

Proposal To Permit Blacks To Go Home Rejected By Jamrich

Dr. John X. Jamrich, president of Northern Michigan University, today announced that he does not concur with a recommendation that black students be permitted to leave the campus prior to the end of the semester without penalty to their scholastic records.

He made the announcement this morning before an invited group of representatives of the Academic Senate and the Human Rights Commission and student leaders.

The recommendation to allow "any black student who feels he is endangered" to return home now without penalty was submitted to Jamrich Friday night by the Academic Senate and the Human Rights Commission. It was based on recent campus unrest and accusations of hostility toward black students.

The semester ends June 5. **Classes Will Continue**

"Within the past several days," Jamrich said in a statement to faculty, students and staff this morning, "I was presented with a recommendation that black students be permitted to leave the campus prior to the end of the semester if they felt so compelled to do so."

On the basis of the evidence available to me, I am not concurring in that recommendation. Classes will continue as scheduled for the remainder of the semester.

Called Inadequate, Inappropriate
"I have reached this decision because I feel that the basis for the original recommendation was insufficient as substantiated by the normal campus atmosphere of Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

"The proposed solution, if such a problem existed, was neither adequate nor appropriate, nor was the solution equitable and just with reference to all students of this university.

"Finally, university regulations as they now exist and are contained in the university catalog provide for proper consideration by faculty members of individual student cases. The grade 'I' applies to work of acceptable quality when the full amount is not completed because of illness, necessary absence or other satisfactory reasons."

Anonymous Leaflets
The proposal would have allowed blacks who chose to leave to decide between accepting the grade they had earned to date or accepting an "I" (incomplete) with any additional work to be mailed to the university.

Jamrich read a similar statement addressed to the Human Rights Commission, in which he called the recommendation "a decision evidently reached by

your commission after a relatively brief period of deliberation and stimulated by the contents of an anonymous piece of paper."

"This apparently was a reference to a number of leaflets entitled 'Nigger Hunting Permit' distributed on the campus by unidentified persons.

"I am kept fully informed about the need for additional protection," Jamrich told the commission. "Should this prove necessary, I shall make the proper request for additional protection."
