

Abolishing Electoral College

Dear Sir:

Now is the time for citizens who are concerned with the quality and effectiveness of representative democracy to express themselves.

The Senate of the United States is now considering a bill. SJ
Res. 1, which proposes a constitutional amendment calling for direct election of the President and Vice Tresident of the United States. The House of Representatives overwhelmingly passed a similar, bill in September, 1989, and President Nixon added his support for the measure.

"The need for the abolishment of the Electoral College has been dramatically illustrated in recent presidential elections, been dramatically illustrated in recent presidential elections, by Congress and ratified by three-dourths of the state legislatures in time to become effective for the 1972 elections.

The League of Women Voters has senior considerable time

The League of Women Voters has spent considerable time studying the issue of electrant reform and in January sissued a national-statement of its position. With the recent campus uprisings and the discontent shown by those who are safe here at home, I would like to quote you some words written by our son, Ll. David M. Becker, now serving in Victnam.

May 5: "I suppose you're wondering about Cambodia — I suppose it's the big' thing back there. I do believe the President has made the right decision — as long as we go in and then get — through Cambodia."

May 10: "I wish all those so-called "educated" demonstrators who cexate violence gould be packed aboard a plane and flown over here and find out what it's like to be awakened in the middle of the night and be told you'd better get down to the hospital because one of your men has been shot while on patrol — or some hootless blown up by suppers with American bodies bying around. Maybe then they'd realize why we here are agxious to return to the world where freedom and democracy reign. No one here looks forward to a 'violent' life back there-like it's hopping. For those who disagree with the President's policy a free society as ours permits, whether it has by a fire society as ours permits, whether it has by a fire and democratices or polities. — because that's the only way they will ever reign over a free and democratic society as ours.
