

New Terms For 5 Inmates: Probation Sentences Given 7 Defendants In Criminal Cases

Probationary terms were given seven defendants in criminal cases and five Marquette State Prison inmates received additional sentences from Circuit Court Judge Bernard H. Davidson Monday.

Sentencing of one person was delayed so he could be available as a witness in a district court trial, while another defendant was permitted to withdraw a plea of guilty entered earlier and his case was remanded to district court for preliminary examination.

The latter case involved a charge of statutory rape brought against Robert F. Fosmoe, 33, Route 1, Negaunee. Bond of \$1,000 for Fosmoe was continued.

Probationary Terms

Given probationary terms of two years were Roger Kenneth Daugherty, Marquette, charged with uttering and publishing a check; Richard Mannisto, Chocolay Shores, uttering and publishing a check, and Robert

Montagna, Marquette, breaking and entering, while Marion L. Maki, Marquette, charged with larceny, was given three years' probation.

All four were ordered to make restitution and, where applicable, to pay attorney fees and court costs.

Three youthful defendants received "delayed sentences" in which, under state law, the offenses are removed from their records if their conduct is exemplary for a year. Such sentences are tantamount to probationary terms.

Those three were Donald Doucette, Ishpeming Township, breaking and entering; Dennis G. Miller, Brimingham, writing no-account check, and Michael Schultz, Marquette, attempted breaking and entering.

Marinette Man In Jail
Davidson postponed sentencing of Thomas P. Bauer, 27, Marinette, Wis., until Jan. 2 to permit him to appear as a witness in a district court case.

He is charged with taking indecent liberties with a minor female. The judge ordered him kept in custody until he is sentenced.

Sentences of from one to five years — to be served at the conclusion of their present terms — were given Billy J. Redman, 26, Arnold Moses, 29, James C. Martin, 24, and William Spaulding, 21, who were charged with breaking prison. A fifth inmate charged with the same offense, James E. Woudstra, 26, was ordered to serve an additional one to three years.

County, City Authorities Study Action To Be Taken In 'Sit-In'

Marquette County authorities are seeking to determine what charges may be brought in connection with a "sit-in" by 85 black students last Wednesday and Thursday.

Edward Quinnell, county prosecuting attorney, said the Marquette Police Department is conducting an investigation into

the case in which the students reportedly held Dr. Niemi, university vice president for student affairs, captive for 35 minutes and threatened him with a large wooden club before ending the 19-hour demonstration at 4 a.m. Thursday.

The students also broke windows and otherwise damaged of-

fices in Kaye Hall, where the "sit-in" took place in protest over disciplinary action recommended for Charles Griffis, a senior from Grand Rapids.

Quinnell said three possible charges are being considered—kidnaping, simple assault (stemming from the alleged threat against Niemi) and malicious destruction of property.

Griffis was accused of having a girl in his dormitory room after hours. He was found guilty of the charge by the all-university Student Judiciary, which recommended Wednesday that he be suspended for the remainder of the school year.

Griffis appealed his case to the Faculty-Student Judiciary Committee, which found the student not guilty in a decision that was announced early Thursday morning.

Meanwhile, however, black students occupied the student personnel offices in Kaye Hall in protest of the student judiciary's action. The blacks claimed that evidence was lacking in the case; that the student judiciary was biased and that the judiciary was not a legal body because no black students are among the members.

(The student judiciary is composed of seven students nomi-

nated and appointed by students. The Faculty-Student Judiciary Committee is composed of four students nominated and appointed by students and four faculty members nominated by the Academic Senate and appointed by the university president.)

The blacks ended the sit-in when they learned of the Faculty-Student Judiciary Committee's ruling that Griffis was not guilty.

Dr. John X. Jamrich, university president, said he and university attorneys acted to initiate proceedings to enjoin the students from occupying university premises. He said a meeting was held Wednesday night with Circuit Judge Bernard H. Davidson of Marquette on filing

a petition for an injunction to evict the students and that this action would have been taken Thursday morning if the sit-in had continued.

Jamrich said the university already has requested payment of damages to the offices from the Black Student Association, which staged the demonstration.

He said the dean of students also has been directed to pursue an investigation to gather evidence that may be used in connection with possible disciplinary action against the students involved.

In a letter to Quinnell, Jamrich also requested that "this matter be carefully pursued to the fullest extent of the law."

Classes at NMU are in recess for the Christmas vacation and will resume on Jan. 4.

Korpela Resigns As Chief In Munising; Miron Given Post

MUNISING — City commissioners were informed Monday afternoon of the resignation of Police Chief Rudy Korpela; effective Jan. 1.

He will be succeeded, temporarily, by Sgt. Douglas Miron, City Manager MacCauley Gosney announced at a regular meeting of the commission.

Gosney said he had conferred with Korpela and that the chief decided to give up the top spot in the police department because of ill health. Korpela will continue his employment in another municipal department, he
