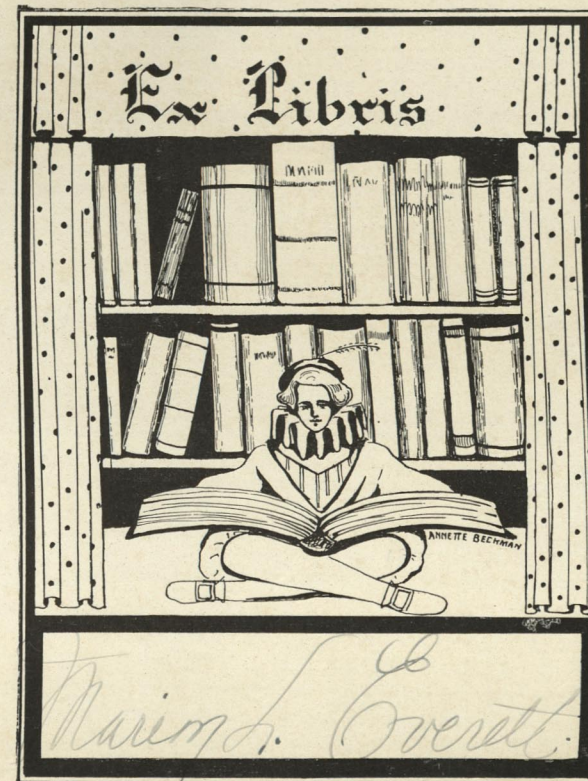

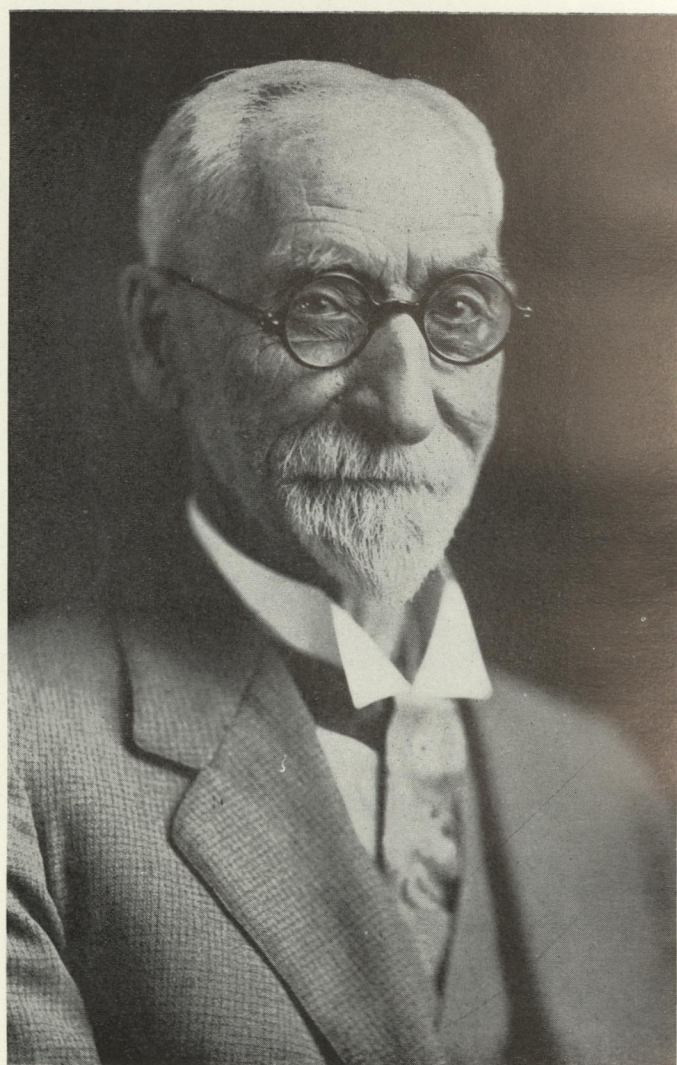

To Mr. Alfred M. Barry, the Grand Old Man of Northern, we dedicate this, the Kawbawgam of 1927.

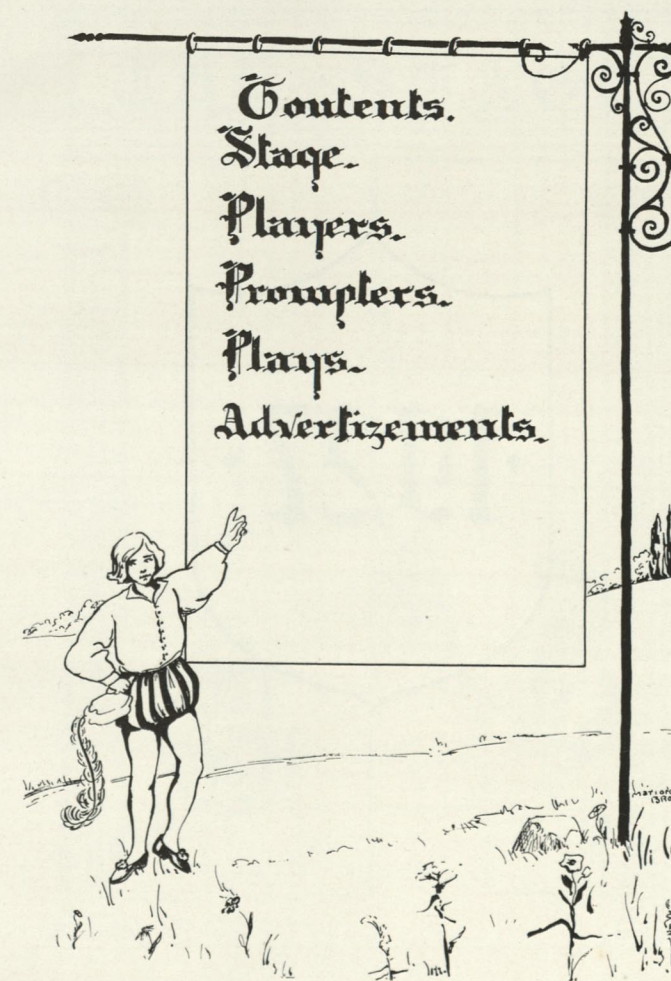

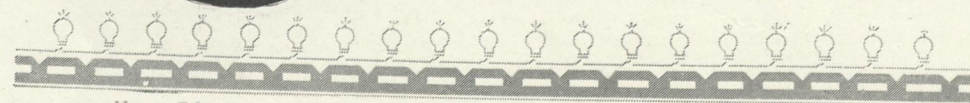


GERMAINE FISH

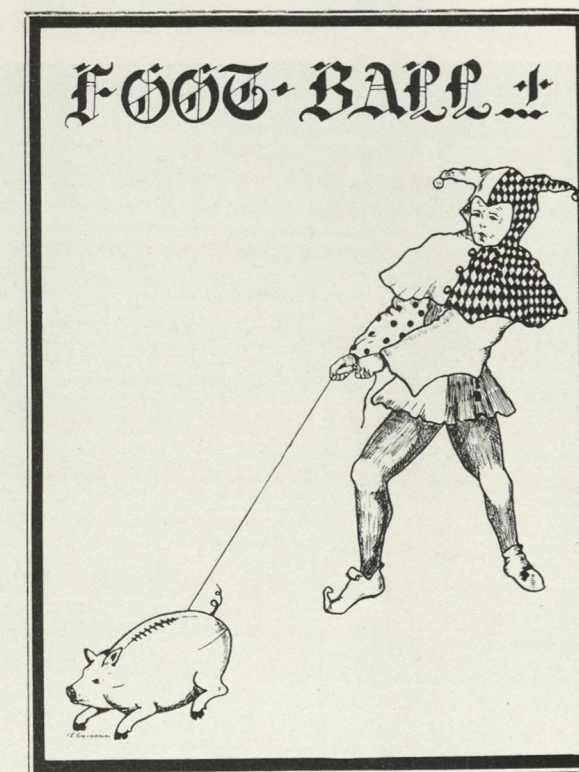
COACH HEDGCOCK

Football Season, '26

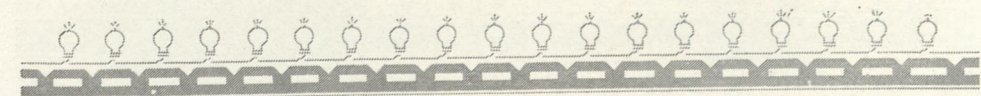
From the standpoint of games won, the present football season was the most successful Northern has enjoyed. With the team practically intact from last year, the opening of the season found Coach Hedgcock's men out to win laurels for the school.

The first game was with Oshkosh Normal, played there, on October 4, in a virtual sea of mud that made good football impossible. The Oshkosh team, while holding its opponents scoreless, succeeded in pushing the oval across our line twice, making the score 12-0.

The following week the team met Michigan Tech. Our men had spent the week in hard training, and consequently ran rough-shod over the Engineers to the strains of 25-3. Hemr's consistent punting and brilliant open-field running, together with the good defensive work of the line, resulted in four touchdowns, while all the Tech could collect was a drop kick.

On October 16, the team, accompanied by Coaches Hedgcock and Hurst, journeyed to Mt. Pleasant, where they met the strong Central Normal team. A fast and shifty backfield with a bag full of tricks was too much for our boys, and we lost, 24-7, not, however, without putting Central on the defensive in the final period of play.

After an enforced lay-off of two weeks, Northern met the team from Northland College, Wisconsin, at the Fair Grounds, on October 30. The teams were



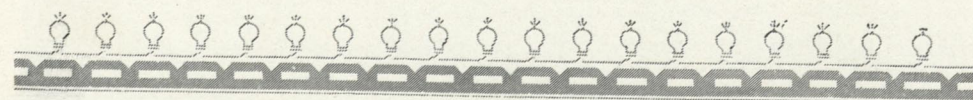


evenly matched, both possessing a heavy and fast forward wall. A well-played game resulted in a victory for us, 13-0.

The last game of the season, and by far the most thrilling, was that played with Superior Normal, November 6, at the Fair Grounds. The highly touted Wisconsin team came here as the champion of its district, with victories over some of the best teams in the Badger state. Possessing a heavy, fast and brainy team, and coached under the "Minnesota shift" style of play, Superior offered the toughest kind of opposition. But consistent, heady line-plunging and great defensive work, resulted in four touchdowns for Northern while Superior was unable to tally. Score 24-0.

It would be hard to pick out individual stars, but mention should here be given the team who so nobly upheld Northern's colors and "played the game." May this Northern spirit of "hold the line" be a part of our future teams.

With a nucleus of nine men, a host of second stringers, and a new gridiron, football prospects at Northern seem unusually bright.

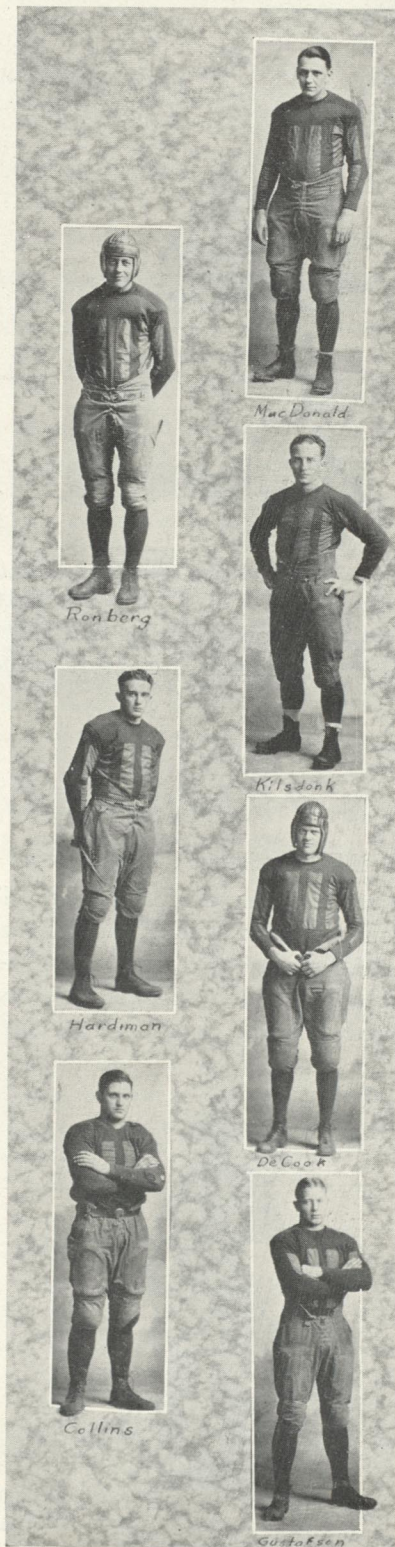

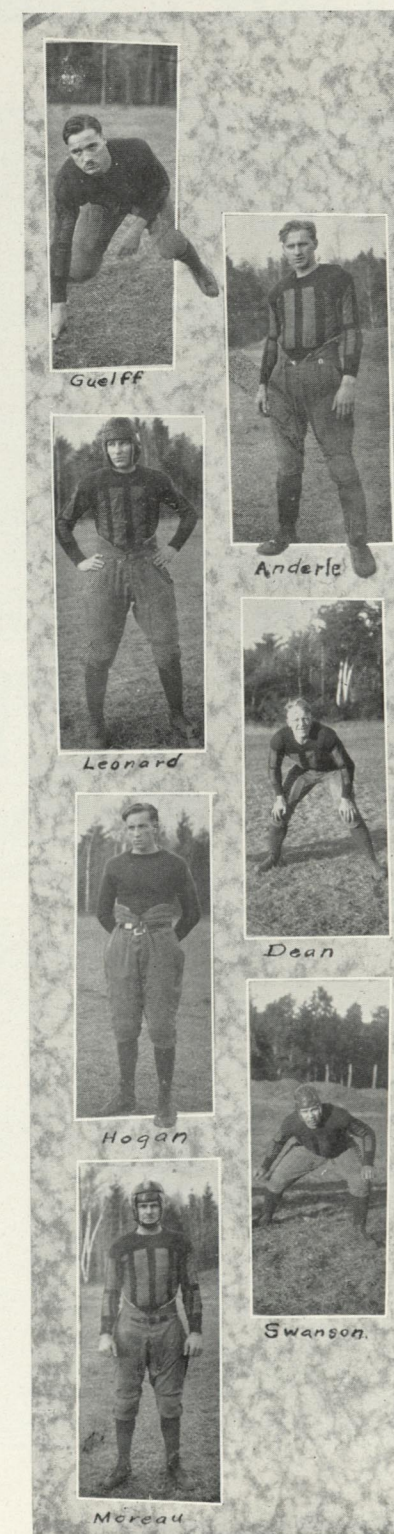

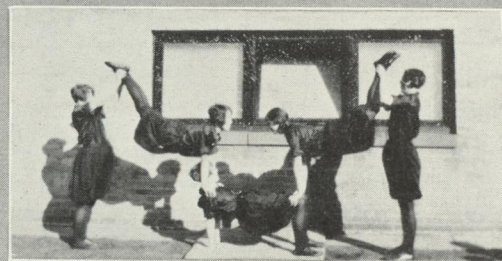

Basketball Season, '26-'27

The '26-'27 basketball team set a record that will be hard to beat when it won 11 of its 14 games, and established a precedent for playing non-state and non-conference teams.

With every member of last year's team back except Ferm, and the addition of several high school stars, Coach Hedgecock was able to place two teams on the floor in every game.

Calumet Lions opened the first game of a long season here on December 4, when they were taken into camp, 45-18.

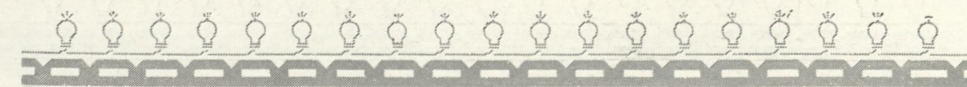
The following week we obtained sweet revenge for the football setback, when Oshkosh journeyed here and were handed a 37-28 drubbing.

Northland was our next foe on January 7, and the team had a comparatively easy time in giving them a 36-11 beating.

The next week our boys took their annual jaunt into Wisconsin territory, vanquishing Superior there on January 14, 30-25, and Northland again on the following night, 29-10, returning to outclass Michigan Tech on the home floor, 37-23, on January 21.

On January 29 the team journeyed to Houghton, and ran away with everything the Miners had to offer. Score, 59-10.

The following week the strong Ypsi team played Northern on the home





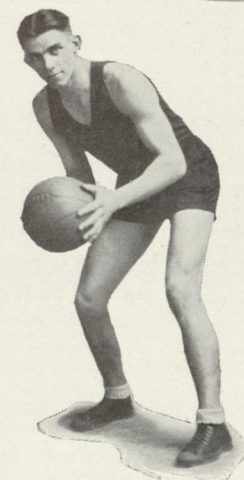
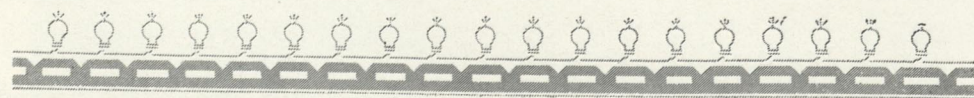
court. In a game replete with thrills, the down-staters succeeded in nosing out a 32-30 victory before the largest crowd of the year.

A second journey into the Badger state resulted in two more victories, Oshkosh being defeated 30-17 on February 22, and Stevens Point the following night, 31-30, after nearly convincing them they had won the game.

Superior came here on February 25 for the last home game of the year, and before a large and appreciative crowd received a 45-14 setback.

A trip down-state the following week ended the basketball season for Northern. On March 3 our team met Western, unbeaten in Michigan, and probably gave the best account of themselves when they held the Kazoo squad to a 32-25 win. The next night Ypsi took a listless game from us, 33-20. The following night our boys closed a very successful season by administering a 36-34 beating to Central. This trip did a lot in keeping Northern on the map.

In the best court record thus far, the team ran up a total of 490 points to 317 for its opponents. Although three of the regulars will be lost via the graduation route, Coach Hedgcock has enough veterans and prospective players to form an equally successful 1928 squad.

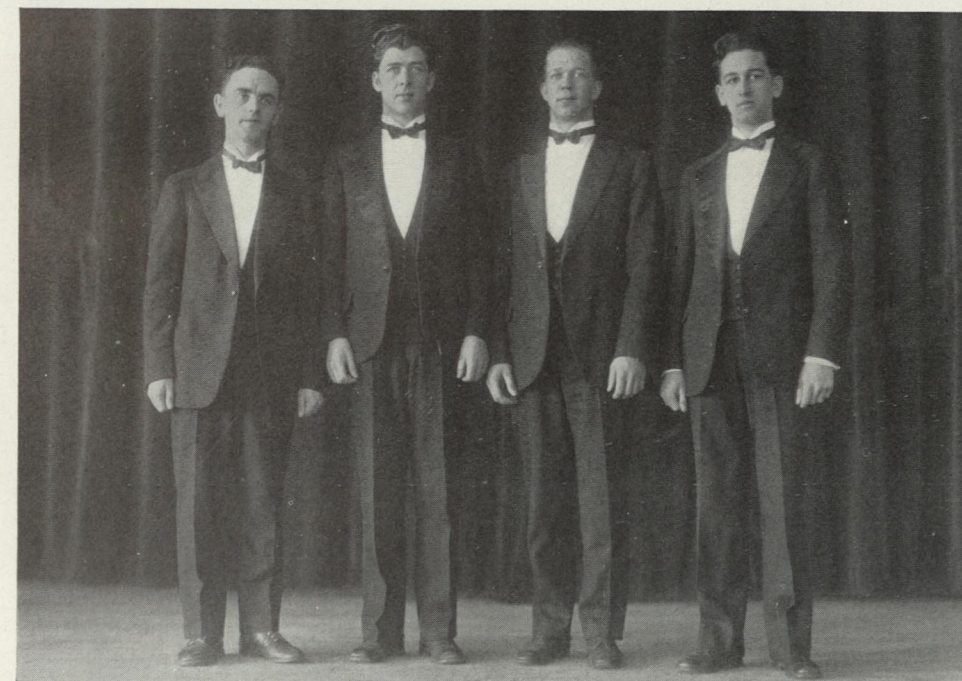
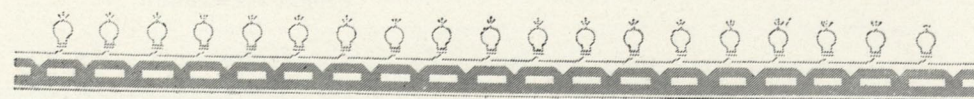




The String Quartet

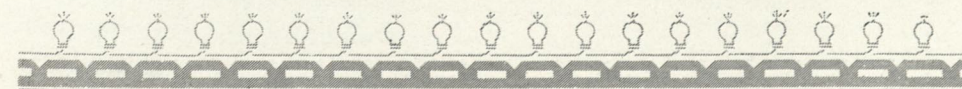


The Male Quartet

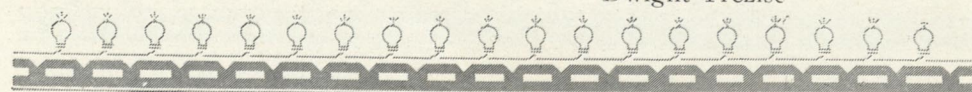

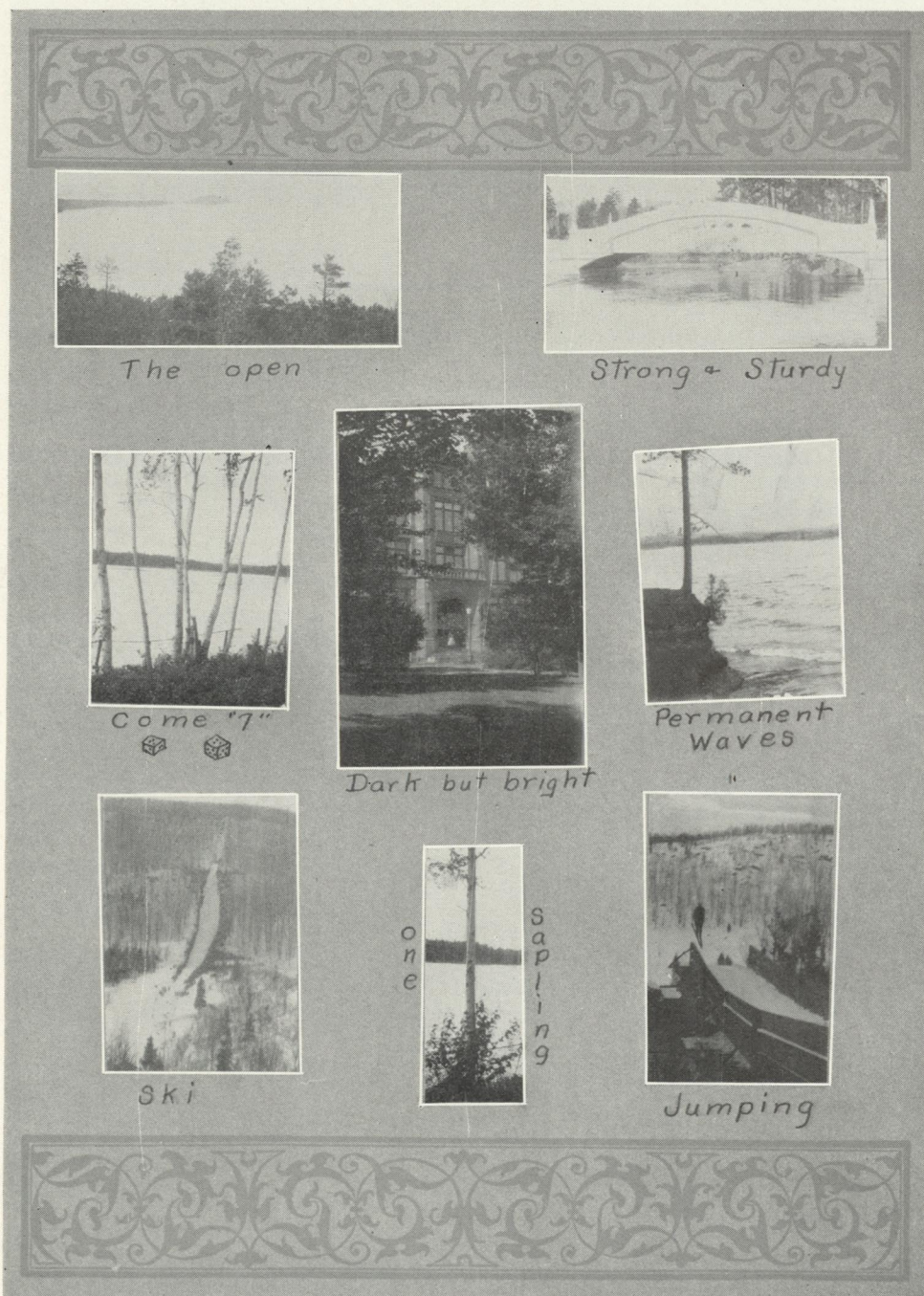

Sophomores—Norman Jeffery and James Bennet.

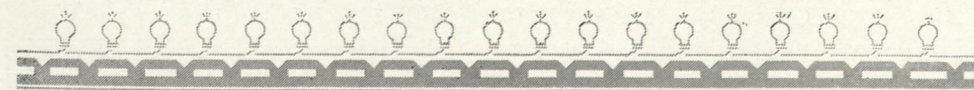

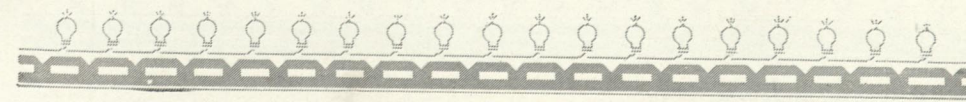


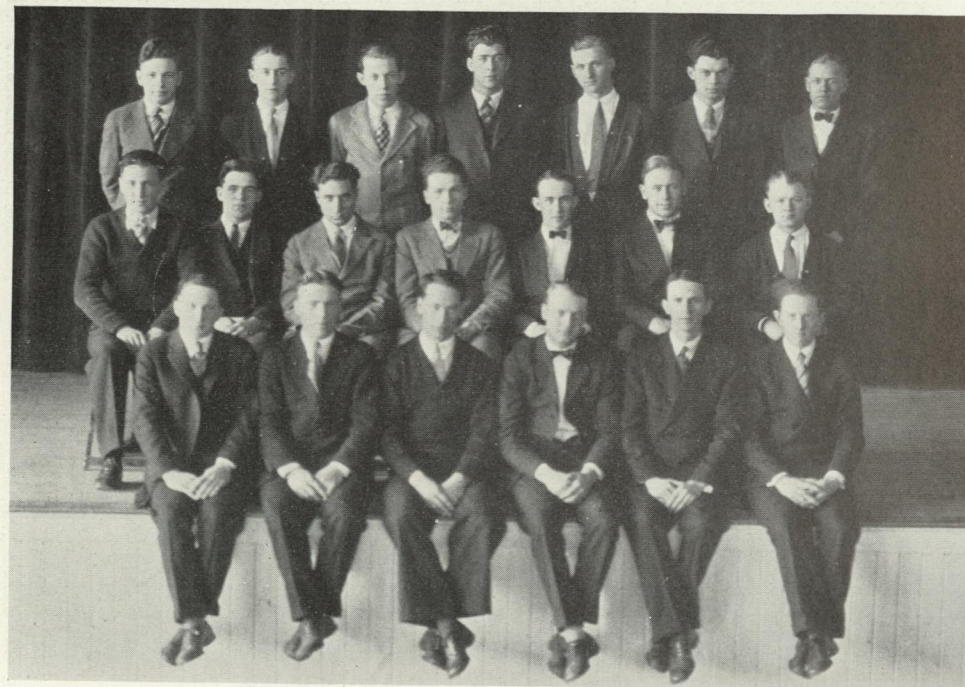
The Drama Club

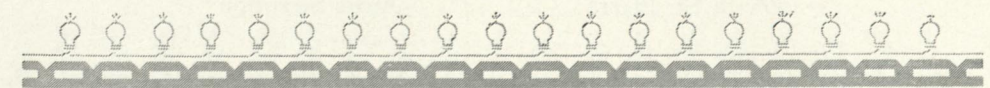
The Commercial Club swung into line early this year, and is going strong, as is evidenced by the number of students who attended the meetings.

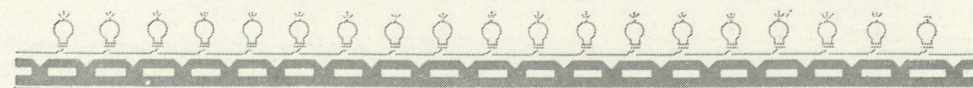

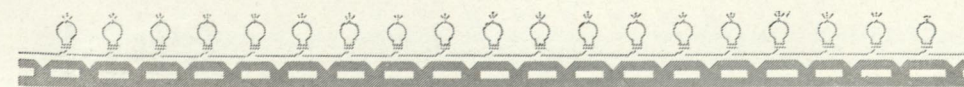

Professor A. L. Franzke, of Lawrence College, judged.

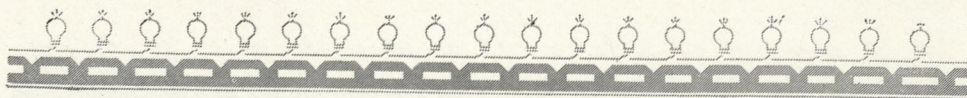
Yes, these representatives of Northern are all-round girls. They were active leaders in high school, and you know what they are doing at Northern!

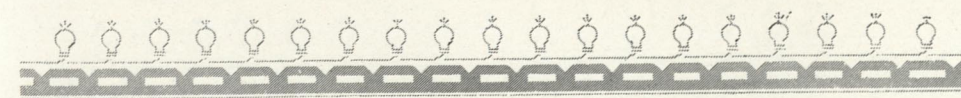

The Negative Intercollegiate Team

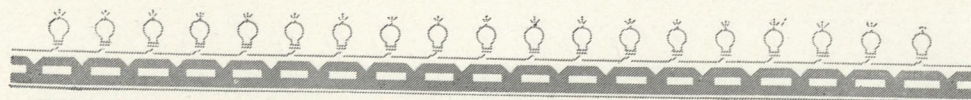

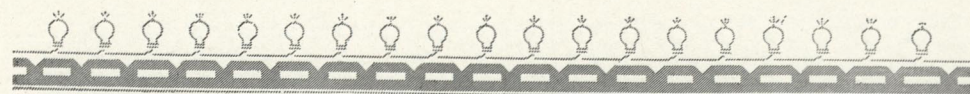
Minden Maynard of Marquette, Kenneth Erfft of Marquette, and Leo Gowden, of Florence, Wisconsin, composed the team.

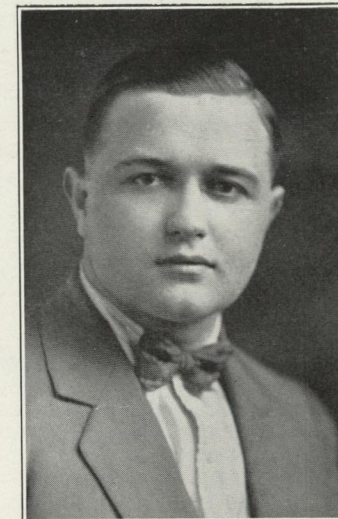
After spending a half day in Ann Arbor and a day and a half in Detroit, the team returned home with a determination to do all within its power to see that the situation would be reversed next year.

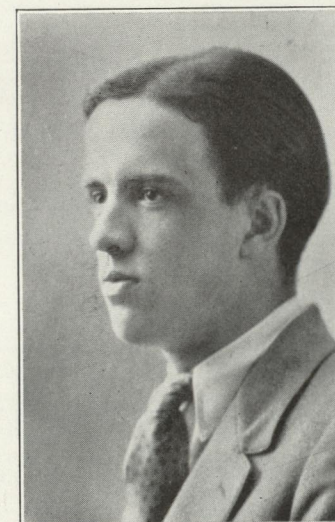
The Northern forensic record has been a high one, both keeping bright the traditions of the school and providing a valuable training to participants.



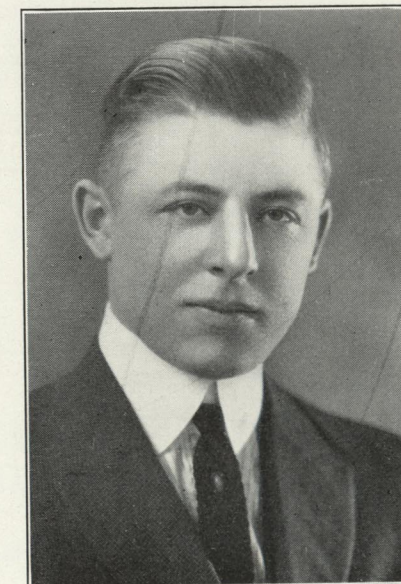
