## MARQUETTE COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Marquette, Mich., May 17, 1933

Honorable Board of Supervisors, Marquette County, Michigan.

Gentlemen: In accordance with your request of several months ago, I have contacted the Director of the Dental Service of the Michigan Children's Fund, best known as the Couzens Fund, and I am pleased to report that Marquette County is to have a summer Dental Health Unit, starting on June 6 and continuing until September 16. During this time a full-time dentist will be assigned to the township districts of Marquette County, and three or four dental health centers will be established at convenient points in the County for the giving of such dental treatment to indigent boys and girls as may be required. This service will be limited to children of pre-school age and children in the grades from Kindergarten to Eighth. It is necessary to limit the service this summer as stated so that the best results may be obtained.

All Superintendents of Schools in the township districts and teachers in the rural schools have been sent a bulletin on this date, advising them of the establishment of a dental health unit in Marquette County, and requesting them to submit lists of indigent children who need dental attention. I urge the Supervisors of the townships to cooperate in this movement and to make available to me such names of children as in their estimation are indigent and in need of dental care.

In order to carry on this work a Dental Advisory Committee has to be organized. This committee will be organized at a meeting to be held at 3 o'clock, Central Standard Time, on Friday afternoon, May 19, at the Northern Michigan Children's Clinic. Any Supervisor who is interested may attend the meeting, and I suggest that at least a committee of the Board be designated to attend this meeting.

Under the agreement with the Couzens Fund, it will be necessary for the County to provide an assistant for the dentist. The assistant need not be a trained person, but someone who can learn in a short time to make out the necessary cards and forms, and to assist the dentist in the handling of materials and equipment. I trust the Board of Supervisors will see fit to employ someone, and I anticipate such an assistant can be employed for \$7 or \$8 a week. Since the work starts on the 6th day of June, I request that a committee from the Board of Supervisors, with the County Commissioner of schools, be given authority to select an assistant to the dentist who will be assigned to the Marquette County Unit.

I attach herewith a copy of a bulletin sent to the schools today, advising them of the establishment of a Dental Unit.

WHEREAS, in connection with the welfare work now being conducted by the County of Marquette to relieve the necessities of its inhabitants because of the existing financial and industrial conditions the County authorities have made arrangements with the Cleveland-Cliffs Iron Company for the use by the inhabitants of said County of portions of its lands for garden purposes, and for conducting wood-cutting operations on some of said company's lands to furnish wood to the county in supplying the necessities of its people, and arrangements have also been made with the Lake Superior & Ishpeming Railroad Company for the transportation of the individuals so employed in such cutting operations, from their places or residence to the intersection of said railroad company's railroad with the private railroad of the Cleveland-Cliffs Iron Company, and a similar arrangement has been made with the Cleveland-Cliffs Iron Company for the transportation of such individuals from such point of intersection to the locations of said cutting operations and the arrangements with these companies includes the county protecting them against loss or damage on account of death or injuries which may be claimed by persons because of such transportation of such individuals or because of or as a result of such individuals or because of or as a result of such cutting operations and such use of lands for garden purposes,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the County of Marquette does hereby undertake full responsibility for all damage claims of every nature which may be made by any person for death or injuries alleged to have been sustained as a result of or growing out of the said use of said transportation facilities of said Lake Superior & Ishpeming Railroad Company and of said The Cleveland-Cliffs Iron Company, and growing out of or as a result of the said cutting operations and such use of said lands in said wood and garden operations, and also agrees to indemnify said Lake Superior & Ishpeming Railroad Company and said The Cleveland-Cliffs Iron Company from loss and damage on account of all such claims.

Gentlemen:

In the matter of welfare relief by work relief and dole and matters pertaining to R.F.C. allotments and relief grants under the new Federal Administration all of which matters are referred to the Budget and Executive Committee and Board of County Road Commissioners with power to act.

The Federal Emergency Relief Administration took over the administration of relief of destitution from the construction Finance Corporation on May 19th. This change in administration, together with changes going on in Lansing, has created much uncertainty and confusion in proceedings.

In the interim since the last meeting of the Board of Supervisors there have been three joint meetings of the Executive Committee and Board of County Road Commissioners and in the same interim apportionments of R. F. C. funds have been made to Marquette County as follows:

For period May 1 to May 19, the sum of \$40,427.00. This sum was apportioned by joint action as \$15,000.00 for direct relief and the necessary resolutions covering the same providing for the contracts with the State therefore are before your Board for approval at this meeting, the balance \$25,427 to be taken through the State Highway Department for work relief.

For balance of May	
Elected to take through State Highway Dept.	\$4,585.00
Received from the Federal Administration and allocated to Road Commission for work relief	<u>26,000.00</u>
Total to be used for work relief	\$ 30,585.00

No contracts or agreements are necessary on this account.

We have further been advised that one-third of the request for June has been allotted to Marquette County, which would bring in a sum of \$23,207, and on this assurance the Road Commission has been advised to continue work relief until July 1st and directed that \$20,000 of this sum would be credited to the County Road Commission and balance to the Poor Department payable with R. F. D. funds to July 1st.

We recommend approval of the above acts and that the Executive Committee be authorized to continue in this capacity to meet jointly with the Board of County Road Commissioners and with power to act.

Gentlemen:

I am attaching hereto copy of a letter addressed by Colonel James Sinke to the County Treasurer of Marquette County which came into my hands today and pertaining to the \$13,579.37 fund turned over by the State Highway Department to the Welfare Department.

I believe this above amount includes \$8614.50 of money which should have come to us in January and February and which was impounded in the State Highway Department account and which I now believe to be payable to us under our former payroll agreement with the State but for some reason was returned to the Welfare Department instead of being paid to us by the State Highway Department. The balance of the

money represents money in the May allotment which we could have used under our payroll agreement but which was not used due to the interruption of work by State orders which suspended welfare relief road operations between May 12th and 26th and made it impossible to work out this item.

I would recommend that the Board of Supervisors pass a resolution similar to the one for the \$18,000, which is pending before you at this meeting, naming therein a sum (not to exceed \$14,579.37) to cover this letter and would further suggest that the County officers would not immediately apply for the contracts on this until there has been sufficient time to ascertain if we cannot secure the \$8614.50 through our former agreement, making the balance for which we would enter into a contract of \$4,964.87. This \$13,579.37 represents funds which it had been our understanding would be available for road work and to carry on the work performed during the last week of May and during the current month. For that reason I request that the County Treasurer be directed to credit these to the County Road Fund.

I am making suggestion that we pass the resolution in the above matter as these accounts are being closed out in Lansing and we should forthwith complete all necessary agreements.

Gentlemen:

On December 20th, 1932 communication was sent to your Honorable body by the Board of County Road Commissioners covering the apportionment of the money to be received under Horton Act (so called) of the special session of 1932.

At the session of the present Legislature a bill known as the Kulp Bill, being Senate Enrolled Act No. 21, has been passed and given immediate effect, and which abrogates the previous apportionment of money under the Horton Act.

Pursuant to this Senate Bill No. 21, the Board of County Road Commissioners recommend that the moneys, coming to Marquette County under the terms of said Senate Enrolled Act No. 21 of the session of 1933, which amended Act 150 P. A. 1927, as amended, and added to by Act No. 41, first extra session 1932, be allotted apportioned, and used as follows:

This money be used first for the following purposes:

To make payment of interest on the Highway Improvement Bonds for payment due in April 1932, \$9,000 plus the disbursing fees.

To make payment of principal and interest due in October 1933, \$27,000 plus the disbursing fees.

To make payment of interest due in April 1934, \$9,000, plus the disbursing fees.

Those portions of this fund are to be used for the payment of principal and interest in the year 1933 to be deducted from the first settlement received by the County of such so called Horton moneys and before the funds are used for any other purpose. The payment for interest in April 1934 to be deducted from the last settlement for the year 1933 made on account of these funds, this later apportionment of these funds for the interest payment of April 1934 comes due for payment prior to the date on which the first settlement of Horton moneys for the year 1934 is specified in the statutes.

We further request that the County Treasurer be directed to set up such \$36,000 plus disbursing fees from the first Horton money settlement for 1933, and \$9,000 plus disbursing fees from the last Horton money settlement for 1933, in a special fund to be used exclusively for the payment of interest on and the retirement of principal of the County Highway Improvement Bonds.

The Board of County Road Commissioners further recommend that they be authorized to make payment from such Horton funds, aggregating not to exceed \$3,500, to pay for

the plowing of gardens and furnishing of seed fertilizer, etc., as shall be certified by the proper authority appointed by the County Poor Commission.

The Board of County Road Commissioners further recommend that all balances remaining from said funds received in accordance with said above mentioned acts over and above the payments as above set forth be expended for work relief of unemployment by performance of maintenance and improvements on the highways on the County, including the cost of supervision, materials, supplies and equipment operations, and with the specific understanding that these moneys may be used to supplement or work with any funds received from the State or Federal Government for the purpose of work relief of unemployment.

Pursuant to the terms of said Senate Enrolled Act No. 21 the Board of County Road Commissioners request the approval of your body on the above recommendation.

Gentlemen:--Since the last meeting of the County Board your Executive Committee and the County Road Commission have had four joint meetings each at a time when the program for work relief of destitution had reached a point where the funds heretofore received for such purpose had become exhausted and the program was set to be suspended.

During this interval checks for \$12,970.25, \$13,000.00 and \$7,904.23 were received and by action of the Committee the County Treasurer was directed to credit these to the County Road Commission accounts and the money to be used on the work program. The Poor Department had sufficient Federal funds on hand to pay all accounts of that Department, which could be paid from such funds for the month of June, and had a balance as reported to the Committee of such funds of \$569.98 on July 1st.

At our last meeting and after careful consideration of the situation including assurance from the State Administrator and others that the balance of money necessary for July needs would be forth coming, the County Road Commission was directed to continue the work relief program through July.

We recommend approval of these acts and the continuing of these joint meetings, with power to act, as matters for August are not at this time in shape to act upon.

To the Honorable Board of Trustees of Morgan Heights Sanatorium.

We submit the following forecast of expenditures for the period of January 1st to December 31st, 1934. These figures are based on the presumption that the upward trend of prices will not go beyond an average of 10%, although in some lines of merchandise, i. e., cotton goods and flour, we have already experienced up to 50% increase. Food cost forecast has been so obtained by adding 10% to the average monthly expenses of 1933.

The saving of over \$20,000 in net expenditures, as against 1933 forecast, depends on the State of Michigan paying most of the money due since November 1931, amounting to about \$49,000, beside the current State Aid at the rate of 75 cents per day.

Gentlemen: Your Committee on County Parks, with Mr. K. I. Sawyer, Superintendent, and P. B. Spear, Sr., of the County Park Board, inspected the county parks and submit the following report:

**GWINN PARK,**

We found this park is kept in a neat and clean manner, both as to the grounds and buildings. The park is well patronized by the people of Gwinn and Princeton, also by tourists traveling through the Upper Peninsula. The equipment seems ample for present requirements.

The cost of operation for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1932, was \$499.17.

This park comprises approximately 17 acres and is on the banks of the Escanaba River, in the Village of Gwinn.

**CHAMPION BEACH PARK,**

This park system comprises about 270 acres, on both north and south sides of State Highway 28 (U.S. 41), and is fully described in the Committee's report presented at the meeting on June 27, 1932.

The Committee inspected the buildings and camp site at the beach and found same in very good condition and kept neat and clean, and was well patronized on the day of our visit (Thursday, August 10th).

The park north of the railroad track is closed this season for the purpose of economy in expenditures during the depression; however, the fire lines are kept up to provide for emergencies which may arise.

The popularity of the beach is increasing each year, both for bathing and camping. The attendance on July 4, 1933, is recorded as 15,000 persons, with the number of baskets checked at the bath house, 1605. The number of camping parties since July 1st has ranged from 16 to 55. Splendid order prevails throughout the premises and every detail is attended to.

Champion Beach has possibilities for a flower garden featuring native wild flowers, but this will have to be deferred for better times. It must be very gratifying to Dr. Van Riper, who first developed the idea of the Champion bathing beach, to see the success of his enterprise as demonstrated by the attendance from day to day.

The expenditure at Champion Beach and Park for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1932, was \$12,810.98. This includes the labor of clearing and making fire lines.

The estimated expenditure for maintenance of parks and airports for the current year is \$7,500.00 and for improvements, \$6,500.00.

The Supervisors, however, were not unmindful of the fact that certain extra work of the Poor Commission--such as cutting and hauling wood for fuel purposes, and completing garden-plot activities, should be carried to a reasonably successful termination, hence, certain discretionary powers are invested in the Poor Committee, so that in consultation with your Honorable Body, mutually agreeable results may be obtained, and the \$4,000 per year individual salary expenditure may be discontinued as soon as it is consistent with good judgment, and the lessening of emergency needs that is now taking place throughout our County by means of the slow revival of industrial activities.

This communication was received and recommendations approved by your Board.

Work relief projects within reasonable distance of the abode of men needing work relief and on roads under the jurisdiction of the Board of County Road Commissioners are not now available in all parts of the County. For that reason we recommend that the Board of County Road Commissioners be authorized to expend at their discretion not to exceed \$10,000.00 of the money to be applied to work relief and incidental costs in accordance with the recommendations already approved, on roads or other public works within the County which are not distinctly within the jurisdiction of the County Road Commission. Said work to be performed only on streets, roads or public works and with the consent and cooperation of the public body or officials having jurisdiction.

We further recommend that we be authorized to proceed forthwith with work to be paid for from money received under the Horton and Kulp Acts, paying therefor from any moneys now in the hands of the Commission and to reimburse the money to the accounts drawn upon as soon as such Horton-Kulp Act money is received.

Gentlemen:- By action of your Board, the Marquette County Unemployment Committee was created and has been functioning over the past two years in unemployment and relief work.

By legislative enactment there is now created a County Emergency Welfare Relief Committee with statutory powers. Messrs. Jacques, Cowpland and Thomas have been named to this committee and we understand the committee has been organized.

The functions of employment selection on relief work and reports to the state and like matters are now vested in this County Commission. The selection of workmen on federal and state contracts is now performed by the Employment Agent of the United States Department of Labor recently located in the county. There appears no reason for the further continuance of your Unemployment Committee.

A final report of the activities of the County Unemployment Committee is included with the annual report of the Board of County Road Commissioners with which this Committee has co-operated and who have performed all routine and clerical operations of this Committee. This report is a combined report to avoid unnecessary duplication.

We recommend discharge of the Committee.

On behalf of The Board of Supervisors, the members of the Poor Committee join in cordially thanking the Poor Commission for its splended courtesy in arranging to have the committee meet in consultation at their regular meeting, and we feel fully confident that the present discussions will conserve the dignity of all concerned--the many wants of the needy, and benefit, materially the interests of Taxpayers--County, State, and National.

In response, the Chairman of the Poor Commission made known the fact of the Poor Director having resigned his position, said resignation taking effect as of August 31, 1933.

He also stated that the providing of fuel wood for the needy of the County is in the hands of The Marquette County Welfare Relief Commission, and that the Poor Commission is now working in unison with the said Emergency Commission in this matter.

The Poor Committee then raised the question of the advisability of arranging the Poor Commission methods in dispensing County aid, so that a much wider distribution of this business among the Merchants of the County could be realized.

It was mutually agreed that the suggested improvement could take place after intensive study and investigation of operating methods over wide areas. The Poor Commission submitted that the question, as raised, had long been a matter for serious thought, and investigation on their part.

Your Committee is convinced that the Poor Commission will in due time, solve the problems surrounding this question, and as a sequence, the objective point sought will be satisfactorily reached.

The Poor Committee further kindly requested the Poor Commission to furnish them with a list of the names, and salaries paid all employees of said Commission from May 1st, 1933 to Sept. 1st, inclusive. The Commission graciously consented to provide the information asked for, and stated, that in the future it will be made possible for the Supervisors seeking such information to obtain the same at the County Court House office of the Commission.

Your Budget Committee and Executive Committee begs leave to report as follows:

The following report has been compiled after a careful study of the financial condition of the County and its various departments. In some cases increased amounts have been allocated to various accounts to take care of deficiencies from last year's budget. In other cases cuts have been made as the appropriations provided for last year for this year have been more than ample. The necessity of keeping within the six mills allocated to the County by the Marquette County Tax Commission has made it necessary to follow the rigid economy rule of last year's Budget Committee and make some further drastic reductions.

It is interesting to note how closely the County Officers and all the Departments budgeted under the General Fund have kept their various departments within last year's budget. The General Fund Budget for 1932 totaled \$98,360.00; the various County Departments operating under this fund actually spent for the year Aug. 31st, 1932 to Aug. 31st, 1933, \$97,280.00 or actually \$80.00 under the budget. That is really a remarkable showing.

We respectfully make the following recommendations for the coming year.

✓ --Sheriff and Jail--

We recommend that one Deputy on duty at the Jail be dispensed with. Prior to 1927 Marquette County had only two salaried Deputies and now with the State Police located at Marquette and doing much of the work formerly done by the Sheriff's Department, we feel this saving might well be made.

We further recommend that owing to the constantly increasing cost of provisions that the Sheriff's allowance for board of prisoners be raised to 45 cents a day.

We further recommend that the Jail Physician inspect meals of prisoners at least once a month and file written report with the County Clerk.

Because of the recommendation that we do away with one Deputy we further recommend that the two Deputies to be retained be raised from \$120.00 to \$125.00 a month.

We also recommend that the Janitor of the Court House be raised to \$125.00 a month and that he is expected to be at the call of the Sheriff and spend a part of his time taking over the duties of the Deputy to be released.

✓ --County Fair--

No appropriation was included in budget for a County Fair in 1934, but we recommend that the question of having a County Fair be left to the Board of Supervisors next spring. In case it be decided to hold the Fair money may be provided from the Contingency Fund.

COUNTY OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

We recommend that \$900.00 per year be appropriated for extra clerk hire in the

County Treasurer's office. We find that owing to the larger tax delinquency, handling of federal funds and collection of all personal property taxes, that the work of this office has greatly increased and the amount allowed for clerk hire in the past is insufficient.

✓ --County Agricultural Agent--

We recommend that \$300.00 be allowed in the budget to care for part time stenographer in County Agricultural Agent's office.

✓ --County School Commissioner--

We recommend that salary of County School Commissioner's office clerk be raised to \$90.00 a month to be in line with salaries paid in other departments.

--Mileage--

We recommend that the rate paid per mile for county officers be raised from 5 cents to 6 cents owing to the increased cost of running automobiles. We further recommend whereas Marquette City is the seat of county government that the Auditing Committee refuse to allow any expense of county officers in transacting business in Marquette. *see Res. Meeting for correction*

Your Executive Committee to whom was referred the question of adopting a Purchasing Agent, Auditor or County Manager, respectfully reports that they have no report to make at this time and desire more time for consideration.





✓ Mr. M. J. Sherwood addressed the Board on the question of interest for County funds. Also a letter was read from the Miners' National Bank of Ishpeming covering the same. This matter, upon motion, was referred to the Budget Committee and the Prosecuting Attorney.

✓ A communication from Mr. P. W. Phelps, President of St. Luke's Hospital, stated that this hospital was prepared to qualify as an improved hospital under the Afflicted Children's Act of Michigan, as amended by Act 248 of 1933, and presented an agreement to be executed in compliance with the above named statute. Probate Judge Potter and Dr. Van Riper spoke in favor of the proposed arrangement and it was moved and supported that the contract be entered into with this hospital and such other hospitals that qualify under this statute and that the agreement be signed by the Chairman and Clerk of this Board and the Judge of Probate of this County, when the same has been approved by the Prosecuting Attorney. The motion was unanimously carried.

#### REPORT ON REJECTED TAXES

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors,  
Marquette County, Michigan.

Gentlemen:-Your Committee on Finance and Taxation, to whom was referred the questions

of Rejected Taxes and who are asked to make recommendations that would eliminate the rejection of these taxes each year, beg leave to report as follows:

In order to get a picture of what has been happening the past few years it may be interesting to know that the total of the State and County Rejected Taxes, which averaged about \$1200.00 a year prior to 1931, increased to \$2665.00 in 1931 and the Rejected State and County Taxes this year have now reached a total of \$5524.05. Naturally as tax delinquency has increased from 4.08% in 1928, followed by 4.66% in 1929, 5.40% in 1930, 6.86% in 1931 and 9.2% in 1932 your Rejected Taxes will also increase proportionately, assuming that the number of errors in description and in transcribing the records remain proportionately the same.

In order to eliminate errors as far as possible and to reduce the number of delinquent descriptions rejected, we make the following recommendations:

Assessing officers and individuals writing up assessment rolls should make a plat of their township showing the forties in each section and the forties in these sections should be checked off one by one on the assessment roll. By checking off each forty at a time on a map you will eliminate duplication of descriptions and will also avoid errors in omitting forties, section numbers, town, range, etc.

After the assessment roll has been completed and checked, the tax roll, which should be an exact copy of the assessment roll, should be checked by two persons, the one reading the assessment roll and the other the tax roll description by description. An assessment and tax roll containing a great number of descriptions described by metes and bounds—that is, those rolls having a large number of irregular shaped parcels—should have these metes and bounds descriptions printed or typewritten in duplicate, thereby eliminating the possibility of errors.

When the taxes are being paid to the Treasurer or Deputy Treasurer if the name of the owner of the description is known to be in error by the tax collecting officer the tax roll should be corrected and before the tax roll is sent to the County Treasurer's office the assessment roll for that year should be corrected to agree with the tax roll.

When the list of descriptions on which the taxes are delinquent for the year is returned by the City or Township Treasurer or Deputy Treasurer to the County Treasurer, said list should be carefully checked with the tax roll in the County Treasurer's office to avoid errors. It is obvious from the number of descriptions rejected by the Auditor General that this practice was not followed in 1932 because in many cases the delinquent tax list on file in the County Treasurer's office does not agree with the descriptions on the tax roll from which the delinquent list was copied.

When the delinquent tax list for the Auditor General's office has been completed in the County Treasurer's office that list should be carefully checked by two clerks, one from the County Clerk's office and one from the Treasurer's office. If the original furnished by the various City and Township Treasurers or Deputy Treasurers is checked with the duplicate that is sent to the Auditor General's office, many of the errors on the 1931 roll will be eliminated. We find that in past years there have been some errors undoubtedly due to faulty checking or lack of checking in the Court House.

We also suggest that every tax roll be checked with the records in the Register of Deeds' office once every two or three years in order to keep the tax rolls up to date.

Not all the Rejected Taxes are due to errors made in Marquette County. We find on investigation, for instance, that in Humboldt Township the Auditor General's office is in error returning certain lands in this township as rejected as State homestead lands, when as a matter of fact the owners of these descriptions have warranty deeds from the State Conservation Department. These lands were returned to the State a number of years ago because of the taxes being delinquent and the State then turned them over to the Conservation Department and the Conservation Department in turn sold them to individuals. Apparently some of the records in the Auditor General's office have not been kept up to date.

We find most of the descriptions that have been returned delinquent and then subsequently are rejected because of indefinite descriptions; because acres or descriptions are wrong; because they are twice returned; because they are partly Government lots; because exceptions are indefinite; because descriptions are erroneous; because captions are incomplete; because some of these are Government or State lands; because some are Homestead lands; because no sections are given; because starting points are erroneous; because there are no plats of record; etc. The indefinite or incomplete descriptions usually are irregular shaped parcels and the metes and bounds descriptions are not clearly defined, the starting point may be indefinite, or there are errors in the footage or courses mentioned. Descriptions marked twice returned mean that due to an error on the part of the Treasurer or Deputy Treasurer or County Treasurer's office that the same forty is returned delinquent carrying two different owners. For instance, John Smith, who is actually the owner of the NE $\frac{1}{4}$  of the NW $\frac{1}{4}$  of a certain section is returned delinquent as the NW $\frac{1}{4}$  of the NW $\frac{1}{4}$ . John Jones is the owner of the W $\frac{1}{2}$  of the NW $\frac{1}{4}$  of the same section which is also returned delinquent. The W $\frac{1}{2}$  of the NW $\frac{1}{4}$  includes the NW $\frac{1}{4}$  of the NW $\frac{1}{4}$ , therefore the NW $\frac{1}{4}$  of the NW $\frac{1}{4}$  has been returned twice and has two different ownerships.

In some cases descriptions are rejected because exceptions are indefinite as, for instance, a person is indicated as owning all of a forty acre tract except one acre in the Southeast corner. That description is rejected because it does not properly identify the land and it is not sufficient to say one acre plot in the Southeast corner of a section, but it would suffice if you describe the one acre plot as being square and that two of the boundary lines are contiguous with the sectional lines. That ties the one acre parcel definitely in the extreme Southeast corner and properly identifies the land.

In some cases rejections are due to incomplete captions as, for instance, a lot may be described as being in a certain block in the Jackson Iron Company's Addition in a certain town, when the caption should read Lot 2 in Block 10 in the AMENDED Plat of the Jackson Iron Company's Addition to the City of Negaunee. The Auditor General will also reject a description if a lot is described as being in Harvey's Plat, when it should read A Part of Harvey's Plat.

In the case where there is more than one addition to a City or Village it is necessary to mention not only the name of the Addition, but also the number, as, for instance, the Cleveland Iron Co.'s First Addition, Cleveland Iron Co.'s Second Addition, Cleveland Iron Co.'s Third Addition, etc. There are also certain cases where new additions have been platted and surveys made by competent engineers, but the plats have not been recorded in the Register of Deeds' office and, of course, no copies sent to the Auditor General's office. In those cases the Auditor General will reject the descriptions, but if the description is marked, "unrecorded plat as on file in the City Clerk's office," that properly identifies the land and the description cannot be rejected.

In order to sum the entire proposition up in a few words, there are only two things necessary to prevent taxes being rejected, one is that all descriptions must properly identify the land, and secondly all errors in copying and transcribing must be eliminated by checking. If those two things are done, we can hold our rejected tax list down to a very small amount.

✓ The following report of the Contact Committee of the Morgan Heights Sanatorium was read, and upon motion of Supervisor Dolf, seconded by Supervisor McNamara, the report was unanimously adopted:

Mr. Chairman:--

Your contact committee which was appointed to work with the board of trustees of Morgan Heights Sanatorium attended a meeting of the board at the Sanatorium on January 16th and we are pleased to report as follows:

Mr. Collins stated that the object of the meeting was to have an informal discussion of the affairs of the institution and to acquaint the board of supervisors with the work of the trustees and also as to their recent accomplishments. He said it was the intention of the trustees to keep the board informed as intimately as possible in regard to their work and supervision of the sanatorium. Mr. Collins also said that it would be the aim of the trustees to have the sanatorium function not only for the greatest benefit to the patients, but that there will always be a kindly feeling throughout the County toward the institution.

The trustees expressed themselves as being well pleased with the accounting system in use, with the exception of the manner in which the drawing of checks is handled. As that part of the work is now being done, all checks are drawn by one of the deputies in the County Clerk's office. Payroll checks are drawn twice each month. The sanatorium checks number approximately two hundred fifty per month and the deputy draws a total of approximately seven hundred fifty checks each month, which work requires about half of her time. As the County Clerk's office is overcrowded with its many duties it would be relieved considerably if the drawing of the Sanatorium checks could be done by the clerk at the Sanatorium office. The deputy receives \$7.50 per month for drawing the Sanatorium checks. The trustees feel that in handling the work thru the Sanatorium office they would be in closer contact with the business and it would expedite matters considerably, and informed your committee that their clerk would do the work at an expense of \$5.00 per month more than he is now receiving.

As stated by the trustees, the statute governing the operation of sanatoriums gives the board of trustees full authority to elect one of their members treasurer and to make all disbursements. However, they would like to have the board of supervisors authorize them to do so.

As to recent accomplishments at the Sanatorium, one was the brushing out of the grounds surrounding the buildings which was done as a CWA project and which has greatly improved the appearance of the property.

Another CWA project was the employment of a seamstress and Dr. Lojacono informed your committee that she has done wonderfully fine work.

The trustees have several other projects in mind which they hope to have completed thru the C.W.A. One is the building of a driveway around to the West of the Sanatorium and out to the main highway, which would be a great convenience in driving from the grounds, especially for large buses and trucks, as there is not sufficient space in the present parking place for turning around.

January 24, 1934

Another project the board has in mind is the decorating of the interior of the children's unit. The walls, with the exception of one or two rooms, have not been decorated and are very much discolored. The proposed work would very much improve the appearance of the property.

The board is hopeful of having an ornamental archway constructed over the roadway at the entrance to the grounds. This would be located in a short distance from the main highway.

The matter of having a road built from the Sanatorium in a northwesterly direction to connect with the concrete highway has been considered, but as it would be an expensive piece of work the board is doubtful that it can be done. These projects, if completed, would all be done under C.W.A.

The trustees stated that they were very hopeful that the Sanatorium would operate within the budget this year. The one item of uncertainty as to cost is that of food.

Your committee was very favorably impressed by the attitude of the board of trustees and Dr. Lojacono as to the welfare of the institution and we feel that the county should be congratulated upon having such an eminently capable organization supervising the operations of Morgan Heights Sanatorium.

✓ The following report of Supervisor Stakel, who was a special committee of one, was read and ordered filed:

MEMORANDUM OF MATTERS PERTAINING TO THE  
CLINTON J. LIBBY CASE

The Prosecuting Attorney and myself contacted Thomas Clancey, former Prosecuting Attorney, Capt. F. E. Keese, former Chairman of the Board, Clinton J. Libby, Andrew Lahti, Sheriff, and Frank G. Jenks, County Clerk.

Mr. Libby, who was hired by Samuel Ford, former Sheriff, as motorcycle policeman, was hurt on June 17th, 1924 when he collided with a D.S.S. & A. locomotive. After being laid up for a considerable length of time in St. Luke's hospital he was released and in view of the fact that he was employed by the County when he was hurt and because of the fact that with the completion of the new jail an additional man was needed in the Sheriff's department, the Sheriff was prevailed upon to employ Mr. Libby as night watchman. From the day of injury up until the time that Mr. Libby accepted a lump settlement he received compensation at the rate of \$14.00 a week. On March 23rd, 1925 Mr. Clancey, Prosecuting Attorney, drew up an agreement with Mr. Libby, wherein the latter accepted \$1,000.00 as a settlement in full for all damage claims against the County. The Board of Supervisors on the 25th day of March unanimously approved of this settlement.

Mr. Clancey confirms Mr. Libby's statement that because of the fact that he was hurt while in the employ of the County that the County provided a watchman's job for him in addition to the lump sum settlement, but Mr. Clancey insists that there was neither any oral nor written agreement that this job was to continue indefinitely.

Upon contacting the present Sheriff, Andrew Lahti, he informed the Prosecutor and myself that when he took office on Jan. 1st, 1929 that he was told by someone that if he did make any changes in the personnel at the jail that he should not disturb Mr. Libby. For that reason the Sheriff allowed Mr. Libby to remain, but did appoint Mr. Costella as turnkey. The Sheriff further stated that he had absolutely no fault to find with Mr. Libby's work and that the latter performed his duties faithfully and efficiently, and when the Sheriff was asked to reduce his force by one man he let Mr. Libby out, not because of the fact that his services were not satisfactory, but merely to accede to the wishes of the Board to reduce his staff by one man.

Capt. F. E. Keese, the former Chairman of this Board, was very positive in his statement that there never had been any gentlemen's agreement about Mr. Libby holding the job as watchman indefinitely at the time he was appointed. He merely confirms what has already been said that due to the fact that Libby was hurt and was so injured as to make it impossible for him to get a suitable job for making his livelihood that because of this injury that he agreed that Mr. Libby be given the job at the jail. He was fully qualified and able to do the work required despite his injuries. Mr. Libby also told us that he had not talked very much about this with Capt. Keese and that the Chairman of the Board had not offered him a permanent job, Libby insisting that most of his contracts were with the Prosecuting Attorney and the County Clerk. Upon questioning Mr. Libby he sticks to the statement that when he was hired as watchman in 1925 that he was given to understand by the Prosecuting Attorney particularly, that he could hold the job as long as his services were satisfactory. He admits that there never was any written agreement to that effect, everything having been done orally. He further is in agreement with the statement that he accepted the lump sum settlement to be a complete and full compensation for all injuries that he sustained. He insists, however, that he was promised his job indefinitely.

There are certain facts that should be made clear to this Board and one is that in the opinion of the Prosecutor no county official can obligate the Sheriff or the County Board to keep any one indefinitely on the County officers' payroll. Furthermore, it must be clearly understood that the Sheriff is the sole judge as to whom his deputies shall be. In other words, he alone has the right to appoint the turnkey and watchman.

January 24, 1934

The County Board merely provides the salaries, but cannot choose the personnel. When Samuel Ford appointed Mr. Libby as watchman he did that to cooperate with the Prosecutor, but this Board cannot dictate to Mr. Lahti whom he shall employ as watchman. However, that does not prevent this Board from making suggestions to the Sheriff and he would undoubtedly cooperate to any reasonable extent.

This Committee does not presume to make any recommendations, but is merely reporting the facts as they found them. To sum it all up in a few words, it would appear that there was a gentlemen's agreement to give Mr. Libby a job in 1925 and the said gentlemen's agreement was continued by Mr. Lahti in 1929 when he was asked by someone, whom it was he does not recall, to continue to employ Mr. Libby. We cannot find anything relative to a life-long agreement and we are glad to state that we also can find nothing wrong with Mr. Libby's record in the eight years that he was employed. Furthermore, the Sheriff in letting out Mr. Libby merely did what the Board ordered him to do and that was to reduce the staff by one person.

The reports of County Treasurer, Superintendents of the Poor, Morgan Heights Sanatorium, County Jail Physician and Inspectors of Jail were read in part and ordered filed.)

✓ The following resolution was read:

C. E. Dolf offered the following resolution and moved its adoption:  
WHEREAS, it has heretofore been declared to be the sense of this Board of Supervisors that the insurance on the County property hereafter be allocated among the various established insurance agencies of Marquette County in a more equitable manner than the same has heretofore been allocated; and

WHEREAS, insurance to the amount of \$46,000.00 is about to expire on the Morgan Heights Sanatorium;

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It Resolved that the Committee on Insurance and Grounds be and it is hereby directed to cause the said insurance on Morgan Heights Sanatorium to be allocated equally to several other established agencies in the County, who have little or none of the County insurance business; in accordance with the declared policy of this Board.

John McNamara seconded the foregoing resolution.

It was moved by Supervisor Dolf and seconded by Supervisor McNamara, that the resolution as read be adopted. Supervisor Stenglein stated that he expected to have the report on Insurance ready for the February meeting. The mover of the resolution agreed to this and the resolution was unanimously adopted with that understanding.

✓ Superintendent of the Poor, G. R. Jackson, presented estimates for the proposed Men's Dormitory at the County building, showing the total estimated cost to be \$48,983.43. On a C.W.A. project the cost to the County would be \$18,956.43. It was suggested by Supervisor Ewing that this be held up until we see what effect the Old Age Pension Law will have on attendance at the County House. On motion duly made and seconded, Mr. Jackson was instructed to petition the C.W.A. for this project and if adopted by that Board, the Superintendents of the Poor be allowed the sum of not over \$19,000, to be appropriated from the General Fund of the County monies not otherwise appropriated, which was adopted by the following Yea and Nay vote:

✓ Supervisor Stakel reported that the Auditors had discovered the Treasurer's office had been paying monies to the State that should have been retained by the County. The exact amount would show in the Auditors' report which will be submitted at the February meeting. He also stated that a portion of this amount would take care of the proposed construction of the Men's Dormitory as a C.W.A. project, at the Poor Farm.

✓ Supervisor Nicholas inquired if any of this tax money belonged to the Townships, and moved that Supervisor Stakel be appointed a Committee to look into the matter of money due from the State and report to the Board if any of it should be credited to the Townships. Motion was seconded and carried.

✓ It was moved by Supervisor Stakel that there be appropriated out of the contingency fund of this County \$4,000.00 that have not otherwise been appropriated for the purpose of holding a County Fair in Marquette this year. The motion was duly seconded and carried by the following Yea and Nay vote:

✓ A communication from the Lloyd-Thomas Co., Appraisal Engineers, asking for a report on any changes in this County, so that they could bring their Appraisal Report up to date, was read and the Chairman of the Committee on Insurance and the Clerk of this Board were instructed to forward this information.

✓ A communication from Dr. Lojacono, Superintendent of Morgan Heights Sanatorium, relative to operations for afflicted and crippled children, was upon motion referred to the Board of Trustees of Morgan Heights Sanatorium.

✓ A communication from J. E. Hayden, County Treasurer, which was presented to the Board at their January meeting, covering the 1926 tax on the West 50 ft. of Lot 21, Block 2 and West 50 ft. of North 27 ft. of Lot 22, Block 2, Cleveland Iron Mining Co.'s Sub-division to City of Marquette, which was referred to the Prosecuting Attorney who reports back that he recommends that this Board authorize the Treasurer to transfer \$29.95 from the General Fund to wipe out this account. ✓The Budget and Salary Committee presented a report on salaries and after discussion, upon motion of Supervisor Nicholas, this report was ordered held over until the next meeting of this Board.

✓The following report was read and upon motion duly made and seconded, was unanimously adopted and a vote of thanks extended to the Committee for their excellent report and work in this matter.

Marquette, Mich., Feb. 17, 1934.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors,  
Marquette County, Michigan.

Gentlemen:-- Your Committee on Buildings, Grounds and Insurance beg leave to submit the following report:

On August 2, 1933, we began to make an inspection of the property belonging to the County. At Ishpeming we inspected the County Road property, which we found in first class condition and well cared for, with the exception of the ventilating stack on the office, which needed repairs. Superintendent Sawyer assured the committee this would be taken care of at once. The committee wishes to recommend that "No Smoking" signs be placed outside and inside the oil house as a precaution against fire. The Road Commission property has been insured at 90 per cent co-insurance according to the Lloyd Thomas appraisal, but on the contents we have taken Superintendent Sawyer's figures, and these will fluctuate from time to time according to the work in progress. The Committee has not taken into consideration compensation insurance or insurance on cars and trucks. This is open to competition and the difference in bids and the saving which the Road Commission has effected is surprising. Your Committee recommends that no change be made. The new set-up shows a very substantial reduction in premiums with little reduction in insurance. A great deal of credit must be given to Superintendent Sawyer for the splendid condition of this property.

We next visited the Champion Beach property and found it in excellent condition--neat, clean, sanitary, and the caretaker efficient. Superintendent Sawyer accompanied us on this trip and made arrangements for our lunch. The Committee recommended a cut in the insurance carried on this property, which is shown in the schedule herewith attached.

We next visited Morgan Heights Sanatorium. The Superintendent being absent, the Assistant Doctor assigned a young man to conduct us through the various buildings and the grounds. We regret to report that the yard and out-buildings were not in very good condition. The boiler house is badly in need of paint, both the boiler room proper and where the men are housed. A good cleaning and a little paint we believe would make the conditions more sanitary and inviting. The cow barn and horse barn, now used for storage, could be improved greatly by cleaning and an orderly method of storing the discarded equipment employed. We note that the buildings themselves are surrounded by a second growth of forest which reaches close to the buildings, constituting a great fire hazard. We recommend that this second growth be cut back to at least 75 feet from the buildings, and the ground around the buildings be plowed and seeded. We believe these suggested improvements should be made in and about the boiler house and the barns in order to have these buildings in a sanitary condition and in keeping with the rest of the County property. We found the main building and the Children's Unit at Morgan Heights in excellent conditions. We have recommended \$14,000.00 additional insurance on the buildings and property at Morgan Heights, but through a lower rate which we have secured we have effected a saving in premium as shown by the schedule.

On August 3 your Committee met at the Fair Grounds for an inspection of this property. We found the buildings to be in a good state of repair and everything orderly for property of this nature, with the caretaker on the job. The Committee, however, recommends that at the close of the County Fair each fall all buildings be carefully cleaned, and that all rubbish such as accumulates during a Fair period be collected and burned so as to reduce the fire hazard. The Committee also recommends a cut in the insurance carried on this group which will appear in the schedule.

February 28, 1934

We next visited the Court House group and, needless to say and as your Honorably Body already know, the conditions here were excellent. County Clerk Jenks is always on the job looking after every detail in order to keep conditions at their best. In our schedule we will show an increase of insurance for this group at a saving in premium.

Our last visit was at the County Infirmary where we took dinner which was very kindly provided by Mr. and Mrs. Morrison, caretakers in charge. The Committee were greatly pleased and highly satisfied with the excellent condition in which this property is kept and also with the splendid manner in which the old and unfortunate inmates are care for. We cannot speak too highly of Mr. and Mrs. Morrison. Your Committee recommends no change in the insurance set-up for this group.

Your committee recommends that the allocation of insurance be done at once and the insurance to be rewritten on terms of one-third for one year, one-third for two years and one-third for three years, and renewable on a three-year basis thereafter, providing however the companies will agree to give the County credit on a prorated basis for the unexpired term of all policies, the new set-up to be put in force on April 1st or as soon as possible thereafter.

We also recommend that the Treasurer get up and have made an expiration record for listing insurance policies which will show the policies expiring without looking up the policies.

By way of summary, permit me to say this was probably the first inspection ever made of County buildings by the Buildings, Grounds and Insurance Committee. We recommend that this inspection be made an annual practice. It will serve two good purposes: (1) Through this inspection and the report which our Committee makes to the entire Board, a better knowledge of the condition of the property will be gained; and (2) the fact that an inspection by our Committee is looked forward to as an annual affair will put our caretakers and others in charge of property "on their toes" to keep them at their best. The total amount of insurance carried on County buildings and contents in this new set-up amounts to \$585,035.00, with a premium of \$8,102.54 for a three-year period, which shows a yearly saving of \$994.28.
