The recommendation of Student-Faculty Judithe ciary followed the acquittal last week of eight black stu-dents and finding of two more black students not

guilty in hearings this week.

After hearing basic evidence in 10 cases thus far, and having spent about 33 hours in hearings and deliberations, it was spent about 33 hours in hear-ings and deliberations, it was the feeling of the judiciary that nothing positive would be ac-complished by hearing the other five cases because of what the judiciary felt were "inconclu-sive issues" surrounding all the

Cited by the judicial body as

inconclusive were:

1. The question of whether the black students were under the impression that they had authorization to remain in the dean of students' offices after dents' offices after closing hour of 5 normal p.m. The

2. The identification of the participants involved in all aspects of the sit-in.

3. The importance of the time element of admitted presence in the offices in relationship to the charges:

4. The communications chan-nels and change of command among all involved parties.

5. The procedures followed in the student code of conduct. Cite 'Inadequacies'

In addition, the judiciary said, it has found "there are certain inadequacies in the hearing procedures, including presentation of evidence and charges and the elimination of irrelevant discussion."
