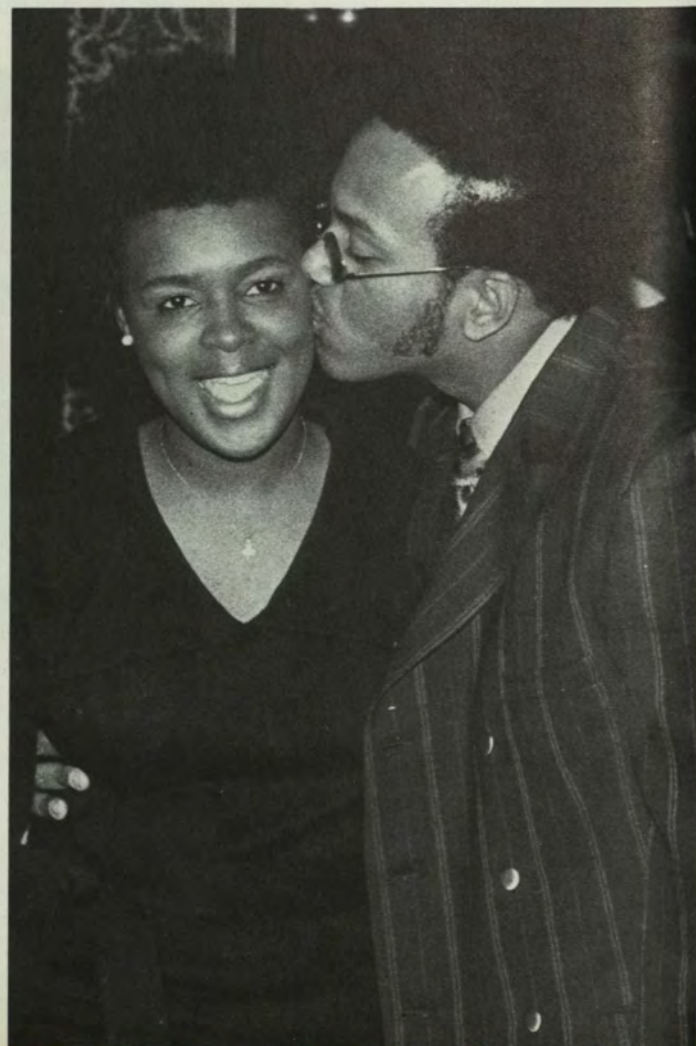


## Concert Lecture Series

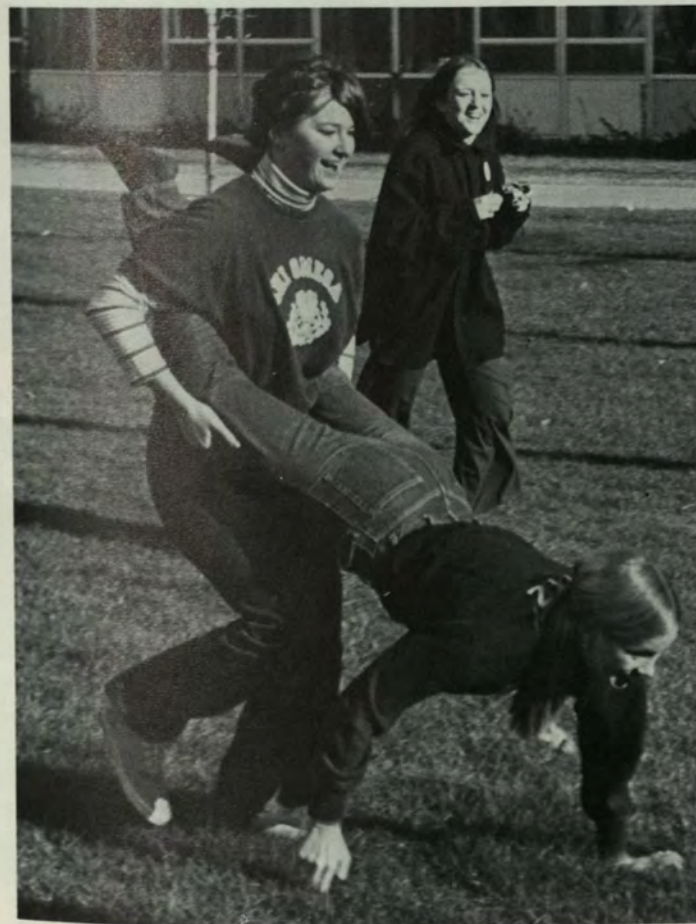
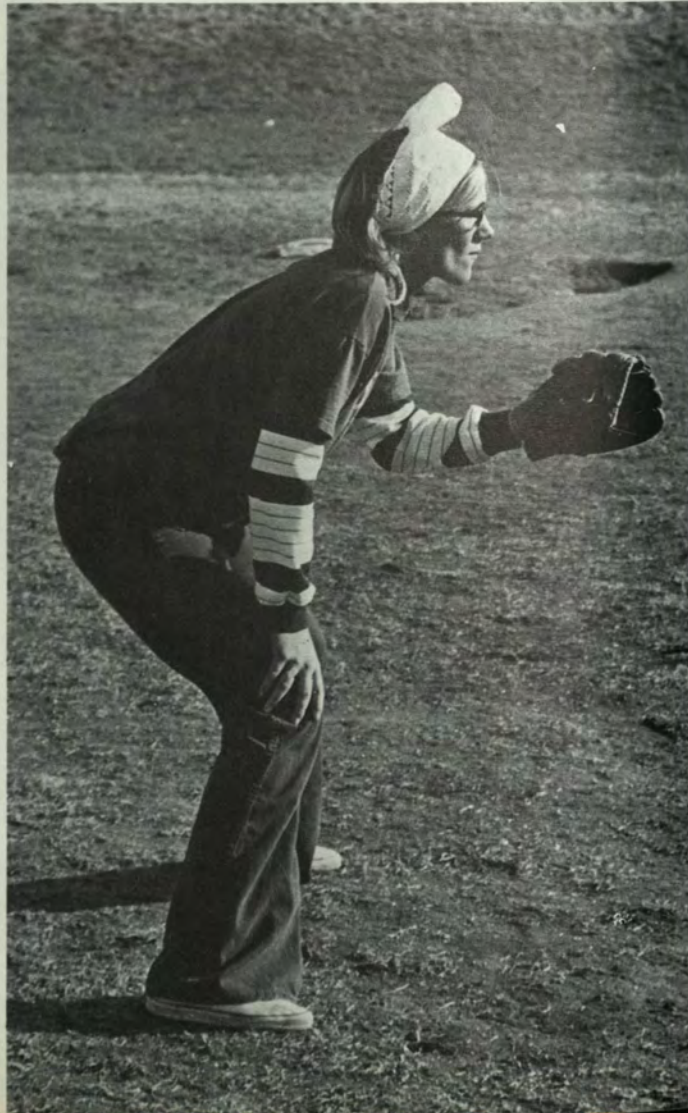
## Greek Week

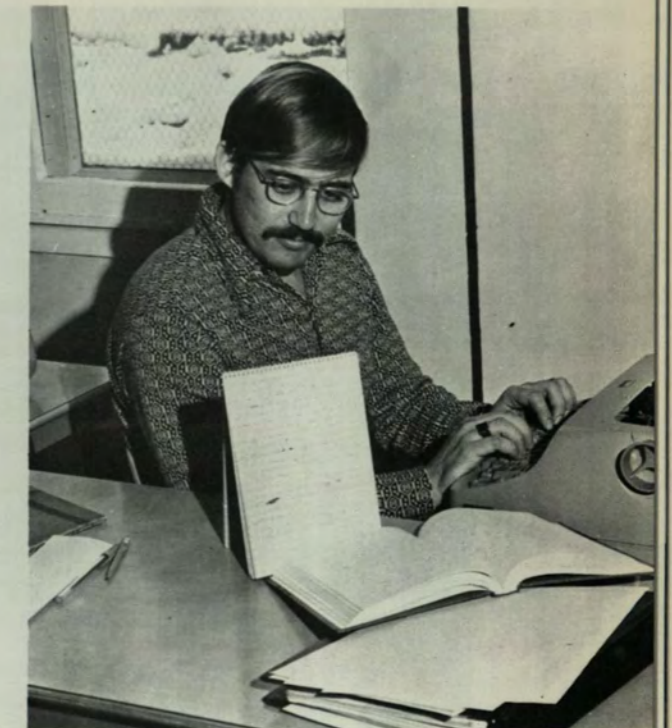


There are well over a thousand different types of professional activities which stem from a preparation in the Visual Arts and over eighty per cent of them do not require a free hand drawing skill.

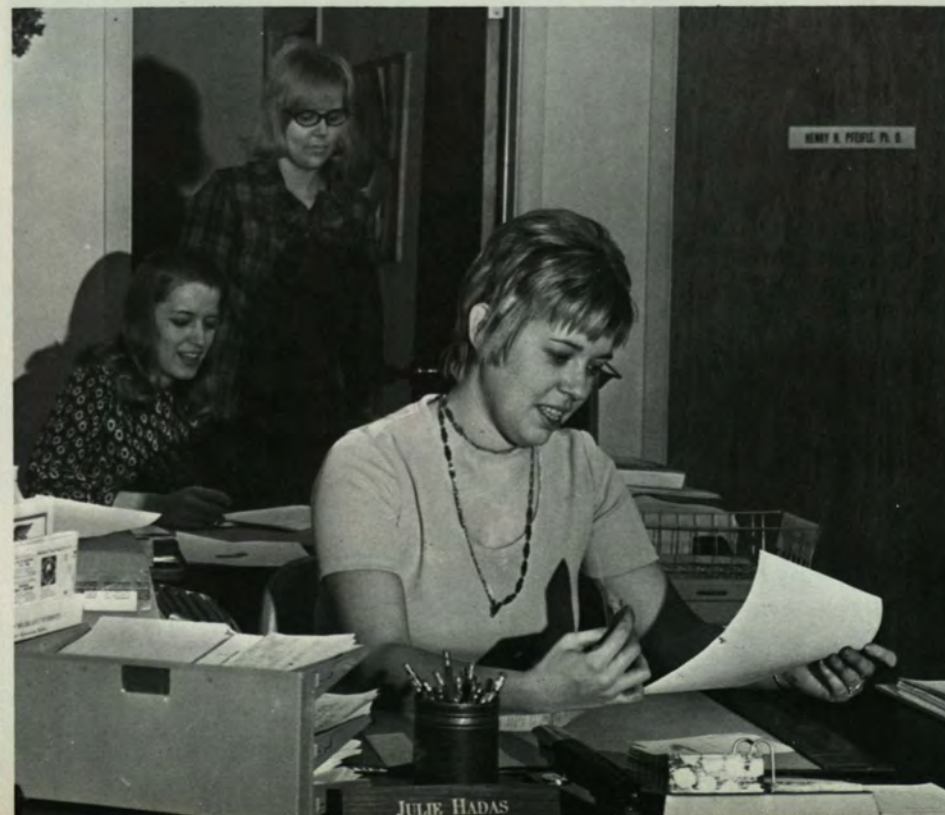

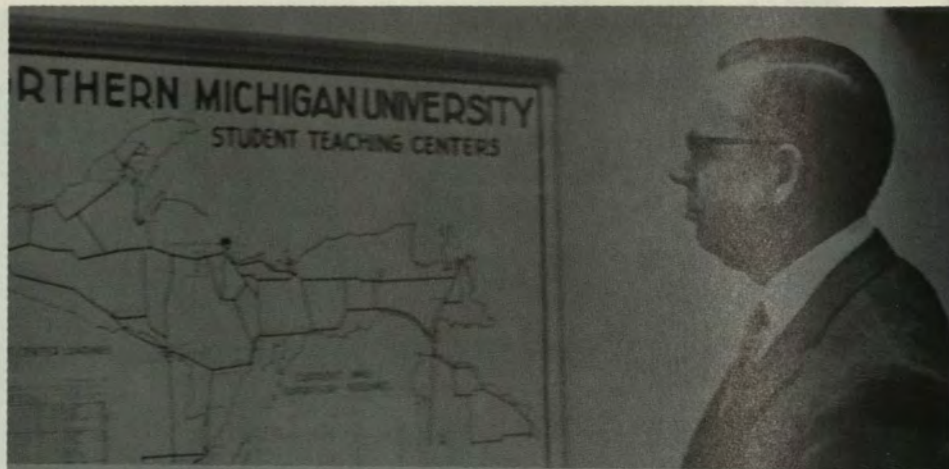

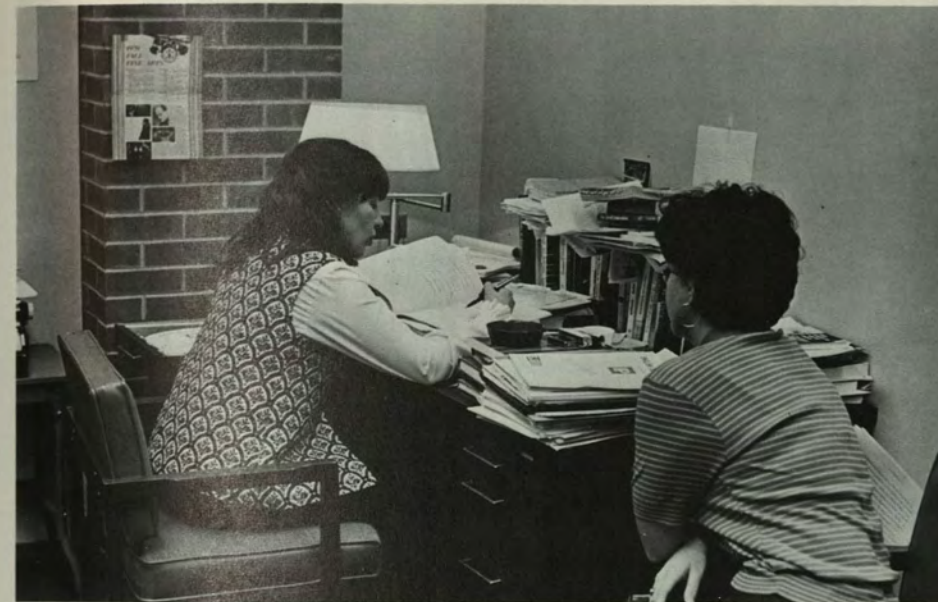

At the graduate level Master of Arts in Education degrees are available in elementary education, secondary education, counseling and guidance, and school administration.



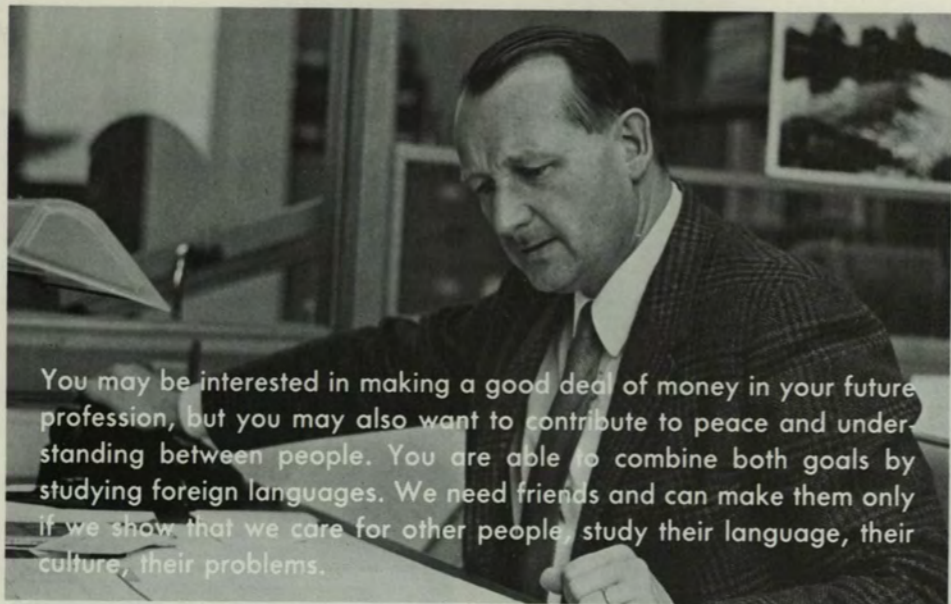

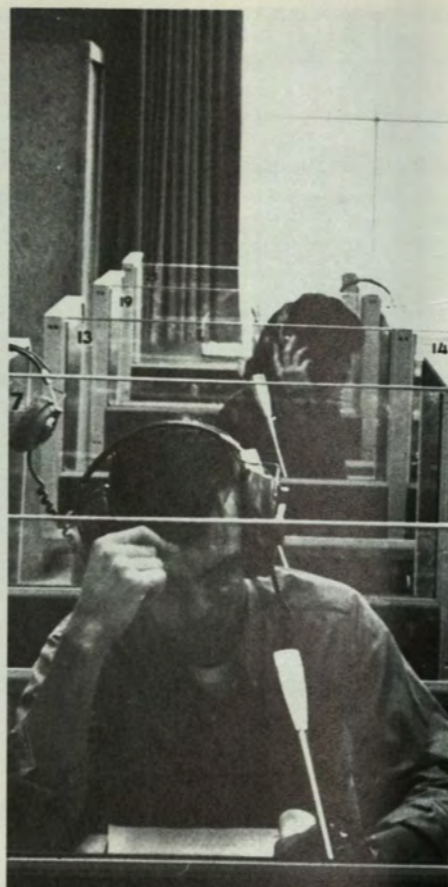

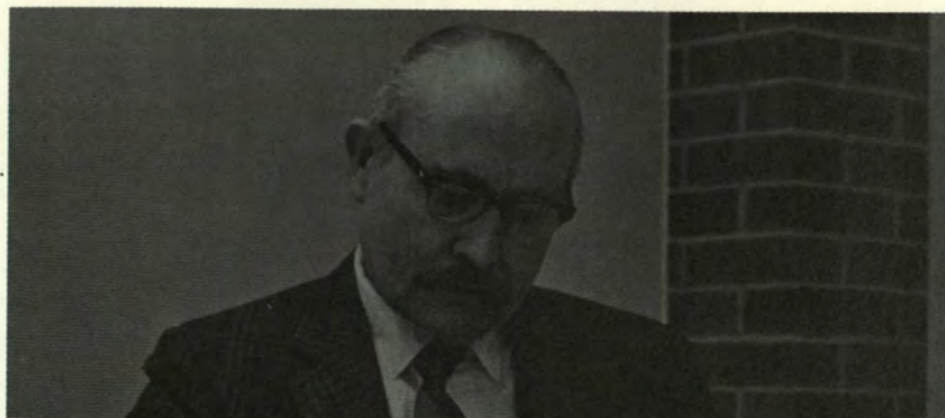
## Health Center

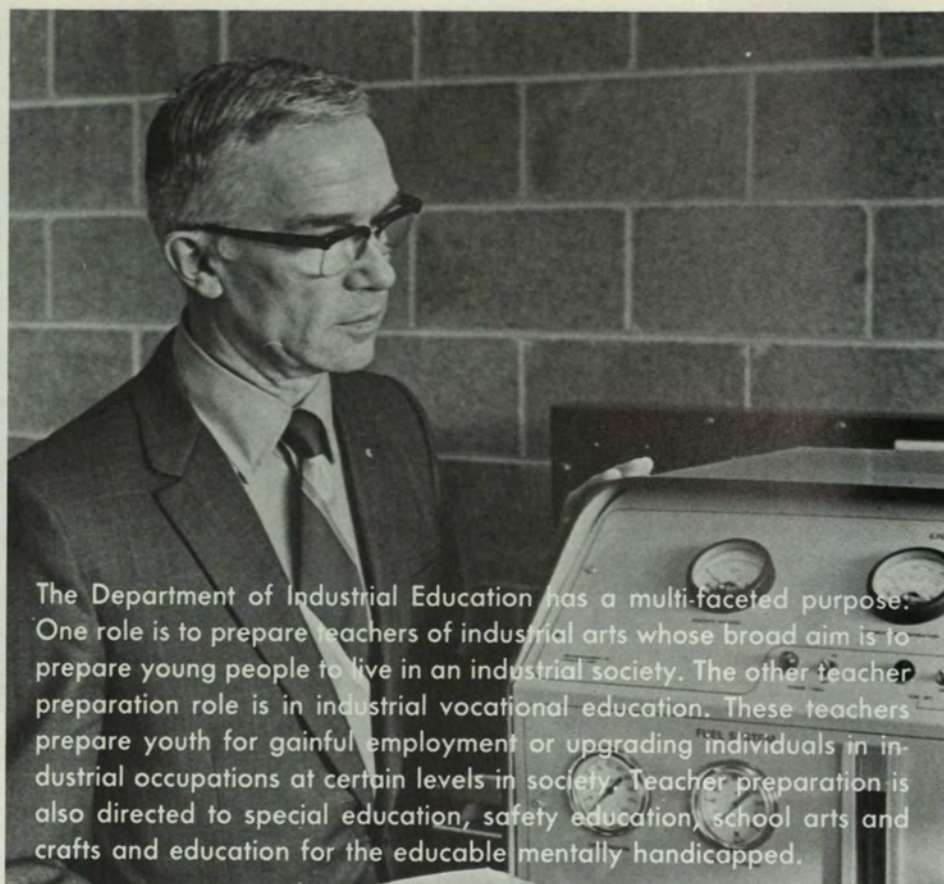

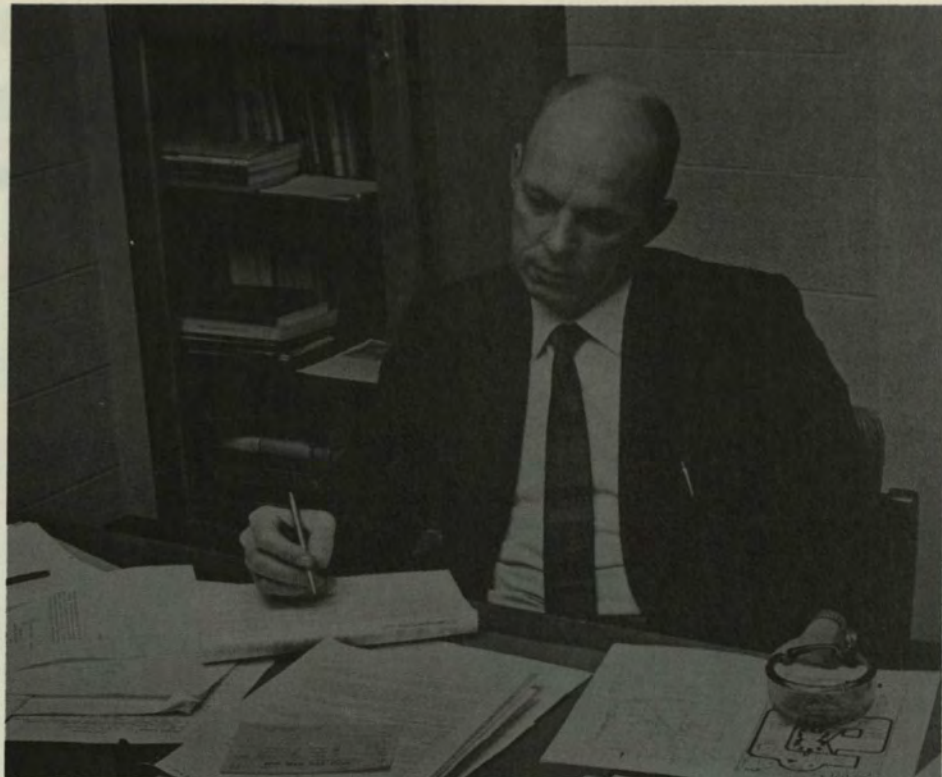

School librarians are required to be certified as teachers. Therefore, students planning to become librarians are advised to take the required education courses and complete student teaching requirements.

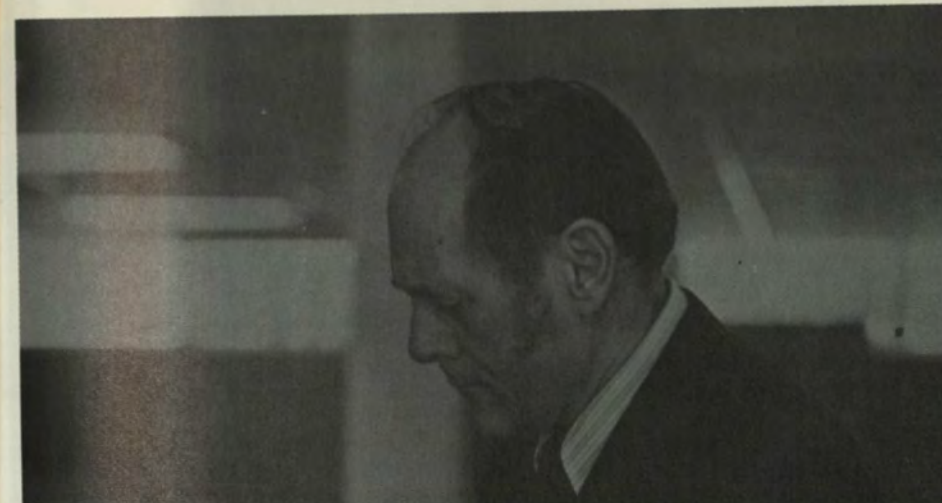
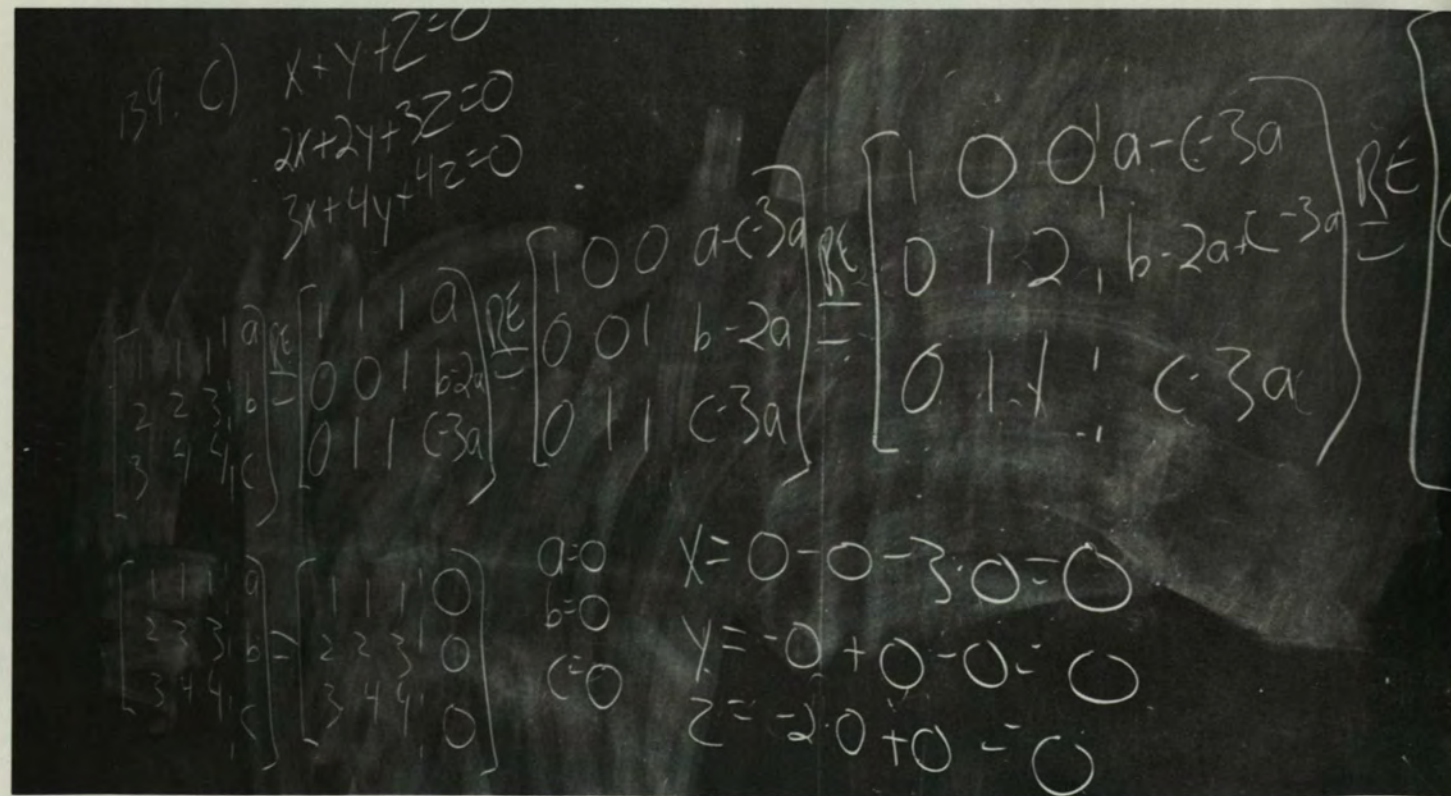

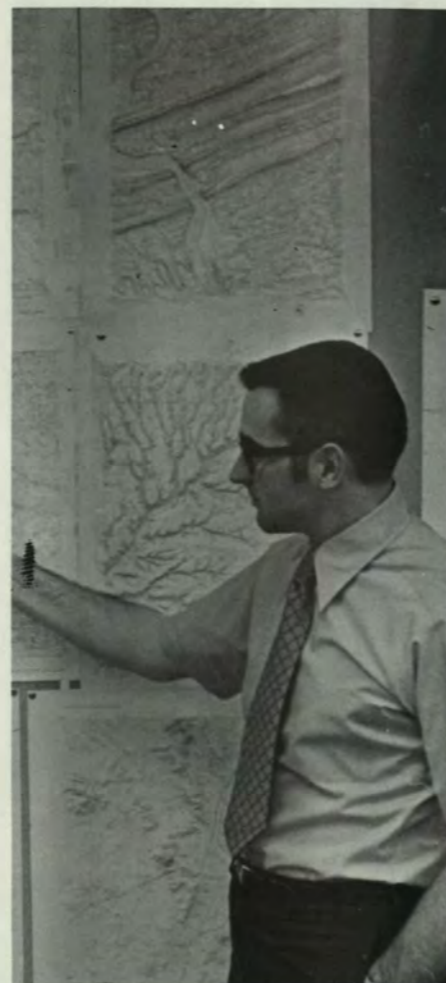


## Earth Science, Conservation and Geography
