number as to make the bookkeeping system cumbersome and the understanding of the accounts confusing.

This matter has been under advisement by the Board of County Road Commissioners ever since it was known that this would develop through the adoption of the large number of roads.

It is the opinion of the Board of County Road Commissioners that it would be more advisable to carry accounts by Townships under which system any number of sub-accounts could be set up at pleasure but the total number of major accounts would be fixed and it would yield the information desired as to expenditures without recalculation for State reports and our own information.

In order that we may bring the matter to a head it is necessary that the small remaining balance in Roads 456 and 510 be closed out. All other appropriations have been expended for the jobs for which they were appropriated and all work done on the above jobs has been completed and these balances are left over.

It is requested that we be authorized to close these jobs and any slight balance which may be remaining in other accounts as of October 15th be credited to the Maintenance Fund.

✓ The following report of the Committee on Highways and Bridges and the County Road Commission was read and adopted:

Honorable Board of Supervisors, Marquette County, Michigan.

Gentlemen: Your Committee on County Roads and Bridges met with the Board of County Road Commissioners and the Chairman and Employment Committee of the Marquette County Branch of the Unemployment Committee on Friday, October 21, 1932 to consider matters of employment and road improvements under the bond issue floated by your Board.

The following conditions appear evident from the records and information before this joint meeting:

That a high mark of employment has been reached by the Road Commission of 1,386 men on their payroll in September and October of which 1,229 are labor exclusively of the work relief type and selected from the unemployment lists and many of the balance are rotated labor of semi-skilled character;

That starting November 1st or soon thereafter many of the mines of the County will start to operate, thereby furnishing employment for many of the men now idle or employed on the work relief projects, this employment being both to those men directly employed in the mines and indirectly to many others who will earn a livelihood by virtue of the large amount of money put in circulation through the operation of the mines;

That in addition to the starting of the mines at least one and probably two woods operations are assured in Wells Township and at least one in Skandia Township and several smaller woods operations are reported;

That in addition the railroad shops in Marquette will re-employ a considerable number of men, and

That two large State Highway Department jobs are expected within the County during the winter months.

Contrary to these favorable factors we must remember that the stockpiles of ore are so large that winter operation of the mines may preclude their operation next summer and there are other factors which might produce an economic situation by spring or early summer wherein the large employment of men by the Road Commission would be more necessary than at present; therefor

The three bodies in joint session report and recommend the approval of your Board to a schedule of work which would employ by the County Road Commission for the winter, from 700 to 800 men.

Your Committee has reviewed the plans of the Commission for this work and recommends their approval. They are too detailed to include herein.

We further recommend that your Board authorize the Committee on Roads and Bridges to meet with the Board of County Road Commissioners and with power to act; should any change in the economic situation require other disposition in the matters above reported that is herein recommended.

✓ The following communication was read and upon motion duly made and seconded unanimously adopted and deed executed as requested and delivered to the Register of Deeds for recording:

Ishpeming, Mich., December 3, 1932.

Honorable Board of Supervisors, Marquette County, Michigan.

Gentlemen: In connection with work relief under the bond issue one of the projects it is expected to work on is County Road 480 in Negaunee Township between Ann Street and the Eagle Mills school.

When this line was originally surveyed it was contemplated that the road would cross the Queen Mine branch of the L. S. & I. with a grade separation. The cost of this grade separation is such as to preclude such work at the present time either to the railroad or the county. There is also the question of the jurisdiction of the Public Utilities Commission of the proposed crossing as such a separation will fall within the city limits of Negaunee. The previous line without the operation would give rise to a dangerous railroad crossing and is therefore not feasible at this point.

For the above reasons it is not practicable to build this road on the line as it was surveyed several years ago and for that reason a different alignment has been surveyed across Section 4, T 47 N, R 26 W from the one on which the Cleveland Cliffs Iron Company and the Arctic Iron Company granted us right of way in 1928.

The Cleveland Cliffs Iron Company has agreed to make an even exchange of the right of way heretofore acquired for the one needed on the new alignment and inas much as their former conveyance read to the County of Marquette, in order to affect this exchange it is necessary for the Board of Supervisors to

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render quit claim deed for the right of way heretofore conveyed and the same companies will issue right of way deed for the right of way needed.

We request the Board of Supervisors to pass the necessary motion authorizing the Chairman and Clerk of the Board to execute such quit claim deed, copy of which is hereto attached.

✓ A resolution from Calhoun County relative to the expense of operating County Tuberculin Hospitals of standard required by the State and one from Missaukee County in regards to the present system of drawing jurors and fees for serving warrants and one from Genesee County asking that the Statute be changed for swearing in votes on election day were read and upon motion referred to the Committee on Legislation.

✓ The following communication was read and upon motion made and seconded, request was granted.
Honorable Board of Supervisors, Marquette County, Michigan.

Gentlemen: At a meeting in Munising on November 12th a program of betterment work on the State Trunk Line Highways in the Upper Peninsula was proposed having as its intent the furnishing of needed work relief in the various Counties of the Peninsula, a summary of the general plan being as follows:

That the State Highway Commissioner would seek from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation a loan of \$2,000,000.00 for use in the Upper Peninsula Counties during the nine months period January 1, 1933 to October 1, 1933.

That when received this money be utilized in the various Counties for paying for work relief on betterment projects on the State Trunk line Highways.

That the State repay this loan to the Reconstruction Finance Corporation by making deductions from future allotments of Federal Aid for highways to Michigan. This is contemplated in the Act of Congress which makes such a loan possible.

To accomplish this purpose with the requirements of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation rules. Qualifying blanks are now being made out and it is expected to forward them to the proper authorities within a day or two. It is hoped that Marquette County can qualify and receive a needed portion of this work relief.

The money received on this loan must go directly to the payment of labor and items covered in the Act of Congress. No portion of these funds may be used for purchasing materials or supplies, rental of equipment or other associated items. The State has no money for such purpose and therefor if it is expected to get any portion of this money in Marquette County it will be necessary for Marquette County to provide for the payment of items for which the loan funds may not be used.

The Board of County Road Commissioners Recommend: that the Board of Supervisors authorize the Board of County Road Commissioners to enter into agreement with the State Highway Commissioner of Michigan to perform betterments work for work relief of unemployment on the State Trunk Line Highways within the County; and further authorize the Board of County Road Commissioners to furnish engineering and supervision on such betterment work without cost to the State; and authorize the Board of County Road Commissioners to furnish all necessary equipment without charging the customary equipment rentals to the State; and further that the Board of County Road Commissioners be authorized to furnish all necessary materials and supplies and to pay therefor out of County monies and to not expect reimbursement from the State for such materials and supplies unless or until funds shall be made available to the State Highway Department to pay for such materials and supplies; and further to authorize the Board of County Road Commissioners to pay from the Highway Bond Improvement Fund or monies not otherwise specifically appropriated such costs as are necessary for equipment, supervision, materials and supplies; and further to authorize the Board of County Road Commissioners to pay from the Highway Bond Improvement Fund or monies not otherwise specifically appropriated such costs as are necessary for equipment, supervision, materials, and supplies on work done for the State as is herein provided and which are not payable from the money received by loan from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

We request approval of our recommendation and authorization on all matters recommended at this meeting so that negotiations with the State may go forward as rapidly as possible.

✓ The following communication was read/the recommendation of the County Road Commissioners unanimously adopted:
Honorable Board of Supervisors, Marquette County, Michigan.

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Gentlemen: Pursuant to the terms of Act No. 41 of the Public Acts of Michigan Extra Session of 1932, the Board of County Road Commissioners recommend:

1st. That the principal and interest on the County Highway Improvement bonds of this County Issue of October 1932 which shall be due and payable in the calendar year 1933 be paid from the money paid into the County under the terms of sub-Section D, Section 19 of the above mentioned act as provided in sub-Section 2 of Section 19-A in said act and that after provision for payment of the interest and principal payments on said bond issue for 1933 the balance of money remaining in that part of the gasoline tax payment made to the County under said sub-Section D of Section 19 of said act be divided between the Cities and the County in accordance with sub-Section 5 of Said Section 19-A.

The monies referred to are the new monies from the gas tax returned in accordance to the above mentioned act of 1932 which is commonly called the Horton Act and the monies are commonly referred to as the second half of the weight tax. The recommended procedure is in accordance to said act and maintains the statutory priority in the use of this money, except that the Road Commission is not recommending giving sub-Section 4 consideration. Under the terms of sub-Section 4 your Board has the option to divide the money remaining after payment of principal and interest on the bonds so that only one-half of the remainder being divided according to sub-Section 5 of said Section 19-A as is herein recommended.

To give specific effect to this recommendation we further recommend:

1st-That the County Treasurer be directed to set aside from the monies paid to Marquette County in accordance with the provisions of sub-Section D of Section 19 of Act 41 P.A. Michigan Extra Session 1932 the sum of \$36,000.00, being from the payments under said Section before they are used for any further other purpose and that said County Treasurer be directed to pay the interest and payments on account of principal on bond issue for Highway Improvements issue of October 1932 and which shall become due and payable in the calendar year 1933 with the \$36,000.00.

2nd-That any money remaining in that part of the gasoline tax money paid to this County under terms of sub-Section D of Section 19aforesaid, be apportioned to the Cities, and to the County as is by said act provided, and that the City proportions be paid to the respective City Treasurers. Such balance of funds from sub-Section D monies to be apportioned as follows:

to City of Ishpeming	20.959 %
City of Marquette	33.553 %
City of Negaunee	14.865 %
County of Marquette	30.623 %
	<u>100.000 %</u>

And we further recommend that the proportion of the above money apportioned to the County from monies from said sub-Section D and all monies paid to the County under sub-Section C of said Section 18 of Act 41 be utilized by the Board of County Road Commissioners for the maintenance and improvement of the County Roads of the County including those roads heretofore or hereafter adopted into the County Road System under the terms of the McNitt-Holbeck-Smith Act.

✓ The following report of the special committee on the question of the deposit of county monies was read and upon motion duly made and seconded unanimously adopted:

To the County Board of Supervisors, Marquette County, Michigan, on the Question of Deposit of County Moneys.

Your committee respectfully reports that it has examined to the extent of its ability the questions submitted to it by the County Board, namely, as to the manner and method of deposit of public funds of this County in the banks of the County, and the amount of security, if any, for such deposits now held by the County, and the question as to whether security in the shape of security bonds deposited or segregated for the purpose of securing these funds should be demanded from depository banks.

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Formerly, and for a number of years, county and state funds were deposited by the County Treasurer in one of the banks of this County, and this bank furnished security bonds for such deposit in an amount at one time, we understand, of one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars, which was later increased to two hundred and fifty thousand dollars. This bank was solely responsible for these funds and it split up these deposits among the other banks in the County without security bonds running to it for such deposit. This method did not work out in an entirely satisfactory manner. The deposits were later made by the County Treasurer in the various banks of the County in certain proportions determined by this Board, and the various banks gave to the County security, each bank securing its own separate deposit.

Prior to the passage of the so-called Turner Act, being Act No. 22 of 1931, the statutes of Michigan required that all banks acting as depositories of public funds furnish security bonds to secure such deposits, and it was held by the Supreme Court of this State that any deposits in any bank made without such security bond was a preferred claim against such bank, taking preference ahead of ordinary depositors.

In 1931, the so-called Turner Act, Act No. 22, of that year, provided that any bank or trust company designated as the depository of public funds might, in lieu of the required depository bond, deposit in designated places certain securities named in the Act.

At the special session of the legislature in 1932, Act No. 40, known as the Espie Act, was passed, amending the law on this subject and permitting banks or trust companies designated as depositories of public funds to either deposit certain bonds or to segregate such bonds as security for public funds deposited with them under an agreement between the bank and in this case, the County Board of Supervisors; and this law provided further that any law requiring a depository bond from banks or trust companies as to public funds should be suspended until July 1, 1933. After the passage of this Act, and on June 27, 1932, this Board designated certain banks of the County as depositories and by resolution released the security deposited by the bank as security for these deposits. None of these deposits are at present secured.

The questions which naturally arise from this condition are:

1. Are public funds deposited in banks designated by the County Board as depositories a preferred claim against such bank.
2. Under the circumstances existing, is the County Treasurer and his surety liable in any way on these deposits.
3. May the County Board of Supervisors make a new designation as depositories of such banks of the County as it desires and condition that such designation shall take effect when the banks so designated either furnish security bonds or deposit or segregate proper bonds securing such deposits?
5. Is it advisable so to do?

In answer to the first question, your committee is advised that under the present conditions, the funds deposited in the designated banks by the County Treasurer is not a preferred claim against such bank or banks.

In answer to the second question, your committee reports that they are advised that the County Treasurer, and his bondsmen are in no way liable for these deposits.

In answer to the third question, your committee reports that they are advised that the County Board may, if it is deemed best, withdraw the designation of depositories of public funds.

In answer to the fourth question, your committee is advised that it is wholly within the power of the County Board to withdraw its designation of depositories of public funds with such conditions as the Board may see fit and the law permits.

In answer to the fifth question, your committee respectfully reports that that is a matter wholly for the decision of this Board, but it deems it best to give to this Board your committee's judgment on the matter arrived at after much study and thought.

Your committee deemed it best in this matter to have a meeting with the banks of this County and to put up to these banks the whole situation. Every bank in the County of Marquette was represented at this conference.

It developed that the cost of security bonds for an amount required under the Espie Act could not be borne by the banks without losing money on such deposits; in other words, that the deposit of public moneys in such banks would not pay the banks the amount which would have to be paid for such bond and that such cost would be too high to make it a good business proposition for the

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County to stand a reliable bonding company, and of this there is grave doubt.

It appears that it is impossible or practically so to obtain depository bonds from reliable bonding companies today.

It was the unanimous decision of all the banks of the County that it would not be good banking or fair to their general depositors to deposit a part of their assets to secure this or any deposit, and that while they appreciated the deposit of these public funds, if such deposit was made contingent upon making a preference to the possible injury of their other depositors, they would have to decline the deposit.

This position of the banks of the County meets with the unanimous approval of your committee. We are of the opinion that no individual or corporation, public or private, should have any preference as a depositor in any bank beyond that of every single individual depositor in such bank.

The legislature will meet next January and will undoubtedly take some action before the Espie Act, which suspended the operation of the law requiring depository bonds as to public funds, expires, the first day of July, 1933; and until the legislature takes such action, the bankers of this County unanimously stated to your committee that this matter should be allowed to rest as it is.

If this Board concludes that it should withdraw its designation of these banks as depositories and should or should not name depository banks in a new resolution having conditions as suggested above, and the banks do not meet those conditions, then, in the judgment of your committee, the County Treasurer, would be obliged to furnish a security bond covering practically the greatest amount of money which he will have in his possession at any time, and the cost of this bond will amount to a considerable sum of money a much greater sum than the Treasurer's bond now costs the County, if such a bond can be obtained, of which fact your committee is uncertain. The Treasurer must deposit public moneys somewhere. The law does not now require depository bonds. If the expense of depository bonds is prohibitive, as it apparently is, and the banks will not deposit or segregate other securities as security for these public deposits, the present method of handling these funds must in your committee's opinion be continued.

In view of all the conditions, your committee recommends that until further action as to this matter is taken by the legislature, public funds be deposited under existing methods. Your committee further recommends that hereafter the amounts received from the various depositories of public funds as interest upon such deposits be segregated and put into a separate fund to be invested by some officer of the County to be designated by this Board in bonds or securities of the State of Michigan or of the United States of America, such securities or bonds to be safeguarded by such officer and disposed of for the purposes hereinafter named, as this Board may from time to time direct, and with power to invest and re-invest, and to collect and, as this Board may direct, invest dividends and interest received in new and like securities and bonds, which fund shall be known and designated as "Security Fund" and shall be accumulated until the market or cash value of such fund or securities amounts to at least the sum of \$50,000.00, and such fund to be used only to cover uncollectable defalcations, if any, and other uncollectable losses of County moneys. When and as such "Security Fund" exceeds the sum of \$50,000.00, all earnings of such fund in the way of interest or dividends shall immediately be covered into and belong to the general fund of this County. Whenever the market or cash value of such fund shall be less than \$50,000.00, the interest received by the County from depositories of public funds shall be used for investments in like bonds and securities until the said "Security Fund" shall have again reached the sum of \$50,000.00.

Whereas, an examination of the books and records in the office of the Treasurer of Marquette County by State auditors disclosed apparent discrepancies in the books of account of said office; and whereas, a further examination and audit of

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the books and records in said office by the Morrison Audit Company of Marquette, Michigan, established definitely certain shortages in the accounts of said County Treasurer; and whereas, demand has been made upon the Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland, surety on the bond of said County Treasurer, for adjustment of said shortages; and whereas, the said Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland has refused to accept the report of the State auditors heretofore mentioned as the basis for the adjustment of the alleged shortages; and whereas, said Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland has expressed its willingness to accept the audit of the Morrison Audit Company as a basis for the settlement of said alleged shortages, and make payment on a claim certified by the said Morrison Audit Company;

Now, therefore, it is hereby resolved by the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County, that the audit of the Morrison Audit Company be and the same is hereby accepted; and it is further resolved, that the Auditing Committee of said Board of Supervisors be authorized and it is hereby authorized to effect a settlement with the said Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland on the basis of the shortage disclosed by the audit of the said Morrison Audit Company, and in such amount as shall be certified by said Morrison Audit Company.

✓ The following resolution was read and upon motion duly made and seconded unanimously adopted:

Resolved, that this Board earnestly commends the administration of the affairs of the State Highway Department by the Honorable Grover C. Dillman, and that it request the delegates from this County to the coming State Republican Convention to do all they can to secure his re-nomination as State Highway Commissioner.

His conduct of the department has been uniformly fair, judicious and far-seeing, and his services to the State have been too great and too valuable to lose.

Resolved that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Secretary of the Republican State Central Committee.

✓ The following County Officers' Bonds having been examined by the Prosecuting Attorney and found correct were upon motion duly made and seconded unanimously approved: Andrew Lahti, Sheriff; Frank G. ✓ Supervisor Nicholas suggested that lights should be placed on the road to Morgan Heights Sanatorium from the main highway and moved that this be referred to the Morgan Heights Committee. The motion was seconded and unanimously carried.

✓ Supervisor Perkins asked that some action be taken in the matter of turning Marquette County Morgan Heights Sanatorium over to the State of Michigan and moved that the Morgan Heights Committee go into this matter and report back to this Board at its next regular session. Motion was seconded and unanimously carried.

✓ It was moved as the Bonding Company had accepted the Morrison Company's audit for the Treasurer's office that the Auditing Committee, and the Prosecuting Attorney effect a settlement in this matter at their very earliest convenience. Motion was seconded and adopted.

✓ It was moved, supported and carried that the Chair appoint a Committee of three on appraisal of County Insurance. In compliance the Chair appointed Sherwood, Stakel and Stenglein.

✓ A communication from the Marquette City Physician asking that the Board of Supervisors appoint a Dog Warden as provided by statute was read and Dr. Laughbaum being present addressed the Board in this matter. After considerable discussion it was moved and supported that this matter be referred to the Prosecuting Attorney to report back to the next meeting of this Board. Motion was adopted by the following Yea and Nay vote:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors.

The question referred to this Committee by the County Board at its last meeting in November was:

Shall the County of Marquette have an appraisal of its insurable properties made by an accredited appraisal company?

This is purely a question of good business. The total outstanding insurance of the County as furnished us by the County Treasurer is approximately \$854,750.00. This includes about \$41,000.00 of compensation insurance.

It is safe to say that the property owned by the County has a present value of \$900,000.00 or more. This property is, to a large extent in buildings but to some extent in personal property. The County, in its many activities, owns property in various parts of Marquette County, and of different classes, some are residences, some buildings at the fair grounds and at the poor farm, county road buildings and property, Morgan Heights Sanatorium and equipment, and of course the Court House, Jail and Sheriff's residence and their equipment. No person can become familiar with all of these properties in detail and know the value and proper amount of insurance to be put on them without more effort and time spent upon the matter than any supervisor or committee of the Board of Supervisors will exert and spend or could be asked to.

If we should have a fire of more or less extent, there is no one today who

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could testify to and no record from which anyone could learn the exact value of the property injured or destroyed.

We have in various places personal property and there is no inventory of that property kept by anyone who knows and could testify as to its actual present value, and if that property were injured or destroyed, we would be greatly handicapped in obtaining proper adjustment on our insurance. No one connected with the County in any way, and certainly no one who isn't connected with the County, is now able, in case of a dispute with an insurance company, to testify to the actual present worth of the property burned.

There are doubtless many men in Marquette County who could make, as to most of the property, a fair and perhaps an accurate valuation of that property but it is doubtful whether any local man could place a value on the buildings and on the varied personal property owned by the County.

A fire in the court room would destroy much of value, but how much, no one is qualified now to state, nor does anyone know the value of the furnishings of that room or the value of the furnishings of the supervisors' room, or for that matter any of the other offices in this building. With a lack of that knowledge it is impossible for any man to decide what a fair amount of insurance on them amounts to.

An accredited appraisal company is of great assistance to the insured in obtaining, in case of loss, a fair adjustment of the insurance, and in case of fire would well be worth more than the cost of the appraisal. The appraisal company will annually keep up to date this appraisal at an annual expense of about \$120.00, and will furnish, without further cost except actual expenses, in case of loss, expert aid to the County in making the appraisal of the loss and assisting with the adjustment with the insurance company. In this way the County is constantly in possession of the actual replacement value of the property owned by the County.

We have no doubt that an appraisal will show that many changes are advisable in the insurance now carried by the County. In some cases it will show property owned by the County which should be insured that is not now insured. It will show in all likelihood double insurance upon the same property. It will doubtless show properties over-insured, and properties underinsured. What I mean by that is that it will show that we are carrying more insurance on some properties than we can collect in case of total loss, and it will show in other cases that we are carrying less insurance than we should carry on account of the value and risk of the property insured.

Your committee has given the matter close study and is satisfied that if an appraisal is to be made, it will be to the best interest of the County to have that appraisal made by the Lloyd-Thomas Company, appraisal engineers, of Chicago, Illinois, and elsewhere. This company appears to be thoroughly equipped in all ways is an old established company and with long years of accepted appraisals by insurance companies and with a well established reputation for thoroughness and accuracy in its appraisals.

This committee recommends that it, together with the Chairman of this Board, be authorized to enter into a contract with the Lloyd-Thomas Company to make an appraisal of all of the property of the County of Marquette, real and personal, excepting the County Parks, if a contract satisfactory to them can be entered into at a price not to exceed \$1,000.

✓ The following report was read and adopted and in compliance with the request in said report, the Chair appointed the same Committee act as an advisory committee in the matter of insurance:

This committee begs leave to make a further report which it deems should be made to this County.

The method heretofore adopted in Marquette County in effecting insurance on its various property is bound to lack uniformity and to be a hit and miss method.

At present and during the past years, it has been the custom for each department of the County to insure what is wanted to or thought of, as it wanted to and in the amount it wanted to, as to the property under its charge or control. Thus the Court House and Jail have been insured by one branch of the County Government; property under the jurisdiction of the Poor Commission by it; property under jurisdiction of the Parks Committee by that committee; property under the jurisdiction of the County Fair Committee by it; property under the jurisdiction of the County Road Commission by it; and no central place for the keeping of the records of this insurance and no information in any committee of this Board or other place easily available as to the amount of this insurance or the value of the property insured, or whether there was property under the jurisdiction of these various boards and committees not insured.

All of these various policies have been reported to and the premiums paid by

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the County Board of Supervisors, and the policies for the most kept in the County Treasurer's office.

We have had a table made by the Assistant County Treasurer of all the County insurance which is of record in that office. This record shows that there is a total lack of uniformity in policies of insurance taken by the various branches of the County Government, both in the length of time which these policies run and in the times when they expire, and even a difference of rate paid by the County for insuring the same property in different agencies.

This committee recommends to this Board that in the future the matter of insurance on all of the property belonging to the County of Marquette, whether under the jurisdiction of one branch of the County Government or another, be effected or at least be under the advisement of a small committee of this Board consisting of not over three members who can be easily and quickly assembled for meetings when necessary. The present committee on buildings and insurance is altogether too large and too scattered over the County to get together as frequently as is necessary to do this work.

✓ The following report of the Sanatorium Committee was read, after some remarks by a number of the Supervisors, the report was unanimously adopted. The Chairman of this committee stated that the committee wished to extend thanks to Mr. Sherwood for compiling this report. Supervisor Perkins also wished to thank the committee for this complete report and asked that the Legislative Committee be requested to keep in touch with the State relative to the construction of Sanatoriums.

To the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County.

The Committee on Morgan Heights Sanatorium, to whom was referred by this Board the proposition of possible transfer of the institution to the State of Michigan, deems it wise to report to this Board the condition, cost, expenses, operations, etc., of the institutions, and the probable result of a transfer of the institution to the State of Michigan, and to that end begs leave to report:

Your committee has been unable to determine accurately the total amount invested in buildings and equipment of the Sanatorium from the time of its inception. There appears to have been for a number of years no accurate segregated record kept showing the capital expenditures.

Since the beginning of the year 1923, we were able to report that the amount expended on capital investment, that is, on new buildings, repairs, improvements and equipment is \$316,352.00. Previous to 1923 there had been a considerable amount of money expended on capital investment.

It is safe to say that the present capital investment on this plant is \$400,000.00. A part of the buildings and a part of the equipment has become obsolete and can no longer, to any large extent, be considered as assets. These obsolete parts of the plant may be estimated at, roundly, \$25,000.00, leaving a probable net value today, if replaced, of \$375,000.00 capital invested.

There are unpaid outstanding bonds amounting to \$60,000.00.

The total cost of maintenance for the year 1932 was \$69,826.30. There was received from the State \$18,202.00 and from patients, etc., \$2,672.51 or \$20,874.51, making the net cost of operating the institution for the year 1932 \$48,951.79. In these figures we have taken into consideration only the actual cash outlay and cash received.

There was due and still is due from the State of Michigan for the year 1932 \$28,126.00, none of which has been paid. Of the \$20,874.51 credited as receipts from the institution for the year 1932, there was received from the State of Michigan \$18,202.00 due from former years. The State now owes Morgan Heights Sanatorium approximately \$50,000.00. Had the State of Michigan paid what should have been paid to the institution last year, the total net cost for operation would have been \$38,661.79.

The average number of patients in the hospital in 1932 was 79 per day-children 31, adults 48.

The average number of patients in the hospital in 1931 was 83 per day-adults 52, children 31.

The gross cost per patient per day in 1932 was \$2.435.

The net cost per patient per day was \$1.354.

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This amount includes expenditures for all supplies, repairs, medicine, new apparatus, surgical treatments, eyes, ears, nose, etc., lights, heat, power, etc., etc., and for all the things excepting retirement of bonds and interest.

Since the first of July, 1926, there have been treated at Morgan Heights a total of 503 adults--an average of 77 per year. Of this number 168 died, 183 have been discharged with the disease either arrested or cured and are now following their usual occupations, 69 have left the hospital for one reason or another and not discharged and without the disease arrested or cured and who still are either ill or have not been located; 83 are still in the Sanatorium.

As to the Children's Unit--This unit was opened July 1, 1930. There have been treated in this unit since that date 141 children. There were 30 treated in the hospital in 1930, 62 in 1931 and 49 in 1932. Very few of these children stayed in the hospital but a brief time and for one reason or another, chiefly lonesomeness or homesickness, were removed by parent or guardian. It is safe to say, however, that of the balance at least 100 who stayed there until their discharge were sent away with their trouble arrested or cured.

Clinics--Aside from the work done at Morgan Heights, the Superintendent of the institution has conducted many public clinics in the Cities and Townships of the County. There have been at least five of these clinics per month. During that time, between 750 and 800 people have been given a thorough tubercular examination.

All patients discharged from the institution are kept track of and periodically, where it is possible to locate them, are, either at the hospital or these clinics, given an examination and check-up and advice as to what they should do.

Over 600 x-rays of patients have been made at the hospital.

The question is whether it is to the best interest of the people of Marquette County to continue to operate Morgan Heights or, if possible, to turn the institution over to State control and management, and to answer that question intelligently and properly, many things must be considered.

If the County continues to operate Morgan Heights, it can be expected that it will cost the County approximately \$40,000.00 per year for maintenance, if the same amount of assistance is continued to be given by the State. If the State should discontinue its aid, it will add just that much more to the cost of maintenance which must be borne by the County. Without State aid, the cost of maintenance for the year 1932 would have been approximately \$67,000.00. These estimated figures for future cost of maintenance are based upon the cost of materials and supplies necessary for the hospital remaining approximately where they are today. If the cost of these should increase, the cost of maintenance will likewise increase, if the cost of these decreases, the cost of maintenance will decrease.

The State at present pays one dollar per day for the maintenance of all indigent patients at Morgan Heights.

It is for this Board to decide whether it is to the interest of the people of this County to continue to maintain this hospital or to, if possible, transfer the property to the State of Michigan, and your committee deems it best to call the attention of the Board to the probable effect of turning the institution over to the State of Michigan.

State Control--If the State of Michigan assumes control of the institution, Marquette will have the same rights and only the same rights in the Sanatorium that all other counties in the State have. The State today maintains but one tubercular institution and that is located at Howell. It has 407 beds, all filled, and with 60 adults now on the waiting list. There are in that institution 100 patients from the 30 counties north of Roscommon including the Upper Peninsula and 11 from those counties now on the waiting list. Gaining entrance to that institution is a matter of effort and delay. There are in the upper part of Michigan and in the Upper Peninsula 27 Counties which at present have no tubercular hospital. These 27 Counties would have a right to demand admission to this hospital for their tubercular indigent patients, and would have the same right as Marquette. In order to accommodate patients from outside of Marquette County, who would demand and undoubtedly get admission to the hospital, Marquette would have to remove from the hospital many of those now there. It is doubtful whether Marquette could legally or equitably, if this were a state institution, claim admission for more than five or ten of the fifty-two adult patients now in the hospital.

It would be this Board's duty to decide what to do with the 40-odd patients that would have to be removed.

As to the patients left in or later sent to the State institution, the County would be billed for not less than one dollar a day per person for maintenance.

The laws of Michigan declare tuberculosis to be a communicable disease, and compel the various counties to take care of those having the diseases as a protection to the balance of the inhabitants.

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As to the 40-odd patients which in all probability would have to be removed, and such new cases as arise in the future, the County would and will either have to send them to other tubercular hospitals or they would and will have to be provided with a place to live, proper attendants and proper food and medical services and other attendants as is deemed necessary by the various health officers and for which the County will be compelled to pay. What that expense may be, this committee has no means of estimating, but judging from other similar costs to the County, it will be plenty.

As to Children's Unit--No one can say what the State would do with that unit. At Howell, the children's unit has 84 beds, and it is, we are informed, always full, with a waiting list. Morgan Heights can only accommodate about the number that are there now--30 to 35 children. This only takes care of Marquette County children and would not be sufficient to care for them and children from the other 27 counties which would look to this institution for hospitalization for needy children. That would undoubtedly result in the closing of the children's unit or excluding from that unit a large percentage of the children of Marquette County now there and who will be therein the years to come.

It is for this Board to decide whether it is to the interest of the people of this County to have this unit closed or to have it only available for five or at the most ten of the thirty children of Marquette County who ought to be there all the time.

Clinics and Follow-Up--If the State took this institution and followed the same policy in it that it follows at Howell, or generally, there would be one clinic held each year and that would undoubtedly be held at the institution and not in the various townships and cities as they are now held. There would be no follow-up of discharged patients.

Are these clinics and follow-up of discharged patients of value?

Your committee is of the opinion that they are of great value, not only to the patient involved but to all those with whom the patient comes in contact, in detecting immediately the presence of tuberculosis or the renewed activity of the disease, and in the advice of treatment and conduct of the patient, for his benefit and for the benefit of the people at large.

It is, however, for this Board to decide this question.

Relative Cost--It is impossible for this committee to make anything like an accurate estimate of the difference in cost, if any, between the County continuing the Sanatorium and, if the State conducts it, paying the costs of caring for its indigent tubercular patients. Too many factors and possibilities enter into the picture.

If Marquette could have had hospitalization elsewhere for the number of patients cared for at Morgan Heights in 1932, at one dollar a day per patient it would have cost the County for maintenance of the 79, \$28,535.00 and traveling expenses. It cannot, however, be assumed that all would have been taken care of at Sanatoriums. There are not available beds enough. And there would have to be added on to this figure the cost of transportation to whatever hospital they were taken and the added amount which those hospitals would have charged Marquette County.

If we assume the State in control of Morgan Heights in 1932 and taking care of the greatest number which any reasonable man would expect the State to admit from Marquette County into that institution and hospitalization the balance in other institutions, the cost to Marquette County would have been, if we take the average amount which other institutions charge non-resident patients, approximately \$52,000.00 for these patients.

This is almost futile figuring because there could not have been found beds enough in tubercular hospitals in Michigan at these prices to accommodate the patients at Morgan Heights.

It is the opinion of your Committee that any effort to sell or give Morgan Heights Sanatorium to the State of Michigan under present conditions and at this time would be a futile effort. We have made inquiry of the powers-that-be at Lansing and this is our conclusion.

The committee has no recommendation to make, and submits this, its report, for action by the Board, and asks to be discharged from further consideration of the matter.

✓ Supervisor Stakel reported that a communication on tuberculin test for cattle

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from Dr. J. J. Millimaki which was referred to the Agricultural Committee could not be reported on as he was the only member left on that committee and asked the Chairman to appoint two members to fill these vacancies, preferably from the rural districts. In compliance with the request the Chair, appointed Supervisors Anderson and Fassbender, as members of the Agricultural Committee.

Supervisor Stakel moved that in compliance with the report of the budget committee which was adopted by this Board at the Annual Meeting that the Custodian of the County Buildings be named as Purchasing Agent for the Court House and Jail. The motion was seconded and Supervisor Nicholas moved as an amendment that somebody outside of the Court House be named as Purchasing Agent. The vote on the amendment was 17 yes and 20 no. Voting on the original motion was 20 yes and 17 no. The motion being carried, Custodian was appointed County Purchasing Agent.

The reports of the County Treasurer, Superintendents of Poor and Morgan Heights Sanatorium were read and ordered filed.

✓ Supervisor Stakel stated that the newly elected County Treasurer had not filed his bond in compliance with the Statute, he moved that the office be declared vacant, which was seconded and unanimously carried. The committee as provided for under Section 3369 of the Compiled Laws of 1929 made the following appointment:

Whereas, William J. Morrison, the duly elected Treasurer of the County of Marquette, State of Michigan, for the term of office commencing January 1st, 1933 and expiring December 31st, 1934, has refused and neglected to give and re-new his official bond as such County Treasurer and has failed and neglected to deposit his official bond in the manner and within the time prescribed by law and whereas by reason of the foregoing failure to file and deposit such bond as required by law, the said office of Treasurer of Marquette County, Michigan, has become vacant.

Now, therefore the undersigned, Judge of Probate, County Clerk and Prosecuting Attorney of said County of Marquette, State of Michigan, pursuant to Section 3369 Compiled Laws of 1929 of Michigan, do hereby appoint J. E. Hayden of Ishpeming, Michigan, a suitable person to fill such vacancy in said office of Treasurer of Marquette County for the remainder of such unexpired term, namely; until the 31st day of December, A. D. 1934.

Dillman, from Nick Blake and others relative to initiating a State Trunk Line Road running West from Rock and extending from there to Mashek which was referred to the Board of County Road Commissioners and the Committee on Highways and Bridges was considered at a meeting of the Board of County Road Commissioners held on February 2nd, 1933.

This communication or petition covers subject matter which had come to the attention of the Board of County Road Commissioners from the same people and was considered at a meeting of the County Road Commission held on January 3rd, 1933.

At that time the Board of County Road Commissioners referred the matter to G. C. Dillman, State Highway Commissioner and we have had advice from Mr. Dillman that he would look into the project at his early convenience.

The matter of State Trunk Line Highways is under the jurisdiction of the

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of the State Highway Department and not the Board of County Road Commissioners. The writer has therefor been instructed by the Board of County Road Commissioners to report the above status to your Board with the suggestion that the matter be allowed to rest with the State Highway Commissioner and that we do not go to the expense of a joint meeting of the Committee and Commission in the matter unless your Board so directs after receiving the above information.




