

MEAD ELECTED PRESIDENT:

Marquette Chosen As Center For New U.P. Health Planning Unit

Frank W. Mead, Marquette, superintendent of the Marquette-Alger Intermediate School District, has been elected chairman of the newly organized Upper Peninsula Area-wide Comprehensive Health Planning Association, to be based in Marquette.

Other officers of the association, chosen at a meeting in the Holiday Inn here over the weekend, are Donald Abbott, Sault Ste. Marie, first vice president; Kent Lundgren, Menominee, second vice president; Paul Kimball, Hancock, secretary, and Matt Howie, Sault Ste. Marie, treasurer.

They will comprise the executive committee, along with these four persons: Dr. James Tobin Jr., Ishpeming; Frank Drazkowski Jr., Ironwood; Helene Welsh, L'Anse, and Betty Goulais, Escanaba.

Reasons For Selection

The areawide association will help to coordinate and support the efforts of the four health planning councils in the Upper Peninsula.

Representatives of the four zone councils voted earlier this month to have the areawide association's offices located in Marquette because (1) the city

is centrally located in the Upper Peninsula; (2) community interest was manifested in the association and (3) the Zone 3 council, covering Marquette and Alger Counties, has been the most effective of the region's four councils.

The association's offices will be located at 502 West Hagnetic St. in a building owned by St. Luke's Hospital.

Purposes Of Association

The association has applied for a federal grant for staffing the office.

Purpose of the association, as set forth in papers of incorporation now being filed, are: "To fulfill the requirements of public Law 89-749 by promoting and assuring the highest level of health attainable for every individual in the Upper Peninsula; to determine the most effective allocation of resources to improve the health of the people; to coordinate planning for health services, facilities, manpower; to avoid duplication, fragmentation, gaps; decrease costs; improve quality of care and to forecast future trends and implications of technology, cost out alternatives and to decide on achievable goals based on these and on value judgements."

Sudden Development:

Jury Selected; Trial Of Six NMU Black Students Under Way

In a sudden and unexpected move at 10:30 this morning, agreement was reached in the selection of a six-member jury and two alternates for the Marquette District Court trial of six black Northern Michigan University students charged with creating a disturbance at a December sit-in at an NMU office.

It cleared the way for opening testimony at 11 this morning in the trial for the six defendants who were arrested on warrants issued by the Marquette City Police.

Police In Hawaii Didn't Get Joke

CAPTAIN COOK, Hawaii — Roger Bell, 22, was arrested on a common nuisance charge when police spotted him chugging a car in the nude. Bell, a carpenter, said his clothes were in the car and that the driver "was playing a joke on me."

The six black student defendants are Vernon Smalls, Marquette; David Williams, Detroit; Patrick Williams, Saginaw; Christopher Poole, Clarkston; Phillip Harper, Inkster, and Loren Loban, New Rochelle, N.Y.

They are charged with creating a disturbance at the Dec. 17-18 sit-in in the office of Dr. Allan L. Niemi, vice president of student affairs at NMU. The sit-in lasted for 19 hours during which Niemi was allegedly held by black students for 35 minutes. During the sit-in, the office was ransacked, windows were broken and office equipment damaged.

This morning after court opened and it appeared to observers that selection of the jury would take at least the remainder of the day, the attorneys notified Judge George E. Hill that they had agreed on the eight jurors.

Members of the jury are: Patricia Raatz, Marquette; Barbara Ostwald, Negaunee. Ross E. Gamble, Negaunee; Stuart Sundblad, Ishpeming; Jean M. Garrett, Ishpeming; Carol Lemire, Marquette; Marion L. Benson, Champion, and Paulette Denore, Ishpeming. Two will serve as alternates in event of illness to any of the six selected during the trial which may last a week.

Attorney for the defendants

is J. Kent Bourland, of the Hancock law firm of Wisti, Jaaskelainen & Bourland. Handling the case for the people is Prosecuting Attorney Edward A. Quinnell.

Monday morning when the case opened, there were 60 prospective jurors seated in the courtroom. During the all-day session 12 were excused. Because each attorney was permitted to strike 30 jurors by peremptory challenge, or without cause, it was not certain if the selection of the jury would be completed today. In fact, before the sudden development on agreement this morning, Judge Hill had tentatively planned for a special court session tonight to complete the jury selection.

Prosecutor Quinnell was scheduled to call Donald D. Pavloski, NMU photographer as his first witness. Also scheduled for an early appearance on the witness stand is Dr. Niemi.

Others Prosecutor Quinnell said he would call to the witness stand in the case for the people are Lowell Kafer, dean of NMU students; William Lyons, chief of NMU Security police; John Fairman, NMU director of Information Services, and the following NMU students Joel Smith, Harry Campbell, Kurt Huffman and Tom

Hultquist.

When court opened Monday there were 50 NMU students, mostly blacks, in the courtroom as spectators. The remainder of the seats were occupied by the 60 on the juror list. There also was a line of about 75 students, mostly blacks, outside of the courtroom waiting for seats to be vacated.

This morning, the first 50 in the courtroom were predominantly white NMU students. Twelve other students were waiting outside

the courtroom.

Because of the large number of jurors needed for the start of the trial, Judge Hill moved the trial from the district courtroom to the circuit courtroom.

According to figures of the district court office, the cost of the jurors alone during the first two days of the trial came to an estimated nearly \$2,000. Sixty on the jury list Monday and the 48 who appeared in court this morning were paid a rate of \$15 per day, plus traveling expense of 10 cents per mile.
