Review Case McClellan Getting Review

Not Hearing: Johnson

Faced with a possible student boycott of classes, Northern Michigan University's Board of Control is meeting today with interim president Ogden E. Johnson to review the case against Dr. Robert McClellan. Dr. McClellan, an assistant professor of history, was given a terminal contract at the offset of this school year.

student body, is being held in the action on the part of the faculty shadow of student picketing which has been going on almost continually since Wednesday of last week.

Student body president Don L. Keskey who, along with former student senator Rob Fure, is credited with organizing the ad hoc student committee to support Dr. McClellan. indicated that the picketing would continue until the Board of Control hands down a decision. Keskey added that if McClellan is not reinstated the picketing would turn into the boycott of classes that was passed almost unanimously by over 2,000 students at a mass meeting last Wednesday.

The student resolution for a class boycott was supported later in the week by NMU's chapter of the American Association of University Professors. They passed a resolution agreeing "not to penalize in any way the students who might be involved in the boycott."

ONLY 80 OF NMU'S faculty of over 300 faculty members are represented by the AAUP. A similar resolution was presented at a meeting of the entire faculty last Tuesday

but failed passage.

Northern's Interim President Northern's Ogden E. Johnson indicated that the meeting of the Board of Control which started yesterday would be concluded sometime today. Johnson said that every effort was being made to give a complete review of the This has included entire case. permitting McClellan to present, in writing, an answer to the charges. In addition, Dr. David Dickson and Dr. Thomas Griffith will present an explanation of McClellan's defense to the board.

"This is a review and not a hearing," insisted Johnson, "and we're going to do everything we can to prevent it from turning into a three ring circus."

Johnson said that he thought that having the Academic Vice President Dr. Dickson, and the Dean of Arts and Sciences, Dr. Griffith, present an explanation of the controversy to the board was the best way of presenting the facts "objectively".

The review, which came about As articulated by Faculty Senate after pressure from the faculty and member Dr. Richard O'Dell, the As articulated by Faculty Senate is not a controversy over one man as much as a testing of the limits of academic freedom and faculty involvement in enunciating the goals of the university.

> Besides continuing to picket on campus since the middle of last week, a few students tra-veled to Lansing last weekend to picket Story, Inc., where former University President Edgar L. Harden is employed.

"A couple of the students came over to our home," said Dr. Harden, "and we spent some time talking the whole thing over. I told them they could picket as long as they wanted and when they got cold they could come in for coffee. Just so they would go back and tell whoever sent them that I wasn't changing my position."
