Transition at Northern is marked, in the physical sense, by old buildings coming down and new buildings going up, interiors of old buildings coming out and new interiors going in. White Hall has been remodeled to offer better facilities for our science teachers and our budding scientists. Our Caf has been redecorated, including what is sometimes facetiously referred to as "the longest ashtray in the world"—but really we're proud of our potted plants. Spooner Hall, residence hall for men, was no sooner finished than we saw the need for an addition to hold more Northern men. A new heating plant cares for our increased number of buildings, and a new service building covers the new Fords needed for our increased extension service. Beams and concrete mark where our new gymnasium and physical education plant is rising, complete with swimming pool. Brick apartments for married students rise where boys used to dig angleworms in the College Woods, and soon the shacks of Vetville will come down to allow for re-landscaping. The business office, the book store, and the business department occupy new or remodeled quarters. The library, and of course the cafeteria, show the influx of more and more students. New curricula, as printing in Industrial Arts, are offered as faculty and student body increase. Of vital importance to all students, a new coffee maker in the Caf furnishes better coffee, and at no increase in price. But old landmarks remain, and if you are an old grad planning to return to Northern, or a this year's senior expecting to return in later years, we trust that Northern will still feel like home.















One of the very active organizations on the campus during the past decade, the Masquers have contributed entertainment ranging from drama of the lightest type, to the more serious works.

Meetings are held two times a month, at which time there is Bible study and discussion, singing, and prayer. Social affairs are held at intervals throughout the school year.



Nine Wins, Seven Losses



Three of the seven losses inflicted on the local


