




BOARD OF COUNTY ROAD COMMISSIONERS.

Ishpeming, Mich., March 20, 1934.

Honorable Board of Supervisors,  
Marquette County, Michigan.

Gentlemen:- Relative to disposition of the automobile weight tax and gasoline tax money returnable for the calendar year 1934, to Marquette County and in conformity to Senate Enrolled Acts Numbers 3 and 4 of Extra Session of Legislature 1934, your Board of County Road Commissioners recommend:

Pursuant to such act, one half of each settlement on account of above mentioned monies is to be credited to the County Road Fund to be used for administration, maintenance, betterments and construction of County Roads.

Further, pursuant to such act, that the remaining, hereafter called second, one half of the money returned to Marquette County as aforesaid, be applied as follows and in the following order of priority:

1st. The sum of \$36,783.17 from the second half of these monies is to be credited to the Highway Bond Retirement Fund to pay principal, interest and dispersing fees on County Highway Bonds inclusive of the April 1935 interest payment which comes due prior to receipt of first automotive revenues for 1935.

2nd. The difference between the second half of such money and the amount to be credited to the Highway Bond Retirement Fund is then to be divided as follows:

(a) One half of the difference mentioned in 2nd priority immediately above is to be credited to the County Road Fund and used for maintenance of County Roads adopted in conformity to Act 130 P.A., 1931.

(b) The remaining half of the difference mentioned in the 2nd priority immediately above to be divided as follows:

To be paid to Marquette City-----	33.553%
To be paid Negaunee City-----	14.865%
To be paid Ishpeming City-----	20.959%
To be credited to County Road Fund-----	30.623%

100.000%

The money credited to the County Roads to be used for administration, maintenance and improvements of County Roads in conformity to the acts before mentioned.

The money to be paid to the cities to be used by them strictly in conformity to the acts above mentioned.

Gentlemen:- With reference to the petition of Louis Pilon and others relative to plowing the road from Northland towards Rock.

This petition, together with petitions for nineteen other roads, was considered at a meeting of the Board of County Road Commissioners held on March 20th.

In the instance of one petition where a school bus route was affected, the County Road Commission has granted the request to plow approximately one and a half miles of road, and in the instance where certain logging operations were affected, we have granted the request to open up the road as a temporary measure. In the remaining instances the County Road Commission felt that they were not financially in a position to grant the requests and for that reason the petition referred to should be denied.

✓The following report of the Budget and Salary Committee, which was laid over from the February meeting, was read. It was moved by Supervisor VanRiper that the report be adopted. Motion was seconded by Supervisor Richards. As an amendment it was moved by Supervisor Nicholas, supported by Supervisor Tousignant, that the report be tabled, which was unanimously carried:

To the Honorable Chairman and Board of Supervisors of Marquette County:

We, the undersigned members of the Budget and Salary Committee, make the following recommendations to the Board of Supervisors:

Whereas the Board of Supervisors on October 12th, 1931 asked the various county officers to accept a voluntary 10% reduction in salaries for the year 1932 regardless of the fact that their salaries for 1932 were fixed at the annual meeting of the Board of Supervisors held in October 1930 and furthermore in view of the fact that the following resolution was passed on October 10th, 1932, to-wit:

"It is further hereby resolved, that in the event business and industrial conditions improve and become normal prior to the expiration of the next ensuing two year period commencing January 1st, 1933, that the said county officers and all other salaried county officers whose salaries were reduced ten per cent for the year 1932 and who were paid ten per cent less than the salary fixed for said county officers for their terms of office, respectively, at the annual meeting of the Board of Supervisors held in the month of October 1930, prior to the commencement of the term of said officers, shall be reimbursed for the amount of such reduction and paid said amount out of the general fund in the treasury of the county."

We therefor recommend at this time that the elective county officers be reimbursed for the ten per cent cut voluntarily accepted for the year 1932 and that the same be paid back at the rate of ten per cent per month in monthly payments for 1934 over and above the amounts set by this Board of Supervisors at the annual meeting held on October 10th, 1932.

We further recommend that a ten per cent increase in wages be granted to the rest of the personnel attached to the county officers payroll, the increase to take effect January 1st, 1934.

We also recommend further that the request of the Judge of Probate be granted and that his salary be restored to the amount provided for under the statutes of the State of Michigan, beginning January 1, 1934.

We also recommend that the members of the Board of Supervisors be paid the legal amount fixed by statute, that is, \$4.00 a day and 10 cents a mile, this to take effect from January 1, 1934.





✓ A petition that the County take over and improve as a County Highway the following: Commencing at the center of section 18, town 47 north, range 24 west (near the Fish Hatchery); thence West one-half mile to town line; thence south one-half mile on town line to County Highway No. 480, was received from William and Pat Ford. It was moved by Supervisor Yungbluth that this be referred to the County Road Commission, supported by Supervisor Anderson and unanimously adopted.

✓ A petition from Oliver A. Hall and thirty-five other petitioners asking that completion of that portion of State Road M-35 located in Powell Township and connecting the finished portion of said road now extending to Salmon Trout River with that finished portion near Skanee, was read, and upon motion of Supervisor Nightingale, supported by Supervisor Richards, referred to the County Highway and Bridges Committee and the County Road Commission.

✓ The Clerk presented the following report on bounties paid from October 10, 1933 to April 25, 1934:

202 Coyotes, 33 Coyote Pups, 76 Wildcats, 7 Wolves and 2 Lynx, with a small amount for supplies, making the total expenditure up to date \$2,218.08.

✓ A communication and a form of a resolution was received from the Marquette Ministerial Association asking that this Board pass a resolution prohibiting Marathon Dances, Walkathons, Skatathons and contests of like or similar nature. Upon motion of Supervisor Stakel and supported by Supervisor Richards, this matter was referred to the Prosecuting Attorney to report later in the day.

✓ Supervisor Stakel, at the request of the Commissioner of Schools, informed the Board that Marquette County can again have a Couzens Dental Clinic the same as last year for a period of twelve weeks, if Marquette County will furnish the clerical help. It was moved by Supervisor Nicholas that the County Commissioner of Schools be empowered to employ clerical help for the necessary twelve weeks for this Dental Clinic at the E.R.A. rate of \$16.00 per week. The motion was seconded by Supervisor Van Riper and carried by the following Yea and Nay vote:

✓ A resolution from the Supervisors of Wayne County urging this Board to support any legislation that will transfer all costs for the care and treatment of tuberculosis to the State as a whole, was upon motion of Supervisor Wiseman, supported by Supervisor Frei, referred to the Trustees of the Morgan Heights Sanatorium.

Gentlemen:-Your County Committee on Education, to which was referred the matter of studying the possibility of establishing a County Library, met on Monday, April 9, with the School Commissioner, and discussed the situation at some length.

The Committee requests that additional time be given for a more complete study of the County Library plan, since the matters of costs, contracts, services, and operation require further study on the part of your Committee, and an effort will be made to submit a detailed report, possibly at the June meeting.

The Committee recommends firstly, that the services of the present CWA librarian be extended through the month of May, and that Miss Zona Kemp be designated as County Librarian for the period beginning May 1st and ending May 31st.

✓ Prosecuting Attorney Lott, in reporting on the request of the Marquette Ministerial Association, stated that this was not a matter for the County Board but should be acted upon by the several cities and townships separately, the County having no jurisdiction in the matter. Whereas, Under private ownership and operation of electric power facilities, such a high level of rates has generally prevailed as to impose an unnecessarily high burden on the great mass of the citizens, and add an unwarranted additional manufacturing cost to the problems of industry, which in turn is reflected in higher commodity costs to the general public, and

Whereas, Reports from communities in other parts of the Country, which own and operate their own electric power plants, indicate that they are able to supply electric current to the citizens of their respective localities at a greatly reduced cost, compared with the conditions which obtained formerly under private ownership and operation, and

Whereas, A bill was introduced at the recent special session of the State Legislature to permit public ownership and operation of electric power plants by counties of this State which failed of passage at that time, and

Whereas, In the opinion of this Board, the unfavorable action of the State Legislature was a direct dereliction of duty, opposed to the best interests of the people, and contrary to the expressed will of numerous counties through the State, as evidenced by resolutions constantly being received from many different quarters; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Supervisors of the County of Wayne, that it is heartily in favor of the passage of some legislation permitting counties of this State to own and operate electric power plants, and further be it

Resolved, That this Board join with the Boards of Supervisors of other counties of the State of Michigan in actively promoting the early resubmission and passage of such a measure, and further be it

Resolved, that the Clerk be, and hereby is, instructed to send a copy of this resolution to the Governor of the State, the members of the Wayne County legislative delegation, and the Boards of Supervisors of all the other counties of the State of Michigan.

Gentlemen:--Pursuant to the order of the Chairman of the Executive Committee, the members of the Poor Contact Committee met with Supervisor Patient, the Chairman and special Investigator of the Poor Commission, at the County Poor Office in the City of Ishpeming on May 17, 1934, to consider certain charges made by the Wells Township Supervisor relative to the supposed duties of the Poor Commission, and its staff of employees.

If the complaints, as voiced, were confined to the disposition of County money in straight indigent cases, it would appear that considerable effort has

been made to care for Wells Township in much the same manner as other Townships in the County are handled.

It is generally understood that, in Marquette, "like other Counties of the Upper Peninsula," it would be impossible to provide work, and other relief, essential to the needs of the people, to the extent that has been carried on unless State or Federal aid was secured, hence certain set-ups, indicated by alphabetical letters, and officered by men selected with the approval of Lansing, and Washington are, and have been in charge of the monies, commodities, indigent relief, and laboring jobs.

However, the Poor Commission of Marquette County had a very efficient organization, equipped with a broad knowledge of the County needs and a spirit of helpfulness that undoubtedly proved attractive to both State and Federal Officials, and we believe has been the means of rendering material assistance, but, in all cases, certain definite rules governing Federal expenditures has had to be recognized by the Poor Commission, and the warrants for relief of all kinds has been issued by State and Federal officers according to the various instructions accompanying each individual set-up.

If the above statements are understood, and admitted, various of the complaints, presented to the Poor Commission, would at least, be modified or withdrawn.

Whilst some of the complaints charge a lack of certain commodities forwarded to Wells Township later than was previously expected, still, it is freely admitted that a considerable excess of other commodities have been received.

Some of the complaints embody strictly personal transactions between business men and individuals, and if handled by the Poor Commission, extreme care must be used in such handling.

In behalf of the Poor Commission, the Chairman allowed the possibility of errors in distribution sometimes materializing, but in every case the Commission is ready and willing to consider such charges and to make any essential alterations within their power, as quickly as is consistent with their best judgment.

Your Contact Committee believes that under the terrific stress and strain of recent months, made possible by a period of unparalleled unemployment and public needs, the Poor Commission and its staff have given their best efforts to serve the whole people of Marquette County to the full extent of the authority vested in them by the Board of Supervisors.

Gentlemen:--There is a great possibility of another year of grasshoppers. The State of Michigan has been allotted 500 tons of bran and 2500 gallons of sodium arsenite from the grasshopper relief fund recently made by Congress. The allocation to the needy counties was made Monday, May 21. We asked for 50 tons of bran and enough poison to take care of the 50 tons, but do not know how much we will get. The counties have to supply the molasses, salt and banana oil; also transportation within the county.

Last year the county spent \$1,036.04 for grasshopper bait. Not knowing how much the county's allotment will be nor how bad the grasshoppers will be, we believe the county board of supervisors ought to make a like appropriation this year. If the appropriation is made, no more money will be used than is actually needed to take care of the situation.





 Gentlemen:

In the matter of request for appropriation of \$25,000.00 for graveling of roads in Wells Township presented by Supervisor Patient, referred to the Committee on Highways and Bridges and the County Road Commission.

Your Committee and the County Road Commission inspected roads in Wells Township and the following other Townships on June 18th and 20th, viz: Marquette, Sands, Chocoday, West Branch, Forsyth, Ewing, Turin, Skandia, Tilden, Richmond, Ely, Humboldt, Champion, Michigamme, Negaunee and Powell.

There are roads in Wells Township which it would be desirable to improve. The sum of \$25,000.00 could be expended on such roads, most of which would have to be graded before gravel construction would be justified. This same condition as to roads needing improvement or graveling exists in every Township in the County.

Your joint Committee composed as above set forth, reviewed records of the Road Commission and find that 5.75% of the disbursements by the Road Commission for construction and maintenance since the beginning of the fiscal year 1931 have been made in Wells Township, whereas such Township has 0.68% of the valuation and 1.43 % of the population of the County.

Wells Township is sparsely settled and with farms which do not appear to have the economic justification existing in other parts of the County. Much of the Township appears to be what has been frequently termed as "Marginal Lands" in the press and otherwise, and of the character which it is recently recommended be withdrawn from use. Also an improvement in this Township is not of substantial benefit

to the cities or other portion of the County as the Township has little economic inter-course course in this County.

The funds of the County have been carefully budgeted after thorough study of the needs of all Townships and departments. The appropriation for the general fund did not contemplate an expenditure such as is requested. The funds of the Road Commission are carefully apportioned and used in connection with work relief operations, in relief of present depression conditions and because of the fact that on all work relief operations for depression relief it is necessary for the Road Commission to pay equipment, materials and certain other charges on work on which the labor is paid from State or Federal funds it is essential that work be confined to work where a minimum of expenses for such equipment and material items are to be encountered. The job requested in Wells Township is principally a machinery operation with crushers, trucks and scrapers.

It is the opinion of your Committee that:

The budget of this Board should not be disturbed by granting this or any similar request.

That to grant a request of this nature would be unfair to every other Township and City of the County.

We recommend that the request be denied.

Governing Amended Procedure of Marquette County Road Commission to Provide for Changes Required by Act 130, P.A. 1931, and to Correlate Work Thereunder with Work Under Previous Acts.

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On account of the changes in the statutes governing the adoption of roads into the County Road Systems and the additional and changed methods of financing the same, the following policies to govern procedure with reference to such roads are adopted:

1--All roads adopted into the County Road System shall be classified as Primary County Roads, or as Secondary County Roads.

2--Primary County Roads shall be the County Roads which are in the County Road System on July 1, 1931, plus such additional highways as the Board of County Road Commissioners shall determine from time to time as part of the Primary County Road System.

3--Primary County Roads shall be designated by numbers assigned to them by the Board of County Road Commissioners, in accordance with the uniform system of marking heretofore adopted.

4--All work on Primary Roads shall be financed in the same manner and from the same sources of revenue as work on County Roads has heretofore been financed and, in addition, from such other sources of revenue as are provided by statute.

5--All Township Roads adopted into the County Road System under the terms of Act No. 130, P.A. of Michigan 1931, and which are not at that or some later time determined as Primary County Roads by the Board of County Road Commissioners shall be known as Secondary County Roads.

6--All Secondary County Roads shall be designated by not less than two letters, the first letter indicating the Township in which the road is situated, and the second letter the road within the Township.

7--Maintenance work on Secondary Highways shall be financed from funds paid to the County in accordance with the terms of said Act No. 130, heretofore mentioned. If these funds are insufficient the Board of County Road Commissioners shall make recommendations according to the Board of Supervisors.

8--Funds paid to the County under terms of said Act No. 130, before mentioned, and which are not required for maintenance, shall be used for improvement of roads adopted into the County Road System after January 1, 1931.

9--If improvements are desired on any highway adopted after January 1, 1931, more than can be paid for as specified in paragraph 8, the cost of such improvement may be borne jointly by the Township in which the improvement lies, and the County; arrangements therefore are to be made between the County and the Township in accordance with said Act No. 130. In every instance of such improvement the Township shall pay the percentage of the cost thereof as shall be determined by the Board of County Road Commissioners, provided that on Secondary Highways and Trails the Township shall not be required to pay less than 10 per cent nor more than 50 per cent of the cost of such improvement.

10--All Township Roads are presumed under the statute to have not less than 66 ft. width of right of way. Whenever any Township adopted into the County Road System shall have a right of way of less than 66 ft. between fences by reason of fences, buildings or other encroachments on the statutory width of 66 ft., the Board of County Road Commissioners may deny the making of any improvement or the furnishing of snow plowing on such highways until the owners of property along such road shall have removed all fences or other encroachments off such 66 ft. right of way, or have given to said Board of County Road Commissioners such deeds and other papers as will empower them to the use of said 66 ft. right of way.

11--The Board of County Road Commissioners shall determine which of the County Roads shall be provided with snow plowing to be done at County expense.

12--Snow plowing may be denied on any Secondary Highway which has not got a proper width of right of way and on which the width and character of the road grade is such that there is probability that plowing machinery will be damaged in doing the work, or where the cost of snow removal appears to be more than is warranted by the expected benefits.

13--All improvements and snow plowing may be denied for Secondary Roads in any Township which is in arrears in payments of money owed to the County.

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 ✓ Mr. Stakel then moved that the Budget Committee concur in the action of the Board of County Road Commissioners in the matter of adopting the amended code and recommend approval thereof to the Board of Supervisors.

This motion was put and unanimously carried.

REPORT OF AUDITING COMMITTEE ON THE  
STATE AUDITOR'S REPORT

The State Auditor's report for 1933 brought out a number of suggestions in our accounting system which will require considerable labor in setting up the proper entries on the books of the different departments and to bring all into line. The State Auditor suggested a committee of the Board of Supervisors be created to handle the matter. This has been carefully considered by your Auditing Committee and it is our recommendation that an accountant be engaged to help the several departments in coordinating their books and accounts in the proper manner.

Our accounting system has been made quite complicated for all departments due to the matter of the various funds which have been contributed for aid relief and other measures coming up in relation to unemployment relief, etc. This has so increased the work that the present force is unable to take up the extra work of coordinating the accounts in the various departments in addition to keeping up their regular current work, and your committee therefore further recommends the employment of the Morrison Audit Company to undertake this work as soon as possible.

The monthly reports of the County Treasurer, Morgan Heights Sanatorium and Superintendents of the Poor were read and ordered filed.

The following resolution was presented by the Prosecuting Attorney. Supervisor Nicholas moved for the adoption of the resolution, supported by Supervisor Muck, and unanimously adopted. It was moved by Supervisor Stakel that the Legislative Committee be empowered to forward this resolution to each county in the State. Motion was seconded by Supervisor Mongrain. Supervisor Nicholas suggested that he believed the Clerk would be willing to undertake this duty of sending out these resolutions and asked that he be authorized to do this instead of the Legislative Committee. By consent of the maker of the motion and his second, the Clerk was so instructed.

WHEREAS, petitions have been circulated and filed with the Secretary of State initiating amendments to the State Constitution to reduce the State Gasoline Tax to two cents per gallon and establish the weight tax at 35 cents per cwt., and

WHEREAS, the proposed reduction in the gasoline tax would cause a serious deficiency in funds available for highway purposes and would diminish the amount available for the construction and maintenance of county and township roads in the future; and

WHEREAS, it appears that if this amendment is adopted it will give gasoline companies an opportunity to increase the ultimate price of gasoline to the consumers rather than reduce the cost and will cause a loss in revenue for highway construction and maintenance work; and

WHEREAS, it is the opinion of this Board that this matter is entirely one for legislative consideration and is not properly a subject for regulation by constitutional amendment;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County that the proposed constitutional amendment to reduce the gas tax to two cents per gallon and establish the weight tax at thirty-five cents per cwt. be opposed and the same is opposed and condemned;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be sent to the Boards of Supervisors of all the Counties in the State and the Michigan Bureau of Highway Education.

Superintendent McNamara, of the Marquette County Fair Association, stated that the American Legion desired another beer permit during the County Fair, and in order to lease them this privilege a suitable building would have to be erected for this purpose, and asked that \$400.00 be appropriated out of the general fund of the County. Moved by Supervisor Stenglein that this appropriation be made. Motion supported by Supervisor Gribble and carried by the following Yea and Nay vote:

This proposition was handled by lease with purchase option, as it was necessary to have some title before an E.R.A. project application was possible, and it was not practicable to close purchase of the land until we knew all Federal and State phases of the transaction would be approved.

The lease with purchase option names \$100 per year rental with a purchase price of \$2400. The purchase option, under the terms of the contract, may be exercised at the expiration of any year when the rental becomes due. The owners, The Cleveland-Cliffs Iron Company, have agreed to allow the first year's rental to apply on the purchase price, if the purchase option is exercised prior to the middle of September.

The Board of Park Trustees recommend that the option for purchase of this airport site be exercised at this time.

We do not understand that the Supervisors took any action regarding the matter, but inasmuch as the matter was discussed, we have thought it proper to write to you relative to the situation in order that our views may be transmitted to the Supervisors. We knew, of course, that this savings was coming through and although we are at the present time in an excellent cash position, still we planned to use this money in effecting certain permanent improvements and which we probably would not have contemplated at this time, except for this addition to our income. These improvements will probably cost in the neighborhood of \$1,500. I cannot tell the exact amount, as I am writing this, because I do not have definite figures before me. At any rate, these betterments consist of rearrangement of the pig house, including concrete walls and floor, new concrete table in the autopsy room and completion of the room, also excavating and concrete floors in the Children's Unit and certain minor similar improvements in the basement of the Adult Department.

The new pig house we consider to be well worth the expense. The autopsy table, etc., were necessary in order to retain the standing of the Sanatorium. The basement improvements we felt were highly desirable, as when they are completed, the buildings will be much more cleanly and sanitary.

## COUNTY PARK COMMITTEE'S REPORT

August 16, 1934.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors,  
Marquette County, Michigan.

Gentlemen:--Your Committee on County Parks, together with P. B. Spear, Sr., S. R. Elliott, R. S. Archibald--the Board of County Road Commissioners, with K. I. Sawyer, Superintendent--inspected the county parks on Monday, August 13, 1934, and beg to submit herewith the following report:

## CHAMPION BEACH:

This park is becoming more popular each year, both for camping and bathing. The regular attendance so far this season is a little below 1933; this is due to the cooler weather the early part of the season. The number of camping parties reached a higher peak this season when on Thursday, August 9th, there were 63 parties in tents, and a few with trailers. It is suggested that the registration should show the address of the campers; this will be an interesting record.

The large number using the bathing beach, especially the children, is evidence of the popularity of the place. It is greatly enjoyed by the people of Marquette County and the tourists who come North for relief from the heat during the summer months.

The park to the North of the railroad is not used for camping this season. The only work done has been the necessary brushing and cleaning for protection from forest fires.

The Committee brought up the question of fire protection for the bath-house, cottage and other buildings in this location as well as the protection of the pine trees in the grove and for the safety of the campers. It is expected that this installation will not cost very much and the Board of Trustees will prepare a survey and estimated cost for such fire protection and submit same to the Board of Supervisors.

Nothing was done this year on the proposed wildflower and rock garden but the Committee is giving the matter careful consideration for next year.

The Champion Beach and park system now comprises 370 acres; part of this is owned by Marquette County and part is under lease.

There is now provided for campers and picnickers 250 tables with benches and 35 stoves of the outdoor pattern.

## GWINN PARK:

The Gwinn Park on the day of our visit presented the appearance of a perfect woodland scene.

To the tourist seeking a restful contented and healthgiving holiday among the pines, in close proximity to a flowing, tree-fringed, winding river, exposing in spots along bank and stream the district rocks, this rich gift of nature is ideal.

For those who lead strenuous lives in torrid industrial centers, there is no better rustic spot where restfulness "so valuable to such people" can be found, and so satisfactorily enjoyed.

Considering the small amount of money expended for the upkeep of Gwinn Park, the attendance at, and the use of, this recreational spot justifies in full measure all that the County has done by way of improvements.

Several tourists have camped there this season, and the families living in the Gwinn district use the park on days of favorable weather.

The swimming hole (large in size) is a continual source of attraction and use for the park frequenters.

The park presented a neat, clean appearance, and the changing rooms of the bath-house were spic and span.





Good Will Farm never says No to any child needing its protection and care, and that it is a real home and not an institution, is vouched for by the State Welfare Commission of Lansing, who, when completing an inspection of our home, our methods and our family, left with these words, "this is the ideal children's home of Michigan," and they had just finished making a tour of inspection of all institutions in the state. We know we are far from being ideal, but we are trying to do a good job of caring for the children entrusted to our care and when we tell of some of the happenings in our life, it is not to boast but to give those who are not acquainted with us, some idea of the hominess of Good Will Farm. One youngster, Illene, when writing to her mother said in her first letter, "just think, mother, we get three full meals a day here." And in a letter received last week from Claude, a young man who has been away from the home for a number of years, after inquiring about the children and adults here, asks "Is Good Will Farm still a real home for children? I am ready now to come back."

In a recent comparative statement of expenses of some half dozen Michigan and Illinois children's homes, Good Will Farm's per capita costs was the lowest of all, and the excellent physical condition of our children, as their teachers and others knowing them can testify, proves that this showing is not due to any unwise economies, but to careful management. The littlest ones are weighed every week, the older ones every month, and those not making proper gains are reported to our physician. We have a dietician on our Board who directs our menus.

- (a) 22 children were in approved boarding homes with board, clothing and medical attention provided.
- (b) 3 children were under supervision in foster homes.
- (c) 4 children were in their own homes under the supervision of a representative of the Society.
- (d) 2 investigations were made of new foster homes. 7 new boarding homes were investigated.
- (e) The home conditions of 44 children in 29 different families were investigated and plans made for their protection and care.

The gross cost of service during the year was \$3,209.53. Reimbursements received from the County, relatives or other sources amounted to \$746.10, leaving a net cost of \$2,463.43.

Based on the above figures we are asking for an appropriation of \$500 from your County to enable us to carry on our work this coming year. A representative of our Society will be present to address the Board in our behalf on Monday, October 8.

✓ COUNTY PARK COMMITTEE'S REPORT

August 16, 1934.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors, Marquette County, Michigan.

Gentlemen: Your Committee on County Parks, together with P. B. Spear, Sr., S. R. Elliott, R. S. Archibald--The Board of County Road Commissioners, with K. I. Sawyer, Superintendent--inspected the County parks on Monday, August 13, 1934, and beg to submit herewith the following report:

CHAMPION BEACH:

This park is becoming more popular each year, both for camping and bathing. The regular attendance so far this season is a little below 1933; this is due to the cooler weather the early part of the season. The number of camping parties reached a higher peak this season when on Thursday, August 9th, there were 63 parties in tents, and a few with trailers. It is suggested that the registration should show the address of the campers; this will be an interesting record.

The large number using the bathing beach, especially the children, is evidence of the popularity of the place. It is greatly enjoyed by the people of Marquette County and the tourists who come North for relief from the heat during the summer months.

The park to the North of the railroad is not used for camping this season. The only work done has been the necessary brushing and cleaning for protection from forest fires.

The Committee brought up the question of fire protection for the bathhouse, cottage and other buildings in this location as well as the protection of the pine trees in the grove and for the safety of the campers. It is expected that this installation will not cost very much and the Board of Trustees will prepare a survey and estimated cost for such fire protection and submit same to the Board of Supervisors.

Nothing was done this year on the proposed wildflower and rock garden careful consideration for next year.

The Champion Beach and park system now comprises 370 acres; part of this is owned by Marquette County and part is under lease.

There is now provided for campers and picnickers 250 tables with benches and 35 stoves of the outdoor pattern.

GWINN PARK:

The Gwinn Park on the day of our visit presented the appearance of a perfect woodland scene.

To the tourist seeking a restful contented and healthgiving holiday among the pines, in close proximity to a flowing, tree-fringed, winding river, exposing in spots along bank and stream the district rocks, this rich gift of nature is ideal.

For those who lead strenuous lives in torrid industrial centers, there is no better rustic spot where restfulness "so valuable to such people" can be found and so satisfactorily enjoyed.

Considering the small amount of money expended for the upkeep of Gwinn Park, the attendance at, and the use of, this recreational spot justifies in full measure all that the County has done by way of improvements.

Several tourists have camped there this season, and the families living in the Gwinn district use the park on days of favorable weather.

The swimming hole (large in size) is a continual source of attraction and use for the park frequenters.

The park presented a neat, clean appearance, and the changing rooms of the bathhouse were spic and span.





✓ At the request of Supervisor Wiseman, Mr. Dan Vaughan addressed the board on a safety program for automobile drivers. Remarks on this subject were made by Supervisor Yungbluth and Dolf and County Road Superintendent, Mr. Sawyer, and it was moved by Supervisor Nicholas, that a vote of thanks be extended to Mr. Vaughan, and that his remarks be printed in the proceedings of this Board and that this matter be referred to the Committee on County Schools. Motion was supported by Supervisor Frei and unanimously carried.

✓ A report from the Travelers Insurance Company that the two passenger elevators at Morgan Heights had been inspected and were found to be in good operating condition throughout, was read and ordered filed.

✓ A communication from the Secretary of the Michigan Children's Aid Society with a receipt for the appropriation of \$300.00 made by this Board to that Society, was read and ordered filed.

✓ The Clerk presented bids for furnishing the Court House and Jail with coal, which were read and ordered filed.

✓ Copies of Resolutions from Allegan County and Washtenaw County Boards on Amendments two and three, voted on November 6th election, were read and ordered filed.

✓ A copy of a resolution from the County Board of Muskegon County on the closing hours established by the State Liquor Control Commission, was read, but as this Board had already taken this matter up, the resolution was ordered filed.

✓ A resolution from Supervisors of Roscommon County bearing on legislation whereby the State shall assume the cost of caring for such indigent persons, placing the supervision of such care, and maintenance in the County Agent of each County in the State, who is a State Welfare Officer, was read and it was moved by Supervisor Van Riper that this be referred to the Legislation Committee, Probate Judge Potter and the County Welfare Agent. Motion seconded by Supervisor Stakel and unanimously carried.

✓ Supervisor Patient presented a communication relative to relief orders issued by him in his township.

The Chairman stated that if these men are registered, which he understands they are, this is not a matter for this Board but for the Relief Administration Board.

It was moved by Supervisor Wiseman that this be referred to the Poor Commission Contact Committee. Motion supported by Supervisor Nicholas.

✓ Supervisor Nicholas stated that the above named Committee had a report for this meeting, which he thought would throw some light on the matter, and asked that the report be read at this time. The request was granted by the Chair and the Clerk ordered to read the report.
