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Threat To Schools

Public schools in Michigan have not yet closed their doors for the 1969-70 term and already a grave concern has been expressed for re-opening of classrooms for 1970-71.

The outlook for the successful opening of Michigan schools in September appears gloomy at this time, according to the Council of the Michigan Association of School Administrators, an organization which represents over 800 school administrators, including 500 superintendents.

"Michigan schools face an unsolvable problem at this time," a council spokesman states. "The problem is the fact that local districts are turning down millage increases to finance schools while the Legislature is at an impasse in providing a state aid bill which will adequately fund the needs of public schools."

The council warned that boards of education will find it practically impossible to complete salary negotiations with employees when the state's share of financing remains unknown.
