RELIEF COMMISSION

Lansing, Mich., Oct. 1, 1935

To Members of Board of Supervisors: Attention: County Clerk.

Official information from the Federal Emergency Relief Administration advises us that no grants for direct relief purposes will be made available to the State of Michigan after employable persons have been transferred to WPA projects. The State and local subdivisions will have the responsibility of providing necessary relief for those dependents who are not employed by the WPA because they are unemployable or for some other reason.

By Act of the 1935 Legislature, the State Relief Commission was given an appropriation of \$9,000,000 a year for a two-year period ending July 1; 1937. This appropriation for the current year has been reduced 5 per cent, making the appropriation from the State \$8,550,000. County and city governments have heretofore been providing approximately \$250,000 to \$300,000 per month, or about \$3,000,000 per year for emergency relief. Some of this has been in the form of work relief from road funds which probably will not be available hereafter, due to the WPA program on roads.

The State Relief Commission estimates that approximately 42,000 families now on the relief rolls will not be transferred to WPA and will continue to be the responsibility of the State and local governments. It estimates further that the total cost for meeting the necessities for this large group of families will approximate \$14,000,000 per year. These amounts are minimum estimates for they do not include new cases which may be applying for relief after this date. Nor does it include those employable cases who may not be absorbed on the WPA program.

County Boards of Supervisors now or soon to be in session are in the process of making up their budgets for the coming year. It is of the utmost importance that the County Boards of Supervisors carefully study the situation outlined above.

The State Emergency Relief Commission is cognizant of the financial conditions which face many counties. But the Commission is obliged to call to the attention of the County and other local authorities that its own appropriation is fixed by legislative act, as indicated above, and that if the needs of the destitute on relief are to be met, local funds will have to be provided to supplement the state appropriation.

The State Relief Commission will make drastic cuts in its personnel as soon as employable cases are transferred to the WPA. The cost of administration of the State Relief Administration during the past two years has been slightly over 8 per cent. Efforts to reduce this further are constantly being made. In order to make possible the best cooperative relationship between local subdivisions and the State Relief Administration, the Commission is anxious to consult with the Board of Supervisors concerning the details of the Relief Administration in each county. It is hoped that the Board will appoint a committee from its members for the purpose of consulting with County Relief Commission and the State Relief Administration.

On the basis of past estimates now available, state funds will provide for not more than 55 to 65 per cent of the cost of relief for the next calendar year. The balance will obviously have to be provided from local sources.

The Commission is also hopeful that in counties where the County unit plan is not in operation the Board will, for purposes of considering appropriations for emergency relief, represent all of the townships in its relationships with the County Relief Commission.

We are directing the County Relief Commission and the County Relief Administration to make available information concerning the relief load, the administrative expense and any other pertinent data to the County Boards of Supervisors or to their representatives at the request of the Board.

Dear Sir:--The fire season will very likely come to a close in the Upper Peninsula on or about October 1st. At that time we will be faced with the necessity of releasing practically all of our fire personnel.

For some time, but particularly this year, we have felt the necessity of having a man work almost continuously on land trespass and delinquent tax work in Marquette county. As you perhaps know, Mr. Frank Krieg has been doing this work in conjunction with his other duties and we feel that he is well qualified to pursue this activity. I have recently talked the matter over with the authorities in Lansing in connection with keeping Mr. Krieg on the payroll to take care of this work during the winter months.

It was finally decided that the Department would pay half of Mr. Krieg's salary and all of his expenses providing the county would pay the other half of his salary for a period of not to exceed seven months, or until May 1st, when he can again be taken up on the fire payroll. This would involve the county to the amount of about \$350.00.

The benefit to be derived by the county would be the collection of delinquent taxes especially on trespass cases and the general acceleration of tax payments into the county treasurer's office.

Gentlemen: --Relative to the communication from the Board of County Park Trustees concerning improvements to the County airport referred by your body to the Road Commission and the Committee on Parks and Legislation.

On September 13th your Park Committee and the Board of County Road Commissioners met in joint session with Mr. Steers, Assistant Director of the State Aeronautical Department and considered this matter at length.

It was pointed out that the State Aeronautical Department was very anxious to have an airport with adequate facilities in Marquette County in the central part of the Upper Peninsula. That Marquette County already has adequate ground facilities provided for this port, and that there was needed a hangar, place of residence for the custodian, and service buildings, and that certain of the ground markers should be built of permanent construction, and additional parking areas provided, and certain cleaning up work was desirable in the areas adjacent to the runways.

The Superintendent pointed out that on the last of August, when notice was received that there would be a closing of receipt of applications for the Works Progress Administration projects on the 1st of September, he was summoned to the Works Progress Administration for the Emergency Relief Administration of the County, and that on that visit he made tentative application so as to retain the ability to have projects for the above purposes. That in the tentative setup as made, it was contemplated that the buildings would provide for \$87,393.00 worth of work, of which \$84,923.00 would be at Federal expense, and \$2,470.00 would be contributions by the County, and included in this \$2,470.00 is the value for use of County owned equipment, and that the tentative application for ground work contemplated \$7,883.00 of work, of which \$7,283.00 would be at Federal expense, and \$600.00 would be contributions by the County.

The hangar contemplated for the airport would be 100 x 100 ft. floor area and would accommodate the largest ships now generally used in the mid West. It was pointed out by Mr. Steers that extension of commercial air service is now under contemplation by one of the large airway operators to Green Bay, and that further extension of this line would be probable if suitable facilities were available.

It was also pointed out that the Board could expect to receive return of a considerable part of its annual cost from customary charges for service, and that as this air service developed it could be anticipated that an adequate port would be self supporting as the use grew and that no amount of use could be anticipated until a hanger and fueling services were provided.

After thorough discussion your Committee and the Board of County Park Trustees recommend that the Board of County Park Trustees be authorized to institute application for a Works Progress Administration project in conformity with tentative application already submitted.

Honorable Board of Supervisors, Marquette County, Michigan.

Gentlemen: -- Your Agriculture Committee, to whom was referred the matter of cattle and other animals running at large on the highways, met with the Superintendent of the Board of County Road Commissioners on September 26th, 1935.

These appear to be the conditions:

That particularly cattle, and at times horses, and other animals, are roaming at large on the highways in parts of Marquette County; that this having of unrestrained animals on the highways creates a menace to the safety of all motorists and other drivers on the highways, and also creates a very bad impression in the minds of tourists and other travelers in the County.

We recommend that the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County do all possible to end this matter of cattle and other animals running at large on the high-ways, and at the earliest possible date.

Contact was had with the Prosecuting Attorney's office and copy of the Prosecuting Attorney's opinion is attached.

Pursuant to this, and after careful consideration, it would appear that the following things should be undertaken forthwith by the Board of Supervisors.

First: That the Board of Supervisors pass the necessary resolution making the statute contained under Compiler's Section 9037 to 9042 inclusive, effective in Marquette County. This would enable the Park Board to keep cattle out of the Parks, and in some instances effect certain abatement of the difficulty. We recommend this be done forthwith.

We would also recommend that the County Clerk be instructed to write each Township in Marquette County stating to each Township that the Board of Supervisors consider the running of cattle and other animals at large on the highways to be a menace to public safety, and recommending to each Township that the matter of cattle and other animals running at large on the highways be taken up at the next meeting of the people in each of the various Townships, and that the Board of Supervisors recommend to the people of the various Townships that they enact an ordinance as under Compiler's Section 959 to 961 inclusive, which would prohibit the running at large of cattle and other animals in the respective Townships.

It would also appear that the Prosecuting Attorney's suggestion, that re-writing of the statutes in regard to this matter, is probably a prerequisite to complete and effective control and that a start should be made to that end.

We further recommend that the County Clerk be instructed to send copies of this communication to every County in the State, with a request that they join with Marquette County in a request to the Legislature for suitable legislation prohibiting cattle and other animals from running at large on the highways.

It further appears that this is not entirely a one-sided question, and that there are in this County a number of persons who are largely depending on their cattle for their substenance, and who have in the past been able to secure the grazing of their cattle on lands owned by the corporations, and other commons, and to deprive them of this food supply for their cattle would work a hardship and in some instances materially increase the cost to the County for the sustenance of County wards included in this group.

We recommend that the Committee be empowered to try to arrange for pasturage with the various corporations at such points as would provide pasturage for the various communities, and to enclose same so that the various individuals could arrange to drive their stock to these enclosures.

We recommend concurrence in each of the above specific recommendations.

A thorough discussion was had of the matter, which is of very vital importance to Marquette County.

The matter of the proposed resolution to prevent cattle from running at large in Marquette County which was laid over from the last meeting of this Board, was presented, and it was moved by Supervisor Nicholas that this matter being very important that it be laid upon the table and taken up at the next meeting of this Board. The motion was seconded by Supervisor Dobson, and unanimously carried.

A communication from Supervisor Petersen requesting that the road between Little Lake and Railo's saw-mill on the Sporley Road towards Engman's Lake be kept open for traffic this winter, was read. It was moved by Supervisor Wiseman that this communication be referred to the Committee on Highways and Bridges and the County Road Commission, supported by Supervisor Richards and carried.

The following communication was read, and it was moved by Supervisor Labold, supported by Supervisor Mackey, that this be referred to the Agricultural Committee with power to act. Moved by Supervisor Nicholas that the motion be amended by having the "power to act" stricken. This was supported by Supervisor Swanson and the motion as amended was unanimously adopted.

Marquette County, Michigan.
Gentlemen:-The Jones Bankhead Act, which passed the last session of Congress, made large enough additional appropriations to agricultural extension work to permit the Extension Division of Michigan State College to take over the salaries of county agricultural agents on a basis according to years of service and as to grade each may be given. This does not mean that counties cannot contribute to salary within the county if the Board desires to do so, and it is hoped this county will desire to do so. The counties continue to pay all expenses of the agent the same as before, that is, pay travel and office expenses.

The Act of Congress also permits the State to be divided into small districts with district 4-H Club agents and home demonstration agents to be placed in each district with salary and all expenses paid except each county within the district must furnish office, office supplies and office help for the work done within the county. Marquette County is a district with Alger and Schoolcraft Counties.

I cannot say how soon this district can get a club or home demonstration agent as there are not enough qualified in this profession to take all the openings now offered. It is well, however, to be ready when the College has the right persons ready for the positions.

The new arrangements mean that the county can have full time services of county agricultural agent, one-third time or more of a 4-H Club agent and a home demonstration agent by paying entire expenses of county agricultural agent and only office expenses of the other two.

The appropriation made at the annual meeting last month was \$1,000. This is about the average travel and office expenses of the agricultural agent, not including the stenographer. The last three years I have been personally paying my office help \$25.00 per month and the county \$40.00. Under the new arrangement I cannot continue making this payment. The county can now have the services heretofore rendered plus the part time services of a home demonstration agent and 4-H Club agent at the same or less cost than ever before for just the one. It is necessary that an additional amount be added to last month's appropriation so that the entire office help can be paid by the county. The present salary paid by county and agent jointly is for about two-thirds time. I suggest that \$1,000 be taken from the general fund and added to the \$1,000 already appropriated and the stenographer be put on full time with same salary as other county stenographers, the change in salary arrangement to begin November 1, 1935.

STATE ASSOCIATION OF THE SUPERINTENDENTS OF POOR

October 14, 1935.

To the Honorable the members of the Board of Supervisors.

Gentlemen: -- By Act No. 201 of the Public Acts of 1933 the State Legislature created the State Emergency Welfare Relief Commission for the purpose of administering the emergency funds made available for relief by the Federal Government, together with additional emergency funds provided by the State and local communities. That act was distinctly and definitely an emergency measure and designed to meet certain requirements laid down by the Federal Relief Administration in order to make available in the State Federal Funds for relief. Now all indications point to an early termination by the Federal Government of providing further funds for direct relief; that the Federal Government will limit its aid only to those employables who can be aided by employment through the Works Progress Administration or so-called W.P.A. projects.

In speaking of the change to be made by the Federal Government in relation to its aid for relief, we quote from a speech made by Dr. William Haber, State Emergency Relief Administrator, to the Board of Supervisors of Genesee County, on September 26th, 1935 as follows:

"Now, apparently, the program has changed, and in its change it presents problems to all of us, which we ought to both as public officials, as well as citizens, examine thoroughly as to what it means to us. The change arises from this fact: That beginning as of a certain time, the Federal Government says its obligation is going to be limited to those cases which are employable, and that they are going to provide funds to the State of Michigan, through its own organization, through the Works Progress Administration, of which Mr. Pearson is the State Administrator, to meet payrolls for those relief cases who are employable and working on so-called W.P.A. projects. That its obligation will cease with that, and that all other cases, unemployable or border line cases, or employables which they themselves are not able to absorb, will become the obligation of the State and local groups. That's been told to us not by implication or indirectly, but definitely and precisely, that the function of the Federal government, insofar as relief is concerned, will be definitely limited to providing funds to meet payrolls, to meet projects; that it will cease to provide funds to meet the cases of direct relief either for those who are unemployable, or for those who are employable and if for one reason or another are not absorbed on W.P.A. projects. That's the basic problem involved in the picture. In brief, we will not be able to call on the F.E.R.A. month after month and say--'We need so much,--such and such an amount is provided by the States and the municipalities, and the counties and townships, the balance you give us,"--because they will not meet the balance. So we are examining this problem very candidly to see just exactly what the situation is."

It is clear then that as far as the Federal Government is concerned, by its change in policy on direct relief, it considers the emergency no longer exists and is shifting to the State and Local units the entire burden of direct relief.

It is apparent that the Emergency Welfare Relief Commission is attempting to obtain from the various boards of Supervisors appropriations to carry on the relief work of its organization. With Federal Funds gone it wants the Supervisors to appropriate money for it to help keep its machine in operation at taxpayers expense.

A comparison of costs of administration reveals that it is far more expensive for relief to be administered by the Emergency Relief Commission than by the local Superintendents of Poor. In the year 1932 it cost Saginaw County 4 3/4% to administer all relief, in 1933 the cost was 4%. In January, 1935 administration costs in Saginaw County of the Emergency Relief Commission was 6.4%. In May the cost jumped to 9.6%, while in September it reached 11.3%. In Genesee County in 19 months from November 1, 1933 to June 30, 1935 the total cost for administrative and other services was the huge sum of \$430,223.13 or \$21,511.16 per month, or a total cost of 12.9%.

It has been reported that administrative cose of the State Emergency Welfare Commission is now the staggering figure of over \$400,000 per month for the State and that it has been as high as the unbelievable total of \$750,000 per month. Can the taxpayer continue to carry this burden of administrative expense when they already have a department of local government to do the job, namely, the Superintendents of Poor?

Another fact to be considered is that these huge administrative expenses are incurred by the Emergency Welfare Relief Commission while handling only a part of the relief burden. They do not take care of hospitalization cases or ambulance eases; while they Superintendents of the Poor, with much lower administrative costs took care of all types of relief before the creation of the Emergency Relief Commission.

An outstanding example of the extreme generosity of the Emergency Welfare Commission with taxpayers money is found in the case of Lapeer County. On November 15, 1934, the Emergency Relief Commission dumped in the laps of the Superintendents of Poor of Lapeer County its entire relief load of 900 families. In approximately two weeks the Superintendents of the Poor had cut 600 families who had been receiving aid from taxpayers money, from that same relief load, and on December 3, 1934 when the Emergency Welfare Commission again took over relief, the Superintendents of Poor had reduced the load by two-thirds, and every family that really needed relief had been cared for by the Superintendents of Poor. That is eloquent evidence of the immediate need for termination of the extravagant spending by the Emergency Welfare Relief Commission.

Why should the Board of Supervisors appropriate funds to be expended by the State Emergency Welfare Relief Commission, over which it has no control. The Emergency Relief Commission is not responsible to the Board of Supervisors nor is it by law required to report to the Board of Supervisors.

Section 15 of Act No. 201 of the Public Acts of Michigan

provides as follows:

"Nothing contained in this act shall be construed so as to take from county poor commissions their rights and duties as defined by act one hundred forty-six, public acts of nineteen hundred twenty-five, except as this act pertains to emergency relief."

By that section it was intended to leave in the hands of the Superintendents of the Poor the duty to administer all but emergency relief appropriations. If the counties now have to assume the burden of relief except for the aid given by the State, the Board of Supervisors should return to the Superintendents of Poor the duty of expending local funds for local relief purposes.

No reason exists for appropriating local funds for the expensive, extravagant State Welfare Relief Commission, when Superintendents of the Poor are designated to administer relief by Act 146 of Public Acts of 1925. No reason exists why the taxpayer should be required to maintain two organizations to do one job. No reason exists why local boards of Supervisors should relinquish their control and supervision over local expenditures for relief by turning over local tax money to the State Emergency Welfare Commission.

Before any appropriation is made for relief, we trust this matter will be given serious consideration by your Honorable Body.

MINUTES OF A MEETING

Held in the Marquette County Court House on Friday Afternoon, October 25th, 1935.

The meeting was called to order at 1:45 o'clock by Dr. Van Riper, Chairman of the Marquette County Executive and Budget Committee:

The following were present:

Mr. Arthur Jacques, Mayor of Marquette, representing the Chairmanship of the Marquette County Emergency Relief Commission; Mr. William Fountain, Administrator of the Marquette County Emergency Relief Commission, and his assistant Mr. Johnson; Mr. Walter Barry, of Stambaugh, the Upper Peninsula representative of the State Emergency Relief Commission; Mr. Clarence Smazel, representative of the State Emergency Relief Department; Mr. G. R. Jackson, Chairman of the Marquette County Poor Commission; and the entire Budget and Executive Committee of the Board of Supervisors.

After Dr. Van Riper had called the meeting to order, Mr. Smazel was asked to speak, and he dwelt at great length on what the State Emergency Relief Commission would be compelled to do after November 1st, and made a plea that Marquette County should contribute substantially towards taking care of the unemployables. Mr. Smazel remarked that it would take \$15,000,000 to take care of the unemployables in the State of Michigan, of which \$9,000,000 was to be contributed by the State, and the other \$6,000,000 would have to come from the counties, cities, townships, villages and other sources. As all the State Departments have been cut 5%, only \$8,550,000 was available as the State's share to take care of the unemployables. It was assumed that after November 1st in Marquette County there would be approximately 525 people that could not be employed on any of the WPA projects due to physical infirmities, old age, etc., and it was assumed that the State would be willing to put up \$105,000 if the county would put up \$74,000. It was further brought out that there were 189 people in the County that were eligible for Old Age pensions, but that only 19 thus far had been recommended. It was further stated that although the County was taking care of 129 widows by appropriations under the Dependent Children's Fund, that there were 69 more who were eligible to receive this aid.

After Mr. Smazel had finished the introductory remarks, the Chairman of the Finance and Taxation Committee was asked to say a few words. The latter then presented to the group a tabulation which showed that in the fiscal year just passed, that Marquette County had actually contributed for welfare and relief work, 48.85 cents for every 100 cents contributed by the Federal and State governments. He further pointed out that back in 1932, that our County Road Commission had accumulated a fund of approximately \$225,000, practically all of which was spent taking care of the relief load prior to the time that anything was done by the State and Federal governments. In the latter part of 1932 it was pointed out that the electors of Marquette County approved of a \$400,000 bond issue, the proceeds of which were to be used in taking care of the unemployed. The speaker pointed out that in 1932, for instance, the total welfare load carried by Marquette County, without any help from the Federal and State governments, amounted to approximately \$470,000. In 1933, Marquette County contributed \$318,000, while the Federal and State governments contributed only \$11,000.00.For the County Fiscal Year of 1934-35, this county and its political sub-divisions spent approximately \$502,000, while the Federal and State governments spent \$1,026,000. The representatives of the State Emergency Relief Commission were told that Marquette County had always done its share, and would continue to do so, provided, however, that our county received credit for the money spent actually for welfare and relief work.

The Chairman of the County Finance and Taxation Committee admitted, because the figures are available for public inspection, that Marquette County was financially able to meet any reasonable demand of the State Emergency Relief Commission, but that we did not feel that because of our strong financial cash position, that we ought to be penalized in favor of the counties that had no resources and that had not used as much care as they may have in the past in the running of the affairs of their counties. The plea was then made to the representatives of the State Emergency Relief Commission that they give Marquette County credit for certain functions that we have been and are still performing to help out on the relief problem, such as the continuance of our so-called Widows' Pensions, the Poor Commission's Wood Project, the monies spent for Dependent Children, Visiting Nurse, etc. Mr. Smazel replied that the county would receive full credit for all of the wood hauled in order to help the unemployed, and also to help those working on WPA projects, but, no mention was made of the possibility of receiving any credit for other Public Funds for welfare and relief work, except that Mr. Smazel indicated that the County ought to receive credit for home medical care paid for by the County Poor Commission.

A joint discussion then ensued as to the merits of the Emergency Relief Commission's method of acquiring information through the case-work supervisors, as compared with the old methods adopted by the Marquette County Poor Commission. Mr. Smazel rather condemmed the old system, even intimating that Marquette County, despite its small administrative expenses for the Poor Commission, compared with the large amount spent for overhead by the County Emergency Relief Commission, that the County Poor Commission was paying too much money to its personnel. Mr. Arthur Jacques then replied, defending the personnel of the Poor Commission and its representatives, and further commended the Board of Supervisors and all of the other agencies in the County for co-operating so well with the County Emergency Relief Commission.

Mr. Nightingale then asked Mr. Walter Barry if there was any rule that would prevent any case worker from contacting a supervisor and he replied on the contrary, and that the case workers were supposed to get in touch with the supervisors when making investigations in any particular ward or township.

Captain T. J. Nicholas then arose and thanked Mr. Smazel for the information that had been furnished the group attending the meeting, referring particularly to the explanation regarding our County Poor Commission set-up.

A recess was taken for a short period, and when the group reconvened, a resolution was offered by Mr. Perkins and supported by Captain Nicholas, that the Marquette County Board of Supervisors cooperate with the State Emergency Relief Commission to the fullest extent. This resolution was passed unanimously. Captain Nicholas then offered a vote of thanks to Mr. Smazel. This action was seconded by Matt Richards, and was carried unanimously.

The representatives of the Emergency Relief Commission then left, and the Executive Committee then agreed amongst themselves that we would recommend to the Board of Supervisors that no definite appropriation be voted by the Board until the Poor Fund was actually exhausted. There was approximately about \$60,000 on hand in the Poor Fund on September 1st, to which must be added the \$85,000 appropriated this year. Then, if credit is given the Poor Fund for the Wood Project and also for the cost of Home Medical care, considerable of the \$74,000 asked for by the Emergency Relief Commission will all be taken care of.

Your Committee would therefore recommend that no further appropriation be made until the present Poor Fund is exhausted, and then only appropriate enough money month by month to take care of the different matters as they arise, assuming, however, that due credit be allowed this and other counties still continuing to make appropriations for welfare and relief, when these items have been omitted from the budgets of other counties in the State; taking for example, appropriations for Widows' Pensions and Aid for Dependent Children.

We further recommend that the Board of Supervisors at all times continue to cooperate in the future as we have in the past with all Federal and State Agencies and Commissions on matters of welfare and relief.

The following resolution was read, and it was moved by Supervisor Van Riper that this County concur with Dickinson County to the fullest extent in this matter and that the Clerk be instructed to so advise the Chairman of the Michigan State Conservation Commission. Motion was seconded by Supervisor St. Onge and unanimously carried.

WHEREAS, a proposal has been submitted to the Michigan State Conservation Commission which, if favorably acted upon, will permit the shooting of female deer in certain areas of the Upper Peninsula--including the Escanaba River area of Dickinson County, and

WEHREAS, we, the Members of the Dickinson County Board of Supervisors, believe this an ill-advised move and one which would result in the wholesale destruction of our game, both in and out of the proposed restricted areas.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Dickinson County Board of Supervisors go on record as unalterably opposed to this recommendation, and that copies of this Resolution be forwarded to the Chairman of the Michigan State Conservation Commission; to H. D. Rule, Director of the Game Division for the State, and to all county boards of supervisors in the Peninsula.

A resolution from the Board of Supervisors of St. Clair County urging that Counties of the State be allocated their proportion of the sales tax in accordance with their population, was read, and ordered filed by the Chairman.

It was moved by Supervisor Stakel that in reply to the communication of Mr. Wm. J. Fountain that the Clerk forward him a copy of the report and resolution of the Budget and Executive Committee. Motion was supported by Supervisor Wiseman, and carried.

The communication from the State Association of the Superintendents of Poor was ordered filed by the Chairman.

Prosecuting Attorney Voelker spoke on the matter of a State
Planning Committee, as now provided by statute. It was moved by Supervisor Healy that
the Prosecutor be instructed to write to the Governor relative to this matter and report
back to the Board. Supported by Supervisor Nicholas, and carried.

Supervisor Petersen made a verbal request that the Sands Road as now under construction should first run to Gwinn and secondary road to Little Lake. After a general discussion it was moved by Supervisor Wiseman that this matter be referred to the Committee on Highways and Bridges and the County Road Commission. Supported by Supervisor St. Onge, and unanimously carried.

Supervisor Nicholas spoke on the danger of trucks loaded with logs on the highways of this County and asked if there was not some statutory regulation governing the binding of these logs as an element of safety. It was moved by Supervisor Nardi that this be referred to the Prosecuting Attorney for his investigation. Supported by Supervisor Nicholas and carried.

The matter of the bond of the former Treasurer, William Morrison, which was referred to the Prosecuting Attorney and Olerk, upon request of these officers more time was given to make their report.

There being no further business, it was moved by Supervisor Mongrain, supported by Supervisor Nightingale, that the Board adjourn until Wednesday, the 18th day of December, A. D. 1935, at 1:30 p.m.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Marquette County.

Gentlemen: -- The agricultural committee recommends to the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County that they accept the offer of Michigan State College, Extension Division, to supply the county a part time home demonstration agent and a part time 4-H Club agent, with the understanding that the only expense to the county is to be office room, office supplies and office help. The salary and traveling expenses are to be paid by Michigan State College.

Michigan State College has taken over the entire salary of the county agricultural agent but the county is to continue paying his traveling and office expenses.

The county has been paying the county agricultural agent's stenographer \$40.00 per month and the agent has contributed \$25.00 per month. The State college asked that the entire office expenses be paid by the county for the three agents which the college will supply with full salaries paid by the college. This arrangement calls for a full time stenographer and very small amount added office equipment. The average cost of the agricultural office for the last three years has been \$2428.52. The State college paying the entire salary of the county agricultural agent makes it possible for the county to have the continued entire services of the county agricultural agent and at least one-third time of a home demonstration agent and a 4-H Club agent at less cost than for the agricultural agent alone.

At the annual meeting \$1,000 was appropriated out of the general fund to pay expenses of agricultural agent's office. This sum is not enough to carry on the work of the office with a full time stenographer. We recommend that the agricultural agent's expense allowance for the year be increased to \$1,600 and that a full time stenographer be employed at \$75 per month beginning January 1, 1936.

PROSECUTING ATTORNEY'S OFFICE

Ishpeming, Mich., Dec. 5, 1935.

Honorable Board of Supervisors, Marquette County, Michigan.

Gentlemen: --At the November meeting of the Board on motion of Supervisor Nicholas of Richmond Township, certain questions were referred to me concerning motor vehicles, particularly the transporting and securing of loads on logging trucks.

I am unable to find any statute or regulation prescribing the manner of securing loads on trucks, whether logging trucks or otherwise. Neither the general laws nor the regulations of the Utilities Commission or Motor Vehicle Division aid this question. And in my opinion only the legislature may correct this situation, if such regulation is believed to be desirable. (See Section 4725.)

There are, however, numerous related regulations which may be found applicable to truckers who are careless in the matter of loading and transporting logs or other materials.

Thus Compiler's Section 4728 provides that no vehicle, loaded or unloaded, shall exceed 8 feet in width, 14 feet in height, or 40 feet in length.

The following sections touch of the matters of equipment, such as flags, red lights, trailers, brakes, horns, mirrors, windshield wipers and mufflers.

Sections 4758, and following, as emended by Act 253 of P. A. 1933, also provide further general regulations as to size: Section 4760, as amended, provides in great detail the maximum axle load of vehicles, while Section 4766, as amended, regulates the speed.

Section 4767 provides the penalties, while Section 4768 provides that it is the duty of the Sheriff to enforce these provisions, but that any peace officer may also arrest on sight or warrant for any such violation, and to this end they may stop and examine loads.

Section 4768-1, added by the 1933 amendment, gives broad powers to sheriffs and any peace officer to stop and examine trucks, and correct any violations then and there, if possible, even to the extent of removing all or part of the load, and if there are defects in equipment such peace officer shall direct the driver to go to a designated garage at once to have the truck fixed so as to comply with the law.

It is a permissible inference that truckers who transport logs that are carelessly secured are often guilty of infractions of these other regulations at the same time; and so, as a practical matter, if the Sheriff's department and other peace officers stopped these persons often enough, for these other infractions, and at the same time told them to secure their loads properly, much of the loading danger could probably be eliminated.

"At the direction of the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County I am writing you to respectfully request that you appoint a State Planning Commission that may function under the new land-use and zoning law, No. 44, P. A. 1935.

"The Board has already appointed its County Planning Committee, pursuant to the act, and has just been informed that the former State Planning Commission is inactive. Inasmuch as this county has been one of the pioneers in the movement for zoning, you may feel assured that the Board will deeply appreciate your thoughtful and favorable consideration of this request."

I have had no reply to this letter, and I am therefore unable to report what steps have been taken in that direction.

It may be that an appropriate resolution directly from the Board would be more effective than another letter from me. I still feel that the appointment of an active State Planning Commission is very important to any progress we may make under our county planning program.

Our Board of Supervisors suggest a meeting of the delegates from the various counties, in Lansing at the annual meeting in January of the State Association of Supervisors to discuss the Emergency Relief problem.

Special meeting of the Board of Supervisors of Clinton County, Michigan, held at St. Johns November 29, 1935.

Supervisor Ewing offered and moved the adoption of the following:

RESOLUTION

Under legislative action and appropriation the Governor of the State of Michigan is charged with the duty of disbursing for welfare work and relief a sum of approximately nine million dollars annually, which money is now being applied through combined federal and state agencies.

It is the belief of the members of this board that the local county authorities are better able to apply such funds for the relief of the poor in their respective counties than are state and federal agencies or any combination of the two. Gentlemen: --Your Planning Commission met on December 30th, 1935 and thoroughly reviewed the matter of County zoning.

Arrangements for circulating of petitions on forms approved by the Prosecuting Attorney and for presenting same at the January meeting of the Board of Supervisors were made.

Your Commission represents that we have carefully considered this matter over the past several months; that we feel that the matter of County zoning is of vital importance to Marquette County; that maintenance of financial stability in the County will be largely dependent on some such action, and that this action will contribute to the public health, convenience and welfare through the maintenance of financial stability in the County and the utilizing of such money as the County can afford to spend for public services where it will give the greatest benefit.

Your Commission respectfully recommends that the question of making Act 44, Public Acts of 1935, operative in this County, be submitted to the voters of Marquette County at the election to be held on September 15th, 1936. A resolution to be prepared by the Prosecuting Attorney for that purpose is to be introduced at this meeting and we respectfully recommend favorable action thereon.

Your Commission further believes from their study to date, that there is some question as to whether the present State Planning Commission is on an operating basis and in shape to co-operate with the County Planning Commission, as is required by the statutes. We feel that this zoning movement is so vital that time should not be lost, and recommend that the Board of Supervisors representing Marquette County should request from the Governor that this State Planning Commission be placed on an operating basis at least by the date of the April election. To that end we have prepared a resolution, requesting the Governor to perform all necessary acts, which will be presented at this meeting and we respectfully recommend adoption of that resolution.

Further, as the subject matter involved in the proposed referendum is new in this territory we recommend that the County Planning Commission be authorized to get the matter before the public in as intelligible a form as possible and to provide such information as is within their power, to the end of having as complete an understanding of the matter as is possible.

Sirs: --Relative to disposition of money received on account of motor vehicle license taxes and gasoline taxes returnable to this county for the calendar year 1936, and in conformity to Public Acts of Michigan numbers 7 and 8 of the Extra Session of 1934, your Board of County Road Commissioners recommend:

Pursuant to such acts, one half of each settlement on account of the above mentioned monies, is to be credited to the County Road Fund to be used for administration, maintenance, betterments, and construction of County Roads.

Further, pursuant to such acts, that the remainder, hereinafter called the second half of such monies, as returned to Marquette County, shall be applied as follows and in the following order of priority:

First priority of second half--The sum of \$36,869.53 shall be credited to the Highway Bond Retirement Fund to pay principal, interest, and disbursing fees on the General County Highway Bonds for payments due thereon, to and inclusive of the interest payments payable in April 1937, which interest payment comes due prio to anticipated receipts on monies from these sources for the year 1937.

Second priority of second half--The difference between the second half of such above mentioned monies and the amount of money to be credited to the Highway Bond Retirement Fund is then to be divided and applied as follows:

(a) One half of the difference mentioned in second priority of second half, immediately above, is to be credited to the County Road Fund and used for maintenance of County Roads adopted in conformity to Act 130, P.A. Michigan 1931.

(b) The remaining half of second priority of second half, as mentioned immediately above, shall be divided as follows:

The money credited to the County Road Fund to be used for administration, maintenance, improvements, and construction of County Roads in conformity to the statutes.
