The lake means much to Marquette. Ships ply back and forth from our harbor to other harbors, from other harbors to ours. That makes our industries.




History of Northern State Teachers College

Northern State Teachers College began officially in September 1899 when it opened its doors to about fifty students on the second floor of the City Hall of Marquette. There was a faculty of six persons, with Mr. Waldo as the principal.

Twenty-five thousand dollars had been appropriated by the State Legislature for a building, and this was completed by 1900 on the site donated by John Longyear and consequently was named after him. There was no training school, and arrangement was made with the city of Marquette to use the Third Street school and a private building near by. Here the practice teaching was done.

Successive buildings added, were, the Peter White building, and another wing on Longyear Hall, and the three story administration building which was erected after the fire of 1907 which destroyed part of the Longyear Hall. Up to the erection of the present John D. Pierce training school all practice teaching was done in Longyear Hall.

So has Northern grown. From six faculty to sixty; from sixty students to over seven hundred. Now it towers high on its forty acres, thirty years of age, but still growing.


Faculty History


Northern has always been fortunate in having considerable talent on her teaching staff; in fact, a number of men who have been instructors at Northern have become nationally prominent in the educational field and today hold responsible positions at leading colleges. Northern has had considerable literary talent among its professors, and textbooks, poetry, essays, and special articles have come from their pens.


The faculty was small when classes first began at the new normal in 1900, much smaller than the average modern high school staff. The staff first consisted of six instructors, including the principal, Dwight Bryant Waldo. Each instructor had charge of a department. The other five members of the original faculty were: William McCracken, physics and chemistry; Flora Elsie Hill, English language and literature; Martha B. Ackermann, drawing and geography; Lewis Flint Anderson, psychology, pedagogy, and German; and Edward G. Maul, mathematics.

The first administrative change occurred in 1904, when Mr. Waldo resigned, and our present president emeritus, James Hamilton B. Kaye, took his place as principal. Mr. Kaye was principal until 1909. At that time the presidency was instituted, and Mr. Kaye became our first president. Our present executive, Mr. Munson, became president in 1923.


The three decades from 1900 to 1930 also witnessed many changes in the faculty, as well as a significant amplification of the curriculum. As has been mentioned, there were only six departments when the school opened, with as many instructors. At the present time there are twenty departments, and the growth of the teaching staff is shown by the following data: 1915... 25 members on the staff; 1917...30 members; 1924...50 members, 1928... 60 members.


The Sophomores displayed effective business management in all their undertakings this year. The class spirit accompanying this made the year a successful one.








COACH HEDGCOCK


History of Athletics


The closing of the present athletic school year has climaxed a hectic period in the athletic history of Northern. Athletic contests have been carried on in our school for about twenty years. At its beginning, with Coach Stull as pilot, we played games with various "Y" and city teams of the Upper Peninsula, as well as Michigan Tech and a few high schools. There were no athletic contests in 1913, but they were resumed again in 1915. It was in 1915 that the present head of our Manual Arts department, Mr. McClintock, took over the coaching responsibility. We played a big schedule in both basketball and football in 1916 and 1917. Under the coaching of Mr. McClintock games were played with various Upper Peninsula town teams. Such familiar names as Harkin, William Morrison, Gus Sonnenberg, Karl Hornbogen, and Clarence Lott, were outstanding athletes under Coach McClintock's tutelage.

In 1918 L. O. Gant became coach at Northern. He produced good athletes, playing such teams as Calumet "Y," Ishpeming "Y," M. C. M., Munising, and other town teams. Gus Sonnenberg was coached by Gant, as were Douglas MacIntosh, and Kenyon Boyer. Coach Gant remained in this field until Coach Hedgcock came in 1922.

With the coming of Coach Hedgcock athletic relations were inaugurated with Stevens Point, Central, Superior, and Oshkosh. Coach Hurst came to our athletic department in 1925. Since then Coaches Hedgcock and Hurst have built up a remarkable reputation for Northern in athletic circles. Such men as Howard Treado, Vance Hiney, Anderle, James Hardimon, Eber Carlson, and Marshall Treado were members of recent teams.

This last year Northern has proved her superiority by finally achieving a track victory over Michigan Tech.









How many of you realize that we had a championship team this year! Our football team had no defeats! We won four victories and tied two games out of the six that were played. Coaches Hedgcock and Hurst think that we should have had a clean slate, as one of our tie games was played on a wet field, while the other was a decisive victory as far as ground gained was concerned.


We began the season with eleven veterans, four Sophomores, and two former Northern athletes. Among these were four men who were playing their fourth year; namely, Wassberg, Ronberg, DeCook, and Collins.

The season began September 28, with our 7-0 victory over Stevens Point.

The following game, with Oshkosh on October 5, resulted in a great victory. It was our first victory over Oshkosh in seven years. Our team came from behind and made a touchdown to even the score. Nelmark made a successful kick to put us ahead 7-6.

On October 12 Northern battled Central to a tie on a dismal, rainy day. The final score was 6-6, neither team being able to show its skill on the wet field.

The next game was also a tie score, no points being made by either team. Northern kept the pigskin in Tech's territory, but didn't seem to have the







punch to put it over the goal.

We won a decisive victory over Northland College on October 26. Coach Hedgcock used 22 players in the game. The final score was 50-0. Zenti's 60-yard run for a touchdown was the spectacular feature of the game.

In the final game Northern finished off the season by trouncing Michigan Tech 21-0. It was a battle royal!

The season's record was very good, only two touchdowns being scored against us, compared to the 91 points we made. Next year's team has hard work ahead of it if it is to keep up this record!


Northern carried out its Freshman ruling for the second year, the plan gaining a permanent place in our athletic policy.

A large number of green Freshies made their appearance and worked hard on the fundamentals of the game. They lost the first game to Michigan Tech, but gained revenge by defeating them later 6-o. On the first play "Nippy" Bullock ran 60 yards for the only touchdown of the game.

This squad will undoubtedly furnish excellent raw material for the varsity next year.






Ferguson—Just to look at George, makes one feel that he is a man of iron. He played his second year at guard, and proved to be a stellar linesman.



Petranek—Pete played his second year at tackle. He proved himself to be a capable man, and it was his touchdown that helped to win the Michigan Tech game.



JOHNSON—Ernest is a Junior. He has worked constantly at football, playing a good game as halfback. No Northerner can forget his work this year.


ERICKSON—Martin is another Sophomore who was bent on showing how football could be learned. He never gave up, and was willing to try anything.
















We began the basketball season with bright prospects and hopes of a championship team. Five regulars were ready for action, besides a number of substitutes and members of last year's Frosh team.


On December 10 Northern started the season against Oshkosh. Northern was favored to win, but overconfidence caused us to lose a good fight. The final score was 25-15.

After this first defeat, our overconfidence vanished, and we won the next nine games by good margins.

The second game was played against Northland College, and our boys won by a large score. This victory spurred the team on. We defeated our strong rival, Central, by a score of 31-20. Then Northland, for the second time during the season, fell a victim to Northern's attack.

The best defensive game of the year was played at Houghton, Northern winning in the final few minutes of play.

The next two games were victories over Stevens Point and Oshkosh.

The green team made a good showing by defeating all its opponents: namely, Michigan Tech (twice) and the "Phy Eds."


Gundry—Although playing only a few minuates at a time, George showed his speed. He is very active and fast, filling forward position as the best of substitutes.

Nelmark—Jack is an aggressive scrapper. He carried his football fighting spirit over onto the court. He was called upon often to substitute for the forwards and guards.



After three years of persistent effort, Northern has been rewarded with a victory over the Michigan Tech track team! Northern scored a victory on May 24 at Houghton!


The track team of spring 1929 was considered the best ever put out by Norther n This team put up strong competition, but lost both meets with Tech.














Northern College News

The present College News began its life in 1914, and was first edited by Mr. Parker. It was called "The Quill" and was a monthly magazine with a very attractive cover—very earnest and sincere in its purposes. It contained news of the organizations then active,—Phi Epsilon, athletics and music. It ran pictures and sketches that would today be a revelation of the change in the appearance of our faculty and students.

In 1918 it progressed into "The Normal News" also published monthly and containing ten pages but much smaller in size than the present publication. This issue was further changed in size and showed a tendency to become all the more a real newspaper. Then five years afterwards it evolved to the present size and became a bi-weekly paper which has since changed its name into "The College News."







It was rather pretentious affair, about the size and shape of a photograph album, and had a green paper cover with gold printing. It was a big undertaking—in fact so big that it was a financial failure.


This last element somewhat discouraged the following classes, and no annual was put out for several years. But in 1919 the Northern Normal News conceived the idea of enlarging its June issue to serve as an annual. The following year the June issue was bound into a book of thirty-four pages.


In 1922 the yearbook was sponsored by the News. In 1923 the annual was published by the Senior class.


The first Kawbawgam was published in 1924. It was essentially the same as the Kawbawgams since published, having the same type of cover and design. It was named after Chief Kawbawgam, of the Chippewas, who had lived in and around Marquette.

Recent Kawbawgams have all been much as the 1924 edition. In 1925 an Indian theme was carried out, and in 1927 a Shakespearean motif was used successfully. It was in 1926 that four classes were recognized at Northern, there having been only two previous to that. It was in this year that the Sophomore class began to take charge of the book.

A study of our yearbooks is interesting and inspiring, and shows us what high standards we must set to make our annuals better and better each year.








Central Debate Team

This year witnessed the fifth consecutive victory of Northern's debate team over Central's. This matter of beating Central has become almost a tradition.



Only one member of the team, Elsie Lehto, graduates this year. The remaining three will be at Northern next year to help in further victories.








Michigan Tech. Affirmative Debate Team




Michigan Tech. Negative Debate Team



Much of the credit for the splendid showing of the men is due to Mr. Roberts who coached both teams that met Michigan Tech.








Northland Affirmative Debate Team



The two questions centered around endorsement of Mussolini's governmental principles, and around the advisability of having uniform marriage and divorce laws in the United States. On the Mussolini question, our negative defeated Central here, and our affirmative lost to Ypsilanti. A team of girl's also went to Ypsilanti and defeated them on the divorce question. Miss Durboraw and Mr. Meyland coached the teams.


In 1928 there were no intercollegiate debates.


