The following report of the Highways and Bridges Committee and the Marquette County Road Commission was read. On motion of Supervisor Jernstad, supported by Supervisor Muck and carried, the report was accepted.

Honorable Board of Supervisors of Marquette County, Michigan.

Gentlemen: --Your Committee on County Roads and Bridges and the Board of County Road Commissioners report in the matter of three communications referred for joint consideration. In the matter of petition from Dennis Sullivan and others relative to a bridge

In the matter of petition from Dennis Sullivan and others relative to a orige at Republic.

We have viewed the site and find, that there has heretofore been three bridges between Republic and the West side of the river in the vicinity of Republic and Northerly from the new bridge built on M-95 by the State. One of these bridges at the Power Dam has been closed to traffic because of its hazardous condition for several years. The second bridge at Park City has become unsafe for traffic and the County Road Commission closed this to traffic several weeks ago. The third bridge on Road 601 which was formerly the old trunk line location is not in good condition and will have to be replaced in the comparatively near future or closed to traffic and when this happens, if a bridge is not built in this vicinity, the traffic from Republic to a portion of the village on the West side of the river would have to go South on M-95 for la miles and then back the same amount on the West side of the river to get to that part of the plat which lies on the West side bridge somewhere in the vicinity of Republic appears to be proper and inasmuch as so many etc., and as no funds are available to the County Road Commission wherewith such a bridge

could be built at this time, we therefore recommend to your Board that the matter be left in the hands of the County Road Commission to make a study of the whole situation, contemplating that not over one bridge will be built in the vicinity of the Village of Republic over the Michigamme River.

Petition for the reconstruction of Road KB sometimes known as the Saux Head Lake Road, was laid before the Committee, also a formal protest, copy of which is attached, was considered.

The Superintendent reported in the matter of finances and called the attention of the Committee to the fact, that no new inprovements should be undertaken except as they contribute to the work relief program and called the attention of the Committee to the fact that there was no work relief personnel available for this road.

For all of the above reasons the joint committee recommends that this be left in the hands of the County Road Commission for their sole consideration and

determination.

In the matter of claim for damage to fence, from the Finnish Evangelical Lutheran Church by County snow plows.

The Committee finds that this fence was damaged, that it is a reasonable presumption that the damage was caused by snow plows, but that the snow plows were performing a public function at the time and that the fence was not visible to the drivers of the plows, and that no liability should be attached to the County Road Commission for that damage. They further find that the fence in question is approximately 20 feet from the center of the highway whereas snow plowing is usually deried at any time when there is an encroachment within 33 feet of the center of the highway. We further find that this fence is made of iron or steel and that the County Road Commission had heretofore contemplated repairing the fence but had not been able to do so because the County mechanics who worked on iron have been otherwise necessarily engaged all summer. County mechanics who worked on iron have been otherwise necessarily engaged all summer. Further that provision should be made to move this fence to a distance of 33 feet from the center of the road so that there is not the probability of again damaging it and so as to abate a traffic situation arising from parking cars near the church.

For all of the above reasons the joint Committee has recommended to the County Road Commission that they negotiate with the Finnish Evangelical Lutheran Church to move the fence back and re-erect it in proper condition on a line 33 feet from

the center of the highway.

Attention Mr. K. I. Sawyer:

We, the undersigned property owners on County Road KB, known as the Saux Head Road, protest the proposed widening and grading of this road. We believe this road is wide enough to carry its small amount of traffic as it is. A great number of large pine and other trees would have to be cut down in the widening of this road to standard width, thereby destroying much of the scenic value of the shore of this lake. As this road does not serve any farming or commercial area, but serves a small resort location of a few people only, the scenic value of the area is the only reason for the existence of this road.

It is not necessary to widen this road for snow plowing reasons as it need not be kept open in the winter. Only one family lives at the North end of the lake through the winter, that family being employed at Loma Farms. This family uses a private road plowed in winter around the other side of the lake to the Loma Farms. The only other people living the year around on this road are Mr. and Mrs. Klepac, whose signatures appear on this letter of protest.

The five people petitioning for widening of this road own a total of four hundred feet frontage on it and none of them live there in the winter, whereas those whose names are signed hereon own a total of over three thousand feet frontage, and one of whom lives there

No reasons showing the need of a wider road having been given, we ask you to express our views on this matter to the proper committee at its meeting.

Gentlemen:--Your Committee on Buildings, Grounds and Insurance beg leave to submit the following report on our tour of inspection of all County Buildings and Grounds on the days of September 22nd and 23rd, 1939.

The inspection tour included Champion Beach, Marquette County Road Commission office, warehouse and grounds, Airport, Morgan Heights Sanitarium, Fair Grounds, County Infirmary, Court House, Jail and Juvenile Detention Home.

At Champion Beach we found everything satisfactory and all equipment stored in place for the winter. We highly recommend Mr. Bert Gaboury for his efficient service as custodian of the Park and were given the following statistics pertaining to patronage for the 1939 season: for the 1939 season:

In regard to the Fair Grounds, if Marquette County continues the fair, we recommend installation of more and better men's toilets. Otherwise the grounds are in

At the Infirmary we found everything in A-1 condition and were more than pleased with the efficient work being done by the Custodian, Mr. Morrison.

As to the Jail proper, we recommend that all bars and sash on the outside be painted sometime in the future when weather permits, possibly next spring.

As to the other properties inspected and mentioned above, we found things in the usual good order and it is our earnest belief that all Department heads are coperating 100 per cent.

The new Welfare statute and other pertinent matters were discussed at considerable length and a diagrammatic analysis of Senate Enrolled Act No. 137 was presented to each member of the Board to assist in the study and discussion.

The matter of the office space needed and the request to be made to the Board of Supervisors for such space and the statement of the purpose for which such space was wanted was taken up.

For the majority Mr. Sawyer then presented the following request, viz.: that the space in the Court House now occupied by the office of the Agricultural Agent and School Commissioner including the space now converted into storage room by temporary and School Commissioner including the space now converted into storage room by temporary partition and the room heretofore used by the E.R.A. be granted to the Social Welfare Board and in these quarters be housed the headquarters of the Bureau of Social Aid and a branch of the Department of Social Welfare, that the rooms of the City Hall in Negaunee that the City will furnish be utilized and a branch of the Bureau of Social Aid and a branch of the Department of Social Welfare be housed therein. That the rooms that are available in the Marquette County Road Commission office in Ishpeming, Michigan, including one room in the vault on lower floor be furnished in which would be housed the Headquarters of the Department of Social Welfare and a branch of the Bureau of Social Aid. Mr. Sawyer stated that this was the report of the majority of the Social Welfare Board and requested that Mr. Jacques be allowed to present the minority report. Mr. Jacques addressed the Board and expressed his thanks for his appoint-ment to the Social Welfare Board and presented the minority report of the Social Welfare Board which follows:

Gentlemen: --In the report submitted by the Social Welfare Board of this County for your consideration at this meeting, it is recommended that the headquarters and general office of the Social Welfare Board of this County, including the Director and principal assistants, be located at Ishpeming and that the Old Age Assistance division be located at

Marquette, as at present.

I wish to advise your honorable body that I am in entire disagreement with the

I wish to advise your honorable body that I am in entire disagreement with the majority of the County Welfare Board on this recommendation, because I believe that the general headquarters of the Marquette County Commission for Social Welfare should be at the county seat here in Marquette, where it properly belongs, providing the Board of Supervisors is able to make adequate space available.

The Chairman of the Buildings and Grounds Committee, Mr. Mongrain, offered the necessary space in pleasant, well ventilated rooms, which I feel will amply take care of the needs of this new organization. There would, of course, be a branch at Negaunee of about three people and a branch at Ishpeming with four or five people to take care of the case load of those cities and contiguous territory, with the general headquarters and staff at the Court House at Marquette. The experience of the past several years indicates that the case load of the City of Marquette is slightly in excess of the combined load of the cities of Ishpeming and Negaunee.

The present general office of the E.R.A. at Ishpeming is not adequate to

the cities of Ishpeming and Negaunee.

The present general office of the E.R.A. at Ishpeming is not adequate to properly house an office staff. It is a basement quarters, damp, few windows, poor ventilation and artificial lighting. As Chairman of the Emergency Welfare Relief Commission for six years, I very much appreciate the consideration extended by the County Road Commission in allowing us the facilities of their building. This is particularly true in view of the fact that we were not able, when organizing the E.R.A., to get suitable space at the Court House. Now that this is no longer the case and that pleasant rooms are available, also that this is no longer an emergency commission but a permanent organization, I feel we should have permanent and acceptable quarters, which will facilitate the work and meet necessities of situation better, to have general headquarters at County Court House in the same manner as other County departments. Inasmuch as the new state welfare law makes it incumbent upon the Board of Supervisors to provide quarters for the Social Welfare Commission of each county and also that the headquarters of the Board of Supervisors of this County are in Marquette, I wish to recommend to your honorable body that the general headquarters of the Marquette Department of Social Welfare should be in the

Mr. Jacques took his seat and Mr. Sawyer resumed the floor and made a statement that inasmuch as Mr. Jacques did not argue the minority report that he would present no arguments on the majority report unless a request was made. No request was made.

The Chairman ruled there was a question before the house and the motion by Supervisor Lindstrom was out of order and that the question was on the motion by Supervisor Perring as amended by Supervisor Nicholas.

Supervisor Nicholas requested that a secret ballot be taken and the Chairman so ordered and appointed Supervisors Jernstad and Price as tellers

Ballot was taken and Supervisor Jernstad reported that there were twenty-six ballots to approve the motion of Supervisor Perring (this would place the Headquarters office of the Department of Social Welfare in Ishpening, Michigan), and that there were eleven votes against approval of the motion by Supervisor Perring, and also one blank ballot.

The Chairman declared the motion of Supervisor Perring carried and the majority request of the Social Welfare Board granted.

Mr. Sawyer then took the floor and for the Social Welfare Board recommended that no changes be made in personnel or administrative procedure at the County Infirmary. Supervisor Mongrain moved the adoption of the above. Supported by Supervisor Gribble and carried unanimously.

Mr. Sawyer resumed the floor and called the Board's attention to the fact that there was no question but that approval of the salary to be paid the Director was required, that he believed there was an implied requirement in the statute for the Board to approve the number of persons to be employed by the County Social Welfare Board and salary to be paid each and that he did not believe it was in the province of the Board of Supervisors to pass on the personnel to be placed in the various positions on the staff, but that in the spirit of cooperation and to secure advice the Social Welfare Board reported they had selected the following staff and recommended the approval of the staff and salaries as listed below.

Your Buildings, Grounds and Insurance Committee report: In the matter of furnishing the rooms formerly occupied by the School Commissioner and the Agricultural Agent and the E. R. A. to the County Social Welfare Board as was ordered by your Board at the October, 25th, 1939 meeting.

This has been accomplished by placing the School Commissioner in the offices formerly occupied by the Superintendents of the Poor, the County Agricultural Agent in W. P. A. field survey office, the Extension workers formerly in the

Agricultural Agent's office into the office formerly occupied by the County Welfare Agent and the Welfare Agent into the office adjoining the Register of Deeds.

In making these changes we found it necessary to make certain repairs to rugs, floors, etc., and to paint up some very dirty and badly scarred walls.

We recommend approval of doing this work which had to be done forthwith to make it possible for the new Board to start functioning.

It also developed that if the County would permit use of the room adjoining the Supervisor's Room formerly used by the Old Age Assistance Bureau it was possible to secure the U.P. Headquarters of the State Bureau of Social Security. This would be of great advantage to the County in handling Aid to Dependent Children, Aid to the Blind, etc. Immediate decision was necessary and we have received this office by providing the required space, and request approval of your Board in this action.

A splendid illuminating, oral report of attendance at the State Association of Supervisors annual meeting at Lansing, was given by Supervisors Jernstad and Nicholas, the delegates who represented Marquette County at the meeting. The importance of membership in the Association was stressed and it was also pointed out that Boards of Supervisors seeking to influence legislation should forward their material to the Secretary of the State Association who would in turn have it printed and mailed out to all the Boards for study and to turn their findings over to their respective delegates for submission at the State Convention. Also, that it was very important, regardless of politics, for the Upper Peninsula to select candidates to the legislature with extreme care.

The resolutions adopted at the State Association meeting should be printed in the minutes of this meeting, it was suggested by Supervisor Nicholas.

Supervisor Jernstad moved the Board adopt the report of the delegates to the Convention, supported by Supervisor Lindstrom and carried.

The resolutions adopted by the State Association follow:

Resolved by the State Association of Supervisors, That Section 7 of the general property tax law, as last amended by Act 232 of the Public Acts of 1939, be amended so that the exemption with respect to the real estate owned by any Boy or Girl Scout organization, or like organization, be restricted to 160 acres of land and the buildings thereon.

Resolved, by the State Association of Supervisors, That if a special session of the Michigan legislature should be called, that a \$1,000,000 appropriation be made to the State department of social welfare to be expended as state contribution in conjunction with counties and local governments as sponsor contributions to obtain WPA projects, said appropriation to be expended with the approval of a coordinator of W. P.A. projects, which office shall be established in the state department of social welfare, and that an additional sum of \$2,000,000 from the gasoline tax shall be appropriated for such purposes for street and highway improvements worked out through county, city and township governing bodies with respect to streets and highways within the boundaries thereof.

Resolved by the State Association of Supervisors. That the

Resolved by the State Association of Supervisors, That the boards of supervisors of those counties lying north of and including the counties of Oceana, Newaygo, Mecosta, Isabella, Midland and Arenac, join any appropriate legal court proceedings on behalf of a taypayer in any of such counties to test the constitutionality of the provisions of Act No.155 of the Public Acts of 1939, relative to lands delinquent for taxes and deeded to the department of conservation.

Resolved by the State Association of Supervisors, That the state of Michigan, and all political sub-divisions thereof, which may acquire the title of real estate, including title acquired through operation of the laws of this state with respect to delinquent taxes, shall notify the assessing officer of the township or city in which such real estate is situated, of the facts that the title has been acquired by the state or other political sub-division, before the completion of the assessment roll by the assessing officer, or in any event before the final meeting of the board or review, and that legislation be enacted, if such notice is not given, that such property shall be fully assessable the same as if owned by a private individual.

Resolved by the State Association of Supervisors, That legislation be enacted that a sum equal to one-third of all sales tax revenue be earmarked for return to the various counties of this state in accordance with population for all forms of relief, except old age assistance, retaining a percentage thereof to be expended by the state department of social welfare as an equalization fund for relief purposes in the several counties in accordance with need.

Resolved by the State Association of Supervisors, That the disabilities with respect to eligibility of members of the boards of supervisors with respect to positions in local government be eliminated in counties of 60,000 population or over, so as to place such counties on the same basis as counties under 60,000.

Resolved by the State Association of Supervisors, That the statutes be amended so as to provide for the collection of delinquent personal property taxes by the county treasurer in the same manner as the delinquent real estate taxes are collected.

Resolved by the State Association of Supervisors, That the intangible tax act be amended, if the legislature is convened in special session, to move up the operation thereof with respect to the collection of the tax one year, and to eliminate the double ceiling.

Whereas, a committee from the state association of supervisors was active in formulating and passing Milk Bill No. 116, Public Actal46, such a bill providing for a state milk board and placing in its hands legal power to secure to milk producers a reasonable price for fliud milk; and

Whereas, such legislation has thus far failed to fulfill

all the hopes of its sponsors and of the milk producers generally; now therefore be it

Resolved by the State Association of Supervisors, That the state milk board is hereby urged to use every means possible to secure to the milk producers that fair and reasonable price based on cost of production that was the declared objective of Bill No. 116.

Resolved by the State Association of Supervisors, That the welfare statute be amended so that mothers' pensions, soldiers and sailors relief to inmates in infirmaries, provided for and paid by the counties, shall be considered matchable funds by the state with respect to relief. (If the previous resolution with respect to return of relief funds to the counties is not enacted into law).

Whereas, the operation of motor vehicles has become a grave menace to the safety of the highway users and has, during the past five years, taken the lives of more than 8,000 Michigan residents, maimed or injured more than 100,000 and has property and other losses of many millions of dollars and

Whereas, these sacrifices can be reduced or prevented only by the concerted action and the assumption by every citizen of the responsibility to develop and co-ordinate state-wide endeavor to promote uniformity in traffic engineering, enforcement, education and in traffic law observation, now therefore be it

Resolved by the State Association of Supervisors, That the several County Road Commissions, sheriffs and prosecuting attorneys be urged to attend and participate in state conferences and programs held in the interest of traffic safety in order to better acquaint themselves with the problems and methods of preventing traffic accidents, to learn how local conditions compare with those in other parts of the state and to participate in such manner as will promote not only the best interests of the county, but also contribute to the betterment of conditions generally throughout the state.

Resolved, by the State Association of Supervisors, That the officers and directors be authorized to set up a revolving fund for the purpose of furnishing to assessing officers certain forms approved by the state tax commission, heretofore furnished by the state and also be authorized to take such action as shall be deemed necessary to carry into full effect, including the drafting of bills, the several resolutions adopted at the state convention.

Supervisor Stakel addressed the Board and stated that the State was still in arrears over \$1,900.00° for money advanced the office of the Welfare Agent and that this was a definite State obligation and should be paid.

Supervisor Stakel moved that the matter be referred to the Budget and Executive Committee, the Judge of Probate, Welfare Agent, County Treasurer and Prosecuting Attorney, to see if some means could be devised to collect the money so advanced at an early date. In the matter of the County Infirmary.

Gentlemen: -- Your Welfare Board feels that our staff at the Infirmary have been doing a commendable job at operating the Infirmary. What we have to bring up here is in no sense a reflection on their operations. However, the following matters with regard to the Infirmary which we feel should be cited for attention and such action as may be de-

First, the Infirmary building is of brick veneer construction and from forty to fifty people are constantly housed in this building, many of whom sleep on the upper or third floor. We believe that these people are subjected to a fire hazard for which Marquette County should not continue to be responsible and to which your Welfare Board does not like to be a party.

Second, we are advised pursuant to an opinion given by the Attorney General of the State, that the State will not participate in the cost of relief granted at the Infirmary. We further understand that if these persons at the Infirmary were taken care of through cash aid that the State would in that case bear one-half the cost of the

Third, so long as these people are inmates of the Infirmary they are not eligible for Old Age assistance, many of whom would be if they were taken care of through cash aid or general relief. Old Age assistance costs are entirely at Federal and

It would appear that serious consideration should be given to closing the Infirmary and taking care of the inmates therein through general relief. Further, if disposition is to be made so the farm may be used this season this should be done at an

We recommend that your Board delegate authority so some suitable committee to meet with the County Social Welfare Board to consider this matter and report their findings with recommendations to your Board at an early meeting.

The State Social Welfare Commission would appreciate your keeping this important matter before you, and that the County Board of Supervisors insists that the County Tax Allocation Board allocates adequate millage to the county in order that suffic ient funds will be available for social welfare purposes in your county during the next fiscal year, in accordance with Act 280 of the Public Acts of Michigan, 1939.

It is further requested that a copy of the estimated budget of your County Department of Social Welfare be sent to this department, together with a copy of the pre-liminary order approving a maximum tax rate for the purposes of each local unit, before the final order of the County Tax Allocation Board is made. It is also requested that a copy of this letter be incorporated in the min-utes of the County Board of Supervisors and County Social Welfare Boards as a permanent

record.

In the near future a representative of the State Department of Social Welfare will call upon the Chairmen of the County Board of Supervisors, the County Social Welfare Board, and the County Clerk to discuss and possibly arrive at some definite understanding as to the amount of millage necessary for the social welfare department needs in your county.

Gentlemen:--Your Budget and Executive Committee met with the County Welfare Board on March llth. In addition to transacting the routine monthly business, the activities and financial trend in matters handled by the Welfare Board were reviewed and as Acting Secretary of the meeting I was directed to write your Board and give you these characteristic fig-

ures showing trends.

In the table immediately following costs per month for the portion of the relief load now carried by the Board of Social Welfare, are compared horizontally with costs of the same relief load when handled by the County Emergency Relief Administration and the Superintendents of the Poor.

It should be pointed out that Aid to Dependent Children cases are now handled by the Bureau of Social Aid and that therefor to get comparable figures the sum of the total costs to the E.R.A. and Poor Department for months shown have been reduced by the cost of these A.D.C. cases. The table mentioned is as follows, viz:

Attention should be called to the per capita costs. It will be noted that under the Welfare Board they have varied from 48.2 cents the first month the Board was in operation down to 36.6 cents this past month as compared with a range of 50.6 cents to 56.4 cents for the last previous year.

One member of the Welfare Board pointed out that operations were now on a schedule which if maintained for a year would very closely equal and but slightly exceed the money made available for this year's budget by your Board plus what we now believe the County will receive from the State, and that the trend towards a heavy over-draft called to your attention last October is now corrected but that no part of the over-run created before the new Board started has been compensated for so that some overdraft for the year must be expected. They further believe that most of the leaks have been stopped and that from now on only occasional cases will be found which will need correction.

referred to me to report on at the next meeting.

Following the last meeting I conferred with Mr. John Walsh, Marquette City Attorney, and we again reviewed the dog law. We were in substantial agreement that the state dog law could best be enforced by the appointment of a county-wide dog warden. Such a warden would have to be appointed by the Board of Supervisors and paid by the county. No such appointment has been made.

Mr. Walsh and I also discussed the possibility of the various cities in the county handling the dog question by city ordinances. During this discussion Mr. Walsh raised the legal question of whether the cities could legislate on the dog question, in view of the state law on the subject.

Following our meeting on March 29, 1940 I wrote the Attorney General for a

Following our meeting, on March 29, 1940 I wrote the Attorney General for a clarifying opinion on this subject. Up to today, April 16, 1940, I have had no response. I therefore cannot give you a complete report at this time on the possibility of handling

the dog question by city ordinances.

Your Budget and Executive Committee desire to make the following report with reference to the subject matter of the communication from Supervisor Lawrence Ewing.

Referring to the communication of Supervisor Ewing relative to the County Welfare Agent, which was referred to the Budget and Executive Committee at the March meeting, it appears that inasmuch as the Board of Supervisors has no power to appoint or discharge or remove said Agent, any complaints regarding his activities should be directed

to those persons who possess such powers.

In this connection, however, this Committee recommends that this Board pass a resolution requiring that all homes where dependent or neglected children are placed, and whose care is paid for out of County funds, shall henceforth be first duly licensed and duly approved by the State Social Welfare Commission, and the County Treasurer shall be instructed not to honor any warrants or pay out any money for board or expenses unless such home shall first have been duly licensed and meets the requirements set forth, and has been duly approved by the State Social Welfare Commission.

Gentlemen: For more than five years it has been my privilege and duty to serve in the

capacity of County Welfare Agent for Marquette County. During that time I have constantly been in very close contact with the Board of Supervisors, both collectively and individually. Therefore I feel it proper, with the termination of my affiliation with the office of County Welfare Agent, that I express to you my appreciation for the assistance which you have given to me and to the child welfare program in the past few years.

Also, I believe that, in fairness to you and to your past faith in me, I ought to explain certain circumstances regarding my removal. Recently the Judge of Probate of Marquette County has made public statements in connection with his recommendation for the appointment of my successor which seem to those of us who are acquainted with the true facts to throw a false light on the circumstances surrounding

acquainted with the true facts to throw a false light on the circumstances surrounding the alleged "disobedience" and "misconduct" of the writer.

The Honorable Judge Khoury has indicated that the failure of the writer to place a certain ward of the court in a licensed boarding home, as had been ordered by the court, constitutes "disobedience" and "misconduct". It is alleged that an order of the court, made on August 31st, 1938, is clear proof of the writer's guilt in this matter. The aforementioned court order was the Judge's own written record guilt in this matter. The aforementioned court order was the sugges own written record of his decision in the case of eight children who were removed from their parents on grounds of neglect. At the time of the official hearing, the Probate Judge asked the writer, who was also present at the hearing, if there were boarding homes available for these children and the writer indicated to the court that it would be necessary to inthese children and the writer indicated to the court that it would be necessary to increase the number of boarding homes used by the court before eight children could be cared for and that the writer would not be able to recommend homes at that time, but would attempt to do so at the earliest possible time. The Judge, thereupon, ordered the children made wards of the court and placed in boarding homes, but returned the children to the custody of the parents until such time as the writer might recommend suitable homes for them. No mention was made at the time of hearing that these homes should be licensed homes. However, it appears that when the Probate Judge wrote the order into his court record the

them. No mention was made at the time of hearing that these homes should be licensed homes However, it appears that when the Probate Judge wrote the order into his court record the term "licensed boarding homes" was used. This order was never seen by the writer until a short time ago. Court orders involving the many other cases in which children were taken into custody and placed in boarding care by the court will clearly indicate that it was not the Judge's usual custom to use the term "licensed home" in the order of commitment, and as he personally told the writer on several occasions in the past two weeks, he himself does not know how he "happened" to include the word "licensed" in this particular order.

Following the hearing on August 31st, it was necessary for the writer to be out of the county for several days, during which time it appears that conditions in the home where the eight children were living became more acute and it was necessary to make immediate plans for them. As a result, on September 2nd, 1938, two girls of this family were placed in the LaBranche home upon the authority of the court and entirely without the knowledge or recommendation of the Welfare Agent. Records in the County Clerk's files will reveal that the Judge authorized payment of board to the LaBranche family for these girls from that date (September 2nd, 1938) until the time of their removal by the county wlefare agent, on the day when the first complaint concerning this home was made.

county wlefare agent, on the day when the first complaint concerning this home was made.

That these children remained in the LaBranche home until March 15th, That these children remained in the Labranche home until March 15th, 1940 can be explained by the fact that the home was approved, but not licensed, since no homes in which court wards were boarded were in the habit of being licensed. Our office had been furnished with information that under the juvenile court laws such children could be placed in boarding homes not licensed by the State Welfare Department without violation of the boarding license law. At the time when these children were removed from the La-Branche home, all of the foster homes in which court wards were boarded were approved, but not licensed. An approved home was investigated with the same care as one which was licensed; the home itself was studied and collateral references interviewed regarding the advisability of placing children in the home. Had we been operating under a policy of advisability of placing children in the home. Had we been operating under a policy of licensing homes in which court wards were placed, there is no doubt but that all would have been licensed, since any licensing by the state department in this county, was done on my recommendation. In other words the approved home was selected with the same care as a licensed home and the unfortunate incident in the LaBranche home could not have been avoided by the process of licensing.

It is unfortunate that present-day, scientific processes for evaluating human personality are not sufficiently developed to insure society against unforseen disruptions of emotional stability such as those which occurred in the LaBranche home.

The cooperation of the lay public in providing those who are responsible for the welfare The cooperation of the tay public in providing those who are responsible for the wellare of hundreds of children with any observations or impressions regarding the well being of children, in whatever home they may be, would be most useful in the conservation and protection of those children who so desperately need security.

The matter of posting reward posters for game law violations referred to this Committee at the last meeting of the Board, was discussed.

Mr. Jones said such posting of reward notices would have a

moral and psychological effect on the populace, tending to act as a detterent to game law violation. Also that insofar as he knew, no person had claimed the reward in other counties practicing this program, because they did not want the attendant publicity. He also stated that the Conservation Department would cooperate in posting the signs at no expense to the County.

Mr. Trudell and Mr. Fontaine were of the same opinion and also pledged the help of the Sportsmen's Clubs in posting the signs.

After much discussion it was moved and supported that the Committee recommend to the Board the purchase of 500 of these signs at an approximate expense of \$50.00. Said signs to read as follows:

"\$50.00 Reward will be paid to any person or persons furnishing information to the Department of Conservation or any of its officers that leads to the arrest and conviction of any person or persons who take, catch or kill, or attempt to take, catch or kill fish of any kind by the use of any explosive substance or by the use of any nets contrary to the laws of this state in any of the inland lakes or streams of Marquette County.

\$25.00 Reward will be paid to any person or persons furnishing information to the Department of Conservation or any of its officers that leads to the arrest and conviction of any person or persons who violate any of the following game laws in Marquette County.

lst. Illegal Possession of Venison.
2nd. Possession of Illegal Venison.
3rd. Killing or Attempting to Kill
Deer During the Closed Season

thereon.

By order: Marquette County Board of Supervisors, Marquette, Michigan.
Such information may be supplied by notifying the nearest Conservation Officer or the District Headquarters office, Marquette, Michigan, by telephone, charges collect."

Your Committee therefore recommends that the Board of Supervisors post such reward notices and recommend the purchase of the above posters printed on a muslin cloth background and further that the proposal be let out on bids as in this manner the cost would approximate \$50.00.

A resolution from the Chippewa County Board of Supervisors advocating the prevention and suppression of forest fires and pledging their assistance to reduce man-caused fires, was read. Supervisor Gribble moved the Board concur in the resolution. Supported by Supervisor Weiland and carried.

At this juncture Mr. K. I. Sawyer was called upon to explain details of the federal food stamp plan, which matter was postponed at the last meeting. Mr. Sawyer stated the plan is a procedure in which federal surplus commodities are made available to the relief clients through the regular channels of retail trade. The plan, if adopted, would replace distribution of food by the Federal Surplus Commodities Corporation in Marquette County, Mr. Sawyer said. The stamps would be another form of legal tender with which to buy food. A direct relief client would be issued orange stamps which could be used to purchase any food in the retail stores cooperating, and the blue stamps would be used to purchase surplus commodities as listed by the government. The amount of blue stamps issued would constitute 50 per cent of the amount of gold stamps issued. In the same manner a W.P.A. worker could purchase the gold stamps and receive 50 per cent of that amount in blue stamps for purchasing surplus commodities. Before the plan could be adopted, Mr. Sawyer explained, it would be necessary to get the cooperation of wholesale and retail grocers and also the banks and in addition it would be necessary to appropriate approximate-of these stamps the fund would be maintained through money obtained from W.P.A. and other relief clients by their purchase of these stamps. However, before he would recommend the plan, Mr. Sawyer suggested that some member of the Board be authorized to attend the National Conference of Social Welfare at Grand Rapids, Michigan and that while there, the member appointed to attend, could obtain first hand information on the food stamp plan, as the plan was in effect in the City of Grand Rapids, Michigan and that Wir. Nelson, Director of the County Social Welfare Board, would attend and that if some member of the Board were appointed to could accompany Mr. Nelson to Grand Rapids, Michigan so that he could study the food stamp plan in conjunction with the National Conference on Social Welfare to be held there. Supervisor Stakel addressed the Board and spoke of the money heretofore advanced to the County Welfare Agent and Mrs. Havican in the amount of \$1992.00 which amount was to be reimbursed by the state. He stated that all but \$189.08 had been collected on Mrs. Havican's account and about \$685.00 on the Welfare Agent's account and was optimistic about collecting the balance. Supervisor Stakel also brought up the matter of the status of Mrs. Havican, which had been referred to the Prosecuting Attorney for opinion by the Budget and Executive Committee. The Prosecutor advised the Committee that the Michigan Crippled Children's Commission and suggested the parties concerned be apprised of her status. Supervisor Perring thereupon moved the County Clerk be instructed to write the County Treasurer, Probate Judge and Mrs. Havican to the effect that it should be underof her status. Supervisor Ferring thereupon moved the County Clerk be instructed to write the County Treasurer, Probate Judge and Mrs. Havican to the effect that it should be understood that Mrs. Havican has not been and is not to be considered a County employee or agent and that no expenses or salary for any services she may perform are to be paid from County funds. Above motion supported by Supervisor Nicholas and unanimously carried.

Supervisor Lindstrom brought up the matter of the dog question

and asked if anything had been done about it. Supervisor Nicholas said he understood the matter was going through the proper channels and asked the Prosecutor if he had any report to make inasmuch as action was deferred until a report was forthcoming from the Attorney General. The Prosecutor said the Attorney General had ruled that a City could establish its own dog control plan and bill the County. Supervisor Nicholas suggested among other things, that control be placed in the hands of the Sheriff's Department and locate the Dog Pound in the City of Negaunee as a central point. Supervisor VanRiper said the cities should establish their own control plan as it was of more concern to Cities than Townships Judge Sharp of Negaunee, Michigan told the Board he thought the Cities should have their to make inasmuch as action was deferred until a report was forthcoming from the Attorney Judge Sharp of Negaunee, Michigan told the Board he thought the Cities should have their own ordinances. Dr. Drury, Marquette City Health Officer, said the situation was acute and that at least one case of rabies had been uncovered in the City. Donald McCormick, Marquette Chief of Police, claimed the County Board should assume its share of responsibility and that it would be unfair to collect license fees in some parts of the County and not in others and that the County and City Officials would be held accountable by the public if any lives were lost through failure to control dogs. After much discussion, Supervisor Perring moved the whole question, with the suggestions of Supervisor Nicholas, be referred to the Budget and Executive Committee to report back to the Board at the next meeting.

There being no further business, on motion of Supervisor Jernstad, supported by Supervisor Price and carried, the Board adjourned until Monday, June 24, A. D. 1940 at 9:30 o'clock a.m., Daylight Saving Time.
